Ava Julian, a fifth grade student at Stingel Elementary School, Ontario, was recently inducted into the 2021-'22 Ohio AAA School Safety Patrol Hall of Fame.

Committee members from the AAA Ohio Auto Club selected Ava and several others from around the state out of many applicants to be part of the elite group. Students are chosen for the Hall of Fame based on advisor nominations and student essays that demonstrate how the student exemplifies the spirit of a safety patrol member.

In Ava's essay, she wrote that she would be a good candidate for the Hall of Fame because she was a good listener as well as respectful to others.

She also wrote, "I have helped lots of students stay safe in the two years that I have served on Safety Patrol. I always showed up on time, had good attendance, and made sure all the students got to their buses before I headed home."

Tod Petit was Ava's safety patrol advisor. He comments that Ava is a natural leader. "Ava took initiative many times to fill-in at empty patrol spots without anyone having to say anything to her. Also, she was usually the one who would report back to me whenever an unfamiliar adult would wander onto the school grounds looking for their child during dismissal."

As an AAA School Safety Patrol Hall of Famer, Ava understands the importance of following the rules to keep students and herself safe. She will be recognized at the next Ontario School Board meeting on June 14. Ava is the daughter of Justin Julian and Abby Dodson.

Lexington Fire Department had early failures

The danger of home or business fires in the late 1800s was a constant worry. It was the age of wood shingle roofs on wooden buildings. Ashes from stoves or fireplaces were often stored outside in wooden barrels. Defective chimneys and stove pipes were another worry. The whole town was a fire hazard.

Finally in 1857, the village fathers appropriated \$18 for hooks and ladders for use in case of fire. The hooks were used to tear burning shingles off the roofs. The next year the local blacksmith was hired to make the hooks and chains as well as to iron brace the ladders. The village then bought an old buggy for \$10 and spent another \$10 to convert it into the village's first fire wagon. It was equipped with two extension ladders and three straight ladders. It was topped off with a number of buckets and one fire ax.

With there being no town hall, the new fire wagon was stored in a rented barn. It was presented to the newly formed "Hook and Ladder Company Number One of Lexington."

The organization was to meet and drill on a regular basis. Things went along pretty well for a couple of years until interest waned. With no big fires, the meetings became smaller unless a supply of beer was on hand, and in those cases there was possibly more conversation than practice. There was another problem. Townspeople figured the equipment belonged to the community so there was nothing wrong with borrowing the ladders, buckets, chains etc., to fix their roof or do whatever. These were often not returned with any degree of promptness which left the fire boys running all over hell to find them when needed.

Disaster struck in 1879 when village officials were notified that the fire department "had gone down" and the fire boys had sold the wagon, ladders and all the equipment. This must have hit the mayor and village officials like a thunderbolt! Enraged, they threatened legal action against the firemen but found they had given the equipment to them and it was theirs to do what they pleased.

An effort was made to pass a tax to buy fire equipment and build a station, but nothing was ever done. It was reported in 1881 that no fire organization or equipment existed. That all came to roost on Sunday morning, July 12, 1885. *The Mansfield Herald* carried this account:

"The little village of Lexington was early Sunday morning visited by a conflagration, the largest ever seen there. About half past one fire was discovered in the second story of the building occupied by Maxwell and Shauck, as a bakery and provision store. A general alarm was given and all the bells in the village were rung. The citizens all turned out and formed a bucket brigade and went to work to quell the flames. The fire spread very quickly and, as the fire equipment of the little village was exceedingly limited, all efforts proved futile.


"A telegram was sent to Mansfield for their fire department and they responded quickly, but as there is no locomotive here on the B&O that could be used, considerable time was consumed waiting on a north bound freight train, and after it reached here it started for the scene with one flat car and Mansfield's fire department. It made the run of nine miles in eight minutes, a remarkably fast time.

"When the department arrived there it was to late to be of much service, as the whole block had been destroyed."

Everything from the brick building next to present day Kell Hardware to the junction of Delaware Street had been leveled. It was agreed that had the town had proper fire equipment available, the destruction could have ended at the hardware store.

Surprisingly the town did little to improve its fire fighting capabilities even after major fires in 1899 of the Baughman Saloon and Pool Room, (men saved the pool tables just in time), the Sowers Grain Warehouse in 1905 and the huge three story Frye Candy Factory in 1907, the biggest building in town.

The latter employed a good many women, the biggest employer in Lexington. The village leaders seemed to just roll over and go back to sleep. Little effort for fire safety was made. But bad days were coming.

The sequel to the popular video game movie *Sonic the Hedgehog 2* is now available to stream on the Paramount+ streaming service. Jim Carrey returns as the evil Dr. Robotnik as Sonic and newcomer Tails take their human counterparts, including a returning James Marsden, on a new adventure. Robotnik has a sidekick this time in the form of Knuckles, a dangerous and powerful echidna voiced by Idris Elba.

The first Sonic movie was a great deal of fun as it re-introduced the classic Sega Genesis video game character and gave him a neat adventure to go on. The sequel is pretty good although not quite as good as the original.

The beginning of the movie is very funny as Robotnik is on the mushroom planet and there are all sorts of clever mushroom puns. The main plot is fine though there is a great deal going on at several points in the movie and gets a little too ambitious for its two hour runtime.

There are some nice moments between the animated and human characters and Jim Carrey again is the star of the show as Robotnik as he is the closest to his early characters that are so memorable from those 90s movies.


Overall, *Sonic 2* is a fun movie that kids will surely love and adults will enjoy some of the references throughout, there is just something missing from this one that is not quite there.

This is a divided review as there is fun to be had and definitely worth seeing for Carrey's great villain.

Romanchuk secures \$1.9 million for key Richland County projects

State Senator Mark Romanchuk (R-Ontario) voted yes on the state's capital budget, a \$3.5 billion investment in Ohio's infrastructure and local community projects.

The legislature generally approves a capital budget every two years, and the bill funds needed improvements to public services and facilities across the state, including schools, roads and bridges, and mental health and addiction facilities.

Mark Romanchuk secured more than \$1.9 million in funding for multiple projects across Richland County.

Also under the bill Ohio State Mansfield will get \$1,070,000 for on campus projects, and North Central Technical College will get \$1,898,106 for campus projects.

"I am very pleased these projects received funding in this year's Capital Budget," Senator Romanchuk said. "These projects will bolster our communities."

Projects that have secured funding in Richland include: Ohio Bird Sanctuary \$600,000; Mansfield Regional Behavioral Center \$400,000; Richland County Agricultural Society Show Arena \$200,000; Mansfield B&O Trail Connector \$150,000; Historic Ohio State Reformatory Tour Site Upgrade and Expansion \$150,000; Mansfield Central Park \$150,000; Village of Bellville Historic Bandstand Renovations \$100,000; Mansfield Sterkel Park \$100,000; Mansfield Art Center Pavilion \$50,000; and Plymouth Mary Fate Park \$25,000

The Capital Budget will go to the governor's desk for signing.

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Richland County Foundation grants close to \$7.3M

During the Richland County Foundation annual meeting held recently President Brady Groves reported the Foundation granted \$7,299,660 in 2021.

Donors continued to be very generous and gifts for the year totaled \$4,546,760.

Foundation donors were most passionate about supporting children/family/youth with grants totaling \$1,572,301. Other sectors receiving grants were arts and culture \$1,669,474, community \$1,465,296, education 1,198,049, human services \$659,951, environment 391,035, economic development \$158,390, health services \$83,097, and churches \$102,067. Guest speaker Mansfield Police Chief Keith Porch spoke about the recently installed MILO de-escalation unit. The City of Mansfield received a grant to help fund the simulator which will provide officers opportunities to practice de-escalation techniques with real-time feedback. The MPD also will utilize the equipment for community outreach.

Guest speaker Area Agency on Aging District 5 Vice President of Outreach and Development Nicole Williams spoke about a senior housing complex that is under construction. Grants were awarded for the Ritter's Run project on Ohio Street in Mansfield, a ranch-style apartment complex designed to serve low-income adults ages 55 and older. The handicap accessible development will include support services, affordable rent, utilities, appliances, and off-street parking.

During the business portion of the meeting Aaron Williams, Pastor of Maddox Memorial Church of God in Christ, and Dakota Durbin, Vice President of Private Banking, and Investment Services Manager at Mechanics Bank, were approved as incoming Board of Trustee members.

Beth DeLaney and Debbi Adams retired from the board and were recognized for their dedication and service to the Foundation and the community.

SHANE'S CHICKEN TORTELLINI SOUP

Ingredients

- 1 onion chopped
- 2 Tbsp. chopped garlic
- 3 carrots chopped
- 32 oz chicken stock
- 2 cups water
- 3 Tbsp. tomato paste
- Salt & pepper
- 2 roma tomatoes
- A couple handfuls of fresh spinach
- 1 package spinach and cheese tortellini
- 1 lb. chicken breast cooked and cubed (or rotisserie chicken)



Instructions

In a soup pot, heat some olive oil and sauté onion and garlic for 3-5 minutes. Add chicken and carrots and continue to sauté for a few more minutes, then add tomatoes and spinach and stir around until spinach is wilted.

Add tomato paste and stir to combine. Next add in the water and the chicken broth. Add the Tortellini about 10-15 minutes before serving.

 - Mansfield Central Park, \$150,000 granted to upgrade park grounds and facilities
 - Ohio State University Mansfield, \$1.7 million granted to update elevators, make roof and HVAC improvements and improve bike and pedestrian safety
 - North Central State College, \$1.7 granted to complete some basic building renovations as well as upgrade the IT systems on campus and complete numerous infrastructure advancements

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Ohio EPA offering grants

Ohio EPA is accepting grant applications for water quality project proposals through July 6, 2022. The grant funding is being made available through Section 319 of the Federal Clean Water Act.

The Agency anticipates approximately \$500,000 in federal money will be available to local governments, park districts, soil and water conservation districts, and other organizations to implement projects that improve and protect water quality and water resources in Ohio.

The projects should address nonpoint source-related impairments of water resources, including nutrients, habitat, hydromodification, and sediment. The projects must be identified in a watershed-based plan known as a Nine-Element Nonpoint Source Implementation Strategy.

Examples of eligible projects are provided in the Request-for-Proposals. Many communities have used these funds to implement agricultural nutrient reduction or water management practices (e.g. drainage water management, saturated buffers, wetland treatment systems, and two-stage ditches), stream restoration, acid mine drainage abatement, stormwater quality retrofits, and more.

Local participants may (but are not required to) provide match through cash and/or in-kind services. Ohio is providing the necessary match through state-funded projects. Applicants may apply for 60 percent to 100 percent of the total project cost. Projects have a maximum three-year period for completion.

RPH hosts health screenings

Richland Public Health is offering free health screenings and COVID-19 vaccinations and boosters for anyone 18 years or older. Thursday, June 30 from 10 am to 2 pm at the NECIC Neighborhood Outreach Center, 486 Springmill St., Mansfield. Call 419-774-4710 for an appointment to minimize wait time.

Health screenings are designed to help monitor and maintain a healthy, safe and productive lifestyle. High blood pressure is a risk factor for cardiovascular disease and one cause of high blood sugar is diabetes. Blood pressure and blood sugar checked can be checked free of charge at the screening. Cholesterol checks are available at the health screening for \$12 cash or check. A 9-hour fast is required.

Anyone over the age of 18 can get any dose or booster of the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine for free at this clinic. All individuals getting their first dose will receive a \$100 Visa gift card. Free COVID-19 test kits will be available.

All vaccinations and health screenings will be provided by public health nurses from Richland Public Health. Those attending should bring a photo ID, vaccination record (if they have one) and insurance card (if they have one).
