65th sunrise service will be held at Kingwood Center

Kingwood Center Gardens will host the sunrise service for the 65th time this Sunday, but it will be for the first time in its Garden Gateway Courtyard.

The 7 am service will feature special music by the Glory Way Quartet, Easter Hymns accompanied by Susan Hitchman Evans and Easter Carols by Pastor Paul Lintern, who also will preach.

"The Gateway is a special addition to the Center and the courtyard to the south has a wonderful view of the Allee and the Kingwood Hall," Lintern says.

The first sunrise service, in 1957, sponsored by St. Mark's Lutheran Church, was held on the old tennis court of the new center, south of Kingwood Hall. The crowd of 500 doubled the following year. Eventually, the site was moved to the courtyard of the carriage house and greenhouse, on the east side near Linden Rd.

Only twice has the service not been held at Kingwood, once due to carriage house renovations, and two years ago because of COVID.

This is the first year St. Mark's is not in charge.

"The congregation decided last year that it no longer had the resources to keep the project as its own. I have been a part of the service for about 20 years, and offered to take the leadership role," Lintern said. "We want to celebrate St. Mark's faithfulness in bringing three generations of worshippers together each Easter."

Lintern also coordinated the recently completed March of Prayer, in which 31 local churches, of more than 20 denominations, each hosted an evening of prayer last month, under the theme, Mansfield is Godfield.

"The Kingwood service has developed its own congregation over the years, people who want a community celebration of the Resurrection of Christ, often before going to their home congregations. They want to be among those who see the sun rise as they celebrate the Son's rise."

The nationally celebrated Glory Way Quartet will return for several songs this year, a feature that has become a tradition of its own. The group travels more than 65,000 miles annually and performs regularly at Dollywood in Pigeon Forge, TN, and recently won the Sunrise Quartet of the Year for SGN Scoops Diamond Awards. Mansfield resident Justin Crank, is the group's baritone and manager.

"We've enjoyed being part of the Easter sunrise service for the last several years. It is particularly special for me because my wife's family has planned and participated in this event since the very first one," Crank said.

A children's time will feature Easter eggs and jelly beans that tell the Resurrection story. Oakland Lutheran and Southside Christian Churches, where Lintern serves as pastor, assembled the gifts.

Although chairs are provided, visitors are encouraged to bring lawn chairs as well.

Early millwrights were highly skilled

In the early 1800s there was a great demand for flour and cornmeal. Once trees were cleared and crops planted and harvested, the grain was not too useful unless ground into something the women could bake. For flour or corn meal, the services of a water-powered grist mill was needed.

Building a pioneer mill required the services of a skilled millwright. Carpenters could erect buildings but the water power of the mill machinery required the services of an understanding of mathematics and careful planning. A dam and head race to conduct water to a waterwheel dictated the height and width of the wheel. That dictated the revolutions or speed of the wheel shaft to the interior gearing.

A tall, or say 20 foot, wheel would turn slower than a 10 or 12 foot wheel. The internal gearing had to be exact. The heavy millstones, sometimes weighing nearly a ton, had to turn at the proper speed, anywhere from 90 to 120 revolutions a minute, depending on size. Larger stones turned slower than smaller.

Inside a mill, grain cleaning blowers, elevators, cooling sweeps and bolting (sifting) chambers all had to be in operation at the same time and exacting speed. There were no standard mill gearing possible. Each mill was different. Here's where the skill of the millwright came to master.

These early mills ran on handmade wooden gears with wood teeth on a wooden shaft which sat on a wood bearing. The bearings were often lubricated with a strip of bacon fat as the turning shaft wood-to-wood was a fire hazard. The use of wheels with wood teeth was a safety issue. If a floating piece of timber fell into the head race and jammed the waterwheel or some other breakdown suddenly occurred, the heavy rotating millstones could not be stopped quickly. The wooden gear teeth were broken off and could be easily replaced. This saved major damage to the mill gearing. The millwright was highly skilled and making these gears and shafts was a time consuming task. Everything had to be right because if the finished mill didn't run properly he didn't get paid until it was fixed.


These millwrights learned the profession by apprenticeship with older men. There were no schools available. They were usually very well paid or compensated in some way and many built their own saw mills to cut the lumber for the more complicated grist mill.

In 1840 there were, according to mill historian D. W. Garber, 160 water powered mills in Richland County alone, more than any county in Ohio. Saw mills, grist mills, woolen mills and linseed oil mills, all were powered by water. All built by skilled millwrights.

Michael Bay's *Ambulance* is a throwback to 90s action films and is a pretty fun watch. Even though it suffers from lots of predictability and doesn't bring anything new to the genre, it's an action packed two hours, that's for sure.

Jake Gyllenhaal stars as Danny, a professional bank robber who is taking after his father, who was a life long bank robber. After his best friend and brother (Yahya Abdul-Mateen II) decides to come back into the fold, needing money for some medical bills that will benefit his wife and child; they steal an ambulance along with a paramedic and an injured cop, on a race through Los Angeles as the police department in every form is in pursuit.

Gyllenhaal is such a great actor and should be acknowledged more as such. He is a terrific villain here, and great in the lead role of a guy right on the edge thinking he can get away with all of this.

The action scenes are great as Bay uses lots of drone footage to capture some of these intriguing and engaging shots. The bank robbery sequence is also very impressive. The movie though may be a little long at two hours as it uses lots of slow motion at the end that makes it really drag and it seems unnecessary.

Bay's movies can be really hit and miss depending on what you are a fan of. I loved *The Rock*, but am not a big fan of the overly done and pretty boring Transformers movies.

Here it is nice to see Bay get back to a more human story and while *Ambulance* brings nothing new to the table, it has some nice performances from the leads and will certainly be enjoyable if anyone is in the mood for an action picture that takes hold from the start and doesn't let go.

I am excited to share with you some nutritional insight. I have a client that is having amazing success with the program I use at my gym, The Diet Free Life. This plan is something you can live and it is great for beginners.

It teaches the differences between fast carbs and slow carbs and how to partner them with proteins and fats to create fat burning meals. There are three types of fat burning meals to choose from.

My clients pick which one of the three meals they want to use and then choose the carbs and protein and fats from the food lists they want to use, and plug them in, its that easy.

What I like most is that it is easy to follow and they do not have to give up everything they love to get results.

This is also the plan that I have been using for myself and having success. In November my family had COVID, and it wreaked havoc with my weight and scale. I gained 10 lbs and couldn't lose it. This was very frustrating for me. I was exercising and eating good and couldn't lose, not even one pound. I had 1.2 grams of protein per pound of body weight, 1 gram of carbs per pound of body weight and 1 gram of fat for every 5 lbs of body weight. Due to the fact that I am working out a lot, my body needed these changes. I am down three lbs in four days.

There a lot of nutritional plans out there. If what you are doing is not working, pivot.

KIMMY'S SEMOLINA CINNAMON COFFEE CAKE

Ingredients

2 sticks butter, softened
2 cups sugar
3 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
2 cups sour cream
1 ½ cups semolina & flour each
1tsp. soda
½ t b. Powder
1 tsp. salt

Topping: Combine all ingredients

2 tsp. cinnamon
¼ cup brown sugar and sugar (each)
½ cup walnuts, chopped
Salt

Drizzle: (optional)

2 tsp. instant coffee
1 cup confectioners sugar
1 Tbsp. cream
2 Tbsp. water

Instructions

Blend butter and sugar until well combined and smooth. Add eggs one at a time combining well with each addition. Add vanilla and sour cream. Blend well. Sift dry ingredients and add in. Blend well. Pour half of batter in a tube or bundt pan. Add half of topping and cover with remaining batter and rest of topping.

OPTIONAL: Drizzle, combine ingredients and drizzle over warm cake if using.

Low & Slow: 300 degrees for 75 minutes or until toothpick is clean

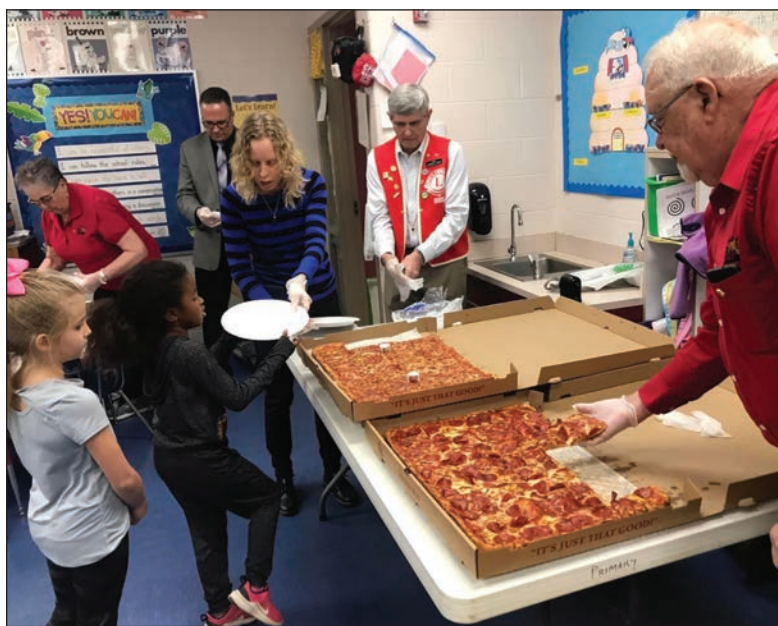
The proceeds from the bake sale at Family Farm and Home were discussed and we are planning another fundraiser at Chipotle in June.

Levy will not add increase

On May 3, residents of Ontario Local Schools will vote on a 10-year renewal levy that will result in zero additional cost to taxpayers.

The district is combining two levies set to expire soon. The first is a 4.2 mill operating levy that is expiring at the end of this calendar year. It was first passed in 1992 and has been renewed every five years since. The second is a 6.1 mill levy expiring at the end of 2024.

The combined levies total 10.3 mills, however, the Richland County Auditor believes the combined millage of this levy will be 10.2 mills next year so it will appear on the ballot as 10.2 mills rather than 10.3.

If the ballot issue passes, funding will be used for day-to-day operations such as staff, utilities, technology and supplies. Ontario Schools was the eleventh lowest district in the state for operating costs per student in fiscal year 2021. The levy would provide continued financial stability so students can receive the education Ontario residents have come to expect.

Free milkweed seeds available

Free Milkweed seeds and planting instructions are available while supplies last, from Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD), located at 1495 W. Longview Avenue, Suite 205B, Mansfield, OH 44906. The seeds may be picked up from a basket outside the Richland SWCD office door.

In the fall, the Ohio Pollinator Habitat Initiative (OPHI) spear-headed the Milkweed Seed Pod collection and was aided by other partners, such as Richland SWCD and the public, in the collection of milkweed seed pods in an effort to help foster habitats for Monarch butterflies and other pollinators. The seeds being given away were harvested from the collected pods and re-packaged by Richland SWCD volunteers, Pete Holmes and Marilyn Roe.

Pollinator Species are experiencing population declines across the United States. In particular, the monarch butterfly has drastically declined here in Ohio and in the wintering grounds of Mexico. Milkweed is essential to the survival of Monarch Butterflies in Ohio and Ohio is a priority area for Monarchs. The monarch butterflies that hatch here in the summer migrate to Mexico for the winter and are responsible for starting the life cycle all over again in the spring.

Madison Local Schools accepting kindergarten registrations

Kindergarten registration for Madison Local Schools will be held April 4–29. Children are eligible to attend kindergarten during the 2022–’23 school year if they are five years of age on or before Aug. 1, 2022.

The first step in the registration process is to complete the on-line registration through FinalForms. The registration link can be found at www.mlscd.net under Madison FinalForms or using the link under kindergarten registration. Those who do not have internet access can schedule an appointment to complete the online forms with their child’s assigned building.

Current Madison South Preschool students moving into kindergarten will need to log into FinalForms to complete the 2022–’23 forms and schedule an appointment for kindergarten registration.

Once all online forms are completed, an appointment should be scheduled with the elementary school in which the parent resides: Madison South Elementary, 419-522-4319; Mifflin Elementary, 419-589-6517; and Eastview Elementary, 419-589-7335.

Documents which should be brought to the appointment are student birth certificate, parent/guardian driver license, custody papers (if applicable), parent/guardian proof of residency (see FinalForms for approved list) and immunization records.

Required immunizations for school attendance are four doses of DPT (five doses if four were given before fourth birthday); three or more doses of Polio with final dose after fourth birthday; three doses of Hepatitis B; two MMR’s; and two Varivax (Chicken Pox) or history of having disease.

Poll worker class is Thursday

The Richland County Board of Elections needs additional poll workers for the May 3 Primary Election. The Board has scheduled a class for new Precinct Election Officials (poll workers) for the May 3rd Primary Election on Thursday, April 14, at 6 pm at the Longview Center, 1495 W. Longview Ave., in the upper level classroom.

If you enter through the front entrance from the main front parking area, the classroom will be to your right, past the elevators. The class will consist of an overview of the Electoral process and should last approximately 2 ½ hours. A brief presentation will be included to demonstrate how to set up the voting equipment. Attendees will receive \$30 with their first check for working the polls and attending this class.

Most new poll workers will be assigned. We try to place workers as near as possible to their home area, but sometimes it's necessary to ask them to travel to another part of the county.

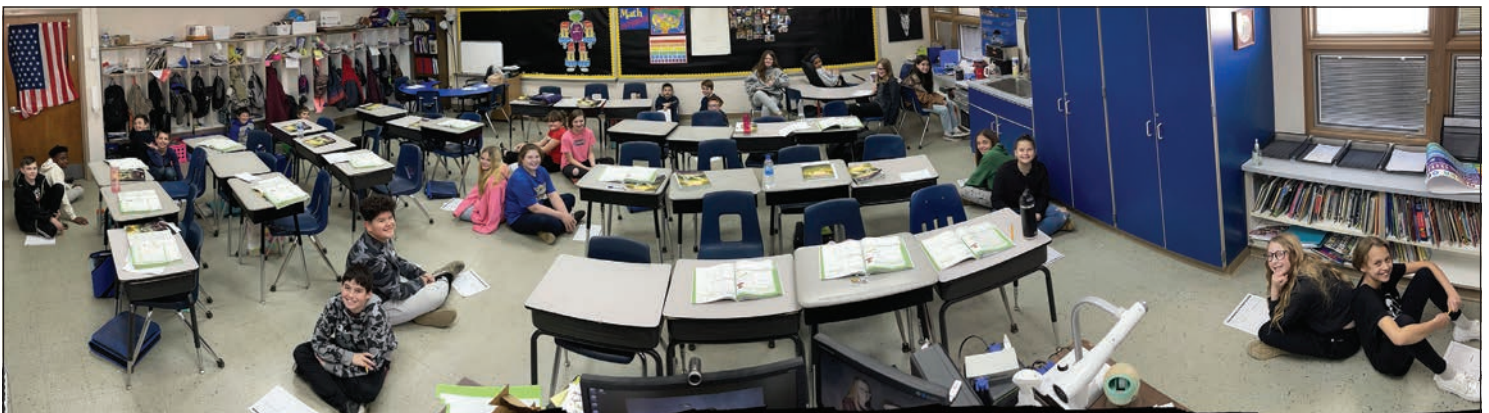
Each polling precinct is staffed by one Precinct Election Official - Presiding Judge (PEO-PJ), who is considered to be the lead Poll worker, one Precinct Election Official - Presiding Assistant (PEO-PA) who must accompany the PJ back to the office with the equipment and ballots after the polls close, and two Precinct Election Officials-Clerks (PEO-Clerk).

Vote Centers, which are polling places with more than one precinct, will also have a VLM (Voting Location Manager) to oversee the entire location. Usually the more experienced workers are assigned as a VLM or PJ. An equal number of poll workers from each party must be assigned to each precinct.

VLM's are paid \$190, Presiding Judges \$180, Presiding Assistants \$155 and Clerks \$145, plus their training compensation. No taxes, social security, or other deductions are taken out of these checks.

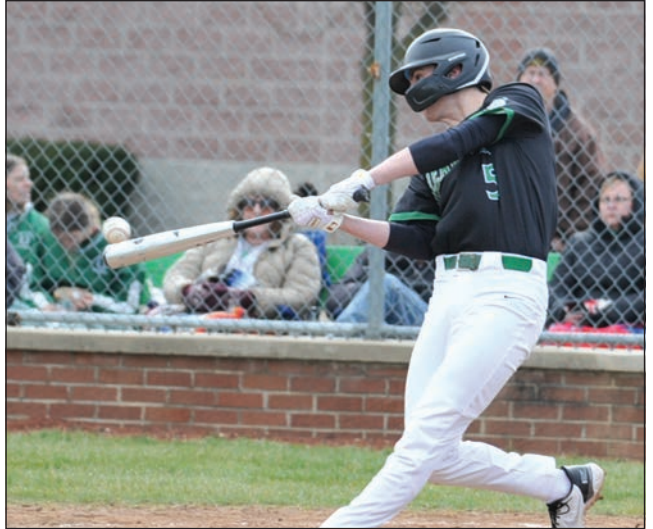
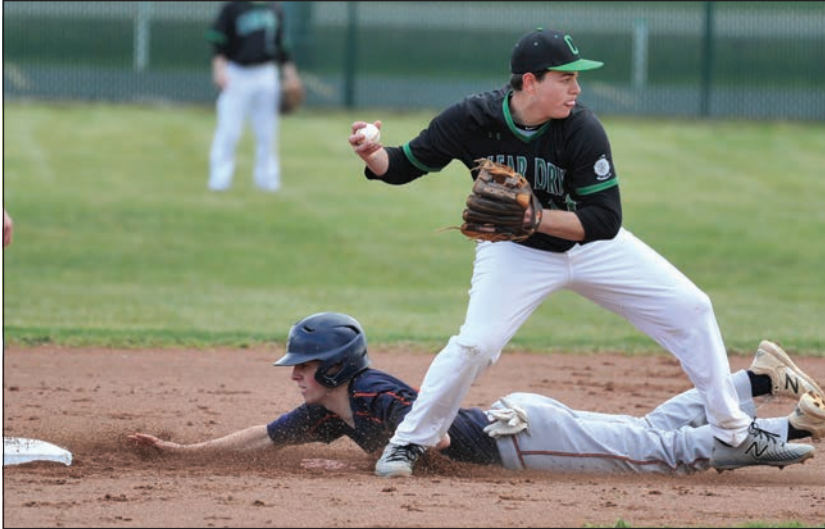

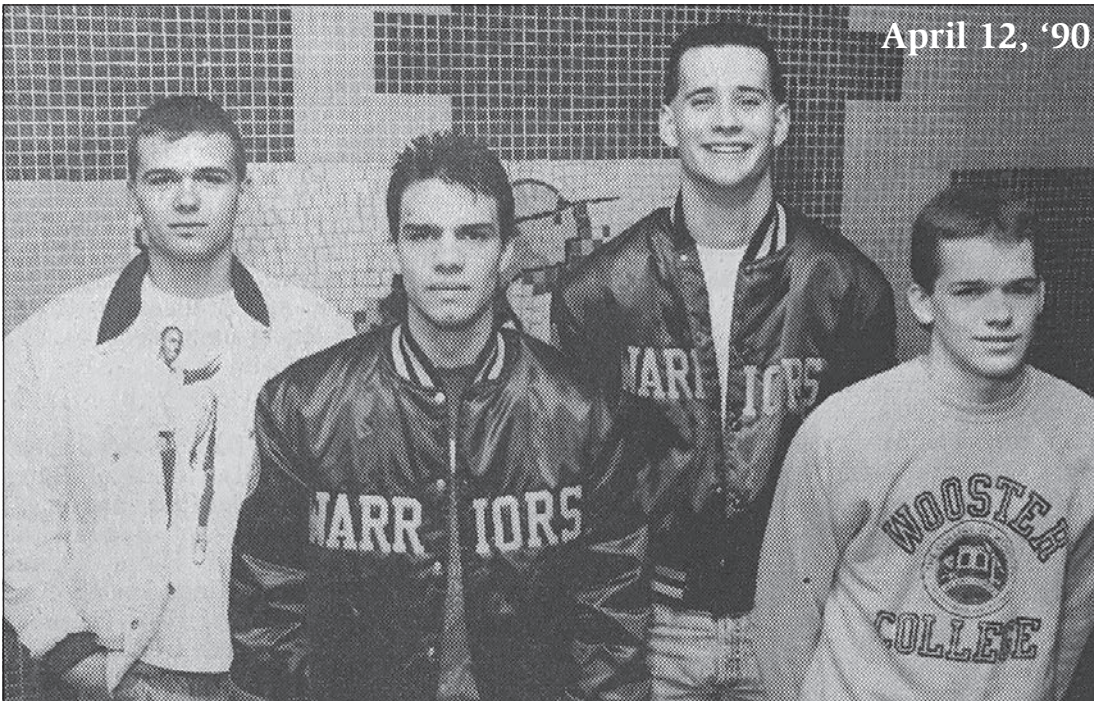
