Richland Newhope held its third annual Step Into Spring walking event held at the Richland Mall on Friday, March 18. Registration began at 10 am where guests and participants had the opportunity to visit various vender tables.

This free event was sponsored by Richland County Child Services, Richland Mall, Richland Public Health, and the YMCA of North Central Ohio. This fun walk was a way to wrap up Development Disabilities Awareness Month and to promote community inclusion.

Troy Smith, manager of Community Education and Special Projects at Richland Newhope, welcomed the many guests. Ontario Mayor Randy Hutchinson visited with guests during the event.

Participants were gifted a beautiful and sunny day and it was great to see such a positive turnout after the last couple of socially distanced years. People were appreciative to get some normalcy back and the sea of smiling faces showed it.

I had the opportunity to talk with one mother, Brittany Tolley. She's a mom of two boys, ages three and two. Her three-year-old son's name is Nicholas, and he has Down Syndrome. Nicholas is a curious little boy who loves Reese's peanut butter cups. He also enjoys playing with cars, trucks and dinosaurs.

Nicholas attends preschool at the OHCAC Barbara Haxton Early Childhood Development Center in Mansfield. He receives speech, physical and occupational therapy. He struggles the most with speech as he has developmental dysphasia. Speech has been the biggest hurdle for mom to navigate with Nicholas, as dysphasia causes a person to struggle putting the right words together in a sentence, and understanding what others are trying to communicate.

Speech therapists, teachers and aids at the preschool help a lot with trying to help Nicholas grow and develop in this area. Nicholas loves to learn, count, and be taught. A person with dysphasia can be temperamental. Knowing what you want to say but not being able to communicate it properly can be extremely frustrating. He has some sensory processing challenges when it comes to overcrowded places, too many sounds, fabrics textures, and aversions to certain foods.

#### Where To Find The Booze In 1883 **Bv Bob Carter**

The Temperance movement supporters were creating havoc in the late 1800s. In an effort to hurt or possibly drive the saloon and elbow benders out of business, a heavy tax was placed on every saloon in Richland County. It was either pay up or close your doors.

Like business today, they must pay up, and then raise prices on their goods or services. Radio commentator, the late Paul Harvey, used to preach, "Business and companies don't pay taxes, only people pay taxes!'

On July 12, 1883, the Mansfield Herald published a list of the 71 saloon keepers and dealers in Richland County who had payed their assessments to the county treasurer. Mansfield had 47 with two more still to visit the court house. Shelby didn't go thirsty as they had 11. Sharon and Lexington had to scrape by with only one saloon each while Butler, Shiloh and Lucas enjoyed the services of two bar rooms each.

But then tiny Ontario and Springfield Township had none. Many patrons were very creative and found a possible excuse for thirst and visited the bars possibly just to ward off " a snake bite, sore foot, bad cold" or whatever. One could always find an excuse of some kind.

Many men braved the verbal blast when they got home. At one time Mansfield had two special saloons. One was called "The Bank," the other was "The Office." The excuse — I had to stop at the office or stop by the bank.

After a hard work day, the local tavern was the place for many to go. The Temperance people, mostly piercing eyed women, sometimes stood outside these "hell holes" and wrote down the names of who went in.

A law passed in Lexington required all patrons to enter only by the front door — no sneaking in the back door. No curtains or blinds were allowed to cover the windows. Anybody could look in. Sometimes someone was out there watching and waiting until some known person came home.

The many elbow benders were being watched! And with good reason. The excessive use of the liquor and beer had ruined many homes and jobs. However new tax did little to prevent this.

Yusuke is a popular stage actor who is married to wife Oto who is a popular writer. Yusuke is leading a good life as an actor; however, one day he comes


home to a terrible occurrence.


"Newhope is a fantastic opportunity for children with disabilities of any kind to receive early intervention. Nicholas receives this help up until he is four years old. They come to my home weekly and work with Nicholas!" Brittany Tolley said.

When I asked Brittany if there was anything she would want the community to know about her as a parent of a child with down syndrome, she went on to say, "Just treat us like you would anyone else and respect us. Comments and assumptions about special needs children are made to me weekly. These children are quick learners and able to exceed hurdles that others will never face. They may take a little longer to learn certain things but are really just like anyone else. These kids are able to live a good and full life!"

The World Health Organization acknowledges March 21 as World Down Syndrome Day. Down Syndrome is a genetic chromosome 21 disorder causing developmental and intellectual delays. Cell division happens in a unique way that results in an extra genetic material from chromosome 21. It affects approximately 6,000 babies at birth every year. This day is to raise public awareness, promote inclusivity, encourage advocacy, and support the wellbeing of those living with Down Syndrome.

## In Your Hometown: Protecting Striking Workers Health Insurance

In our country, workers have rights. Corporations shouldn't be able to take away the health care workers earned just because workers stand up for themselves and exercise those rights

It's why I introduced the Striking Workers Healthcare Protection Act, to require employers to continue providing health insurance to workers on strike for fair pay and benefits and safe workplaces.

It would protect working families from being forced off the health coverage they've earned and negotiated, and protect them from having to pay out-of-pocket for the health care their families need.

Any union worker knows that strikes are always a last resort. Workers want to reach a fair agreement, so they can keep going to work and providing for their families. Workers almost never recover all the lost wages from a strike.

But sometimes it's the only option.

If a company refuses to agree to a fair contract, workers can use their collective voice. In 2019, General Motors was making massive profits, and was about to reap a windfall in tax cuts from Mitch Mc-Connell's corporate tax giveaway.

Workers made those profits possible, and all they were asking for was their fair share. During the national union strike, General Motors dropped workers' health insurance, including the coverage of workers in Ohio.

And it happens all the time.

This year, bakery workers at Local 37 were forced off their health care benefits while on strike at Rich Products. During the UAW strike last fall, John Deere threatened to cancel the health care coverage of thousands of workers across the Midwest. UMWA workers at Warrior Met had their health care coverage cut off when they went on strike in April 2021. The union has been paying the health care coverage for those members since the strike began.

American workers have the right to negotiate a fair contract that reflects the value of their work without the fear of losing health care benefits they earned and negotiated in good faith at the bargaining table.

Our bill would protect workers' and their families' health. And it would give workers the peace of mind that if they're backed into the corner, they can stand up to corporate abuse, without the fear of losing their families' health insurance.



## **April recognized as National Child Abuse Prevention Month**

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. This month and throughout the year, Richland County Children Services (RCCS) encourages all individuals and organizations to play a role in making our community a better place for children and families. By ensuring that parents have the knowledge, skills, and resources they need to care for their children, we can help promote the social and emotional well-being of children and youth and prevent child maltreatment within families in our community.

To help spread awareness for child abuse prevention, Richland County Children Services (RCCS) is inviting individuals, churches, organizations, businesses and schools to tie a blue ribbon on their door, mailbox, or car antenna during the month of April.

The blue ribbon is the international symbol for child abuse prevention. It serves as a reminder that all of us have a responsibility in helping protect children.

In support of this effort, downtown Mansfield is going "blue" in April. The city is tying blue ribbons around lamp posts, and the downtown gazebo in Central Park will be lit with blue lights in honor of Child Abuse Prevention Month.

This year's theme for Richland County Children Services is "Making a Difference Together." The most important thing we can do to help children thrive is to support families before they reach a crisis.

Each year, we educate and raise awareness about the impact child abuse has on children and society. Providing information about comprehensive best-practices that are known to build parental capacity through protective factors is key in helping families become more resilient. To make child abuse less likely to occur, we need to invest in our community and our families," said Brigitte Coles, RCCS Community Engagement Specialist.

Protective factors are the strengths and resources families draw on during difficult times to shield them from life's stresses. Research shows that when parents possess protective factors, the risk for neglect and abuse diminish and optimal outcomes for children, youth, and families are promoted.

Major protective factors include knowledge of parenting, knowledge of child development, parental resilience, social connections, and concrete supports.

National Child Abuse Prevention Month is more than just raising awareness about the reality of child maltreatment. It's about taking action to reduce it. RCCS is helping to reduce abuse and neglect by providing our families with the support they need. There are certain issues such as a family's neighborhood, income level, or other societal factors that can make parenting more challenging. By reducing these vulnerabilities through strengths-based approaches that truly support families, we can begin to mitigate child maltreatment and improve the outcomes of children, youth, and families.

RCCS is marking National Child Abuse Prevention Month with several activities:

The Child Abuse Prevention Month Kick Off wil be held at the Richland County Courthouse, 50 Park Avenue East, Mansfield, in the Commissioners Board Room, on Thursday, March 31, at 9:30 am The Richland County Commissioners will present a Proclamation in observance of April being National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Proclamations will also be issued by the cities of Mansfield, Ontario,



Shelby, and villages of Bellville, Butler, Lexington, Lucas, Plymouth and Shiloh.

Blue ribbons will be on display in downtown Mansfield for Child Abuse Prevention Month courtesy of RCCS, the city of Mansfield, the Mansfield United Lions Club and Tara's Floral. The community can participate by displaying blue ribbons on a tree, door, fence, on a vehicle or mailbox. The blue ribbon is the international symbol for child abuse prevention. Mix 3 eggs, 1 cup oil, 2 cups sugar, 2 Tbsp. vanilla. Mix 3 cups flour, 2 tsp. baking soda, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 1 Tbsp. cinnamon and add to wet ingredients. Mix well. Add 2 cups shredded zucchini (if frozen, thaw and drain well). Pour into two greased bread pans. (You can also line with parchement). Bake 350 for 50-60 minutes or until knife comes out clean.
