Springfield Township Fire Department awarded \$156,500 grant by AFG

The Springfield Township Fire Department was recently awarded \$156,500 by the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). This grant funding is for the Springfield Township Fire Department to purchase Diesel Exhaust removal systems for our two stations. National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) recently undertook two extensive studies focused on firefighter cancer and concluded that firefighters face a nine percent increase in cancer diagnoses, and a 14 percent increase in cancer-related deaths, compared to the general population in the U.S.

According to the International Association of Firefighters, cancer has surpassed heart disease as the leading cause of death among firefighters. Between Jan. 1, 2002 and March 31, 2017, 61 percent of career firefighter line-of-duty deaths occurred due to cancer, compared to 18 per-

cent from heart disease in the same time frame. Cancer research drove the push to try and protect our members from any hazards that we could in the station. This award is the first federal (AFG) grant received in the history of the department.

The primary goal of the Assistance to Firefighters Grants Program (AFG) is to enhance the safety of the public and firefighters with respect to fire-related hazards by providing direct financial assistance to eligible fire departments. The (AFG) program has been in place since 2001.

Springfield Township Fire Department was established in 1948 and operates full-time from two Fire/EMS Stations. Covering 50.6 square miles, including the City of Ontario, Springfield, and Sandusky Townships.

The department protects over 12,068 residents and thousands of visitors daily to our many shopping, entertainment, service, and restaurant establishments in the City of Ontario.

It's amazing that at 91 years old, the great Clint Eastwood is still out there making movies. His newest film, *Cry Macho*, gives Eastwood a good role to play though the movie itself is pretty boring and maybe could have been more effective with a younger actor who could have made the movie move quicker and be a little more exciting.

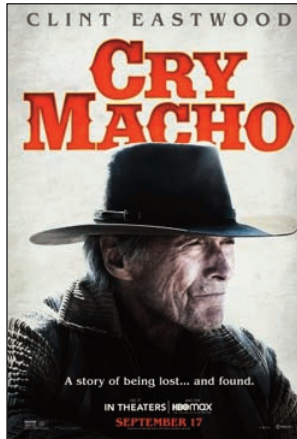
Eastwood stars as Mike Milo, a rodeo star who was injured due to a broken back and is being asked by his old boss (Dwight Yoakam) to drive to Mexico to pick up and bring back his young son Rafo (Eduardo Minetti). The other men who have gone down did not make it back and Milo is being tracked by the local police the whole time causing him to maneuver and hide out until reaching the Texas border.

The main plot to *Cry Macho* is an interesting one and Eastwood turns in a good performance but almost seems too old for this particular role and not sure the role fits him as well as it would have been for

someone a little younger. Arnold Schwarzenegger was originally attached and not sure he would have been the best choice either. The movie itself suffers from just being too boring. There are long stretches where not much happens and at the end it does not become one of his movies most people will come back to.

Eastwood is a legend and a personal favorite director. *Cry Macho* is enjoyable at times and the relationship between Eastwood and young Eduardo Minetti is very genuine and some more of that would have been nice. This movie is not a total loss; it just feels pretty empty at the end and not something re-watchable like

shown to improve student achievement, student behavior and school climate.

In 2015, Ohio PBIS Network first recognized schools that were model examples of strong PBIS. In 2021, Mifflin Elementary School applied and earned the bronze level. They are one of 354 award-winning schools to be recognized at any of the levels gold (34), silver (70) or bronze (233).

I began taking pictures of different things that caught my eye when a nice, older gentleman struck up a conversation with me. There was a special kind of tenderness in his eyes that I couldn't quite grasp.

He went on and on about what a wonderful place this was. Tim Butcher visits a couple times in the fall, making the trip from his home in West Virginia, two hours away. He shared with me all the things I must try, especially the fresh apple cider. He said, "you'll never taste apple cider more pure and refreshing than this apple cider. It will make you feel good inside after drinking it!" I went over to where they had free samples of this famous cider. He was certainly correct! It was so refreshing and delicious. You'll definitely want to try this unpasteurized, naturally sweetened cider if you decide to make your way to Hillcrest Orchard. Tim Butcher stocks up on pumpkins, mums, apple cider and more to take back to his family and friends in West Virginia. He also told me about the lookout deck around back where you can get a breathtaking view of the apple orchard and Mud Valley. He said the Honey Crisp apples were especially yummy!

After taking a bunch of photos and realizing why Tim Butcher loved this place so much, we ran across each other for one final time before heading out. This was when we had the most special of conversations. He shared with me that his wife Diane of 40 years passed away 5 years ago. They used to travel here every year and it was something they really enjoyed doing together. High school sweethearts,

they were the best of friends! She passed away from a rare platelet disease called ITP, where the final year of her life caused her to develop dementia. She would get confused and no longer be able to verbalize much.

On Tim and Diane's last trip to Amish country in the fall of 2016, the whole way from West Virginia, Diane kept whispering I love you over and over again. She could not articulate her husband's name, but she could express her deep love for him. Deep down inside her, Diane appreciated this one last trip to Amish country with her love. That's when Tim's words had me all choked up:

"Love stands the test of time. Love doesn't come from your head; it comes from your heart. God's love in Diane shined through her dementia."

Tim and I had a special, kindred bond that can only be explained by our mutual relationship with our Heavenly Father. Our meeting one another, at the same time, and the same place, was definitely no coincidence. God ordained this meeting of two strangers, now friends. As tears filled our eyes, we said our goodbyes. That's when he pointed to the sky, and said, "I'll see you again someday."

I hope this story allows Diane Butcher's legacy to live on. I didn't just meet Tim that day; I met Diane, as I could feel her looking down on us and smiling. May it inspire you to hold your loved ones close today and always say, over and over again, I love you.

Hillcrest Orchard is a family-owned orchard which features home-grown apples and the best sweet apple cider you'll ever taste. 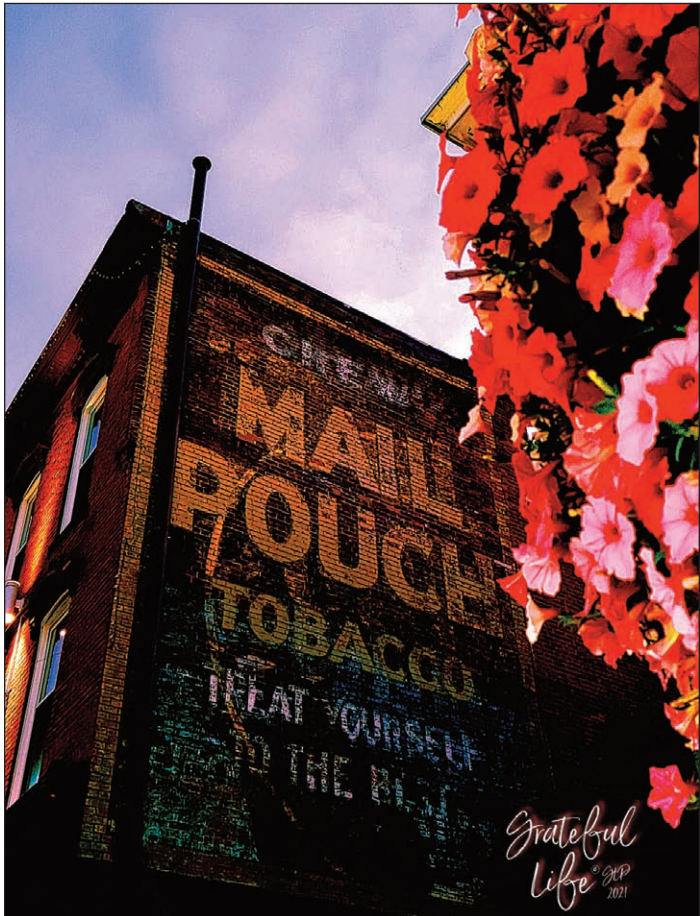

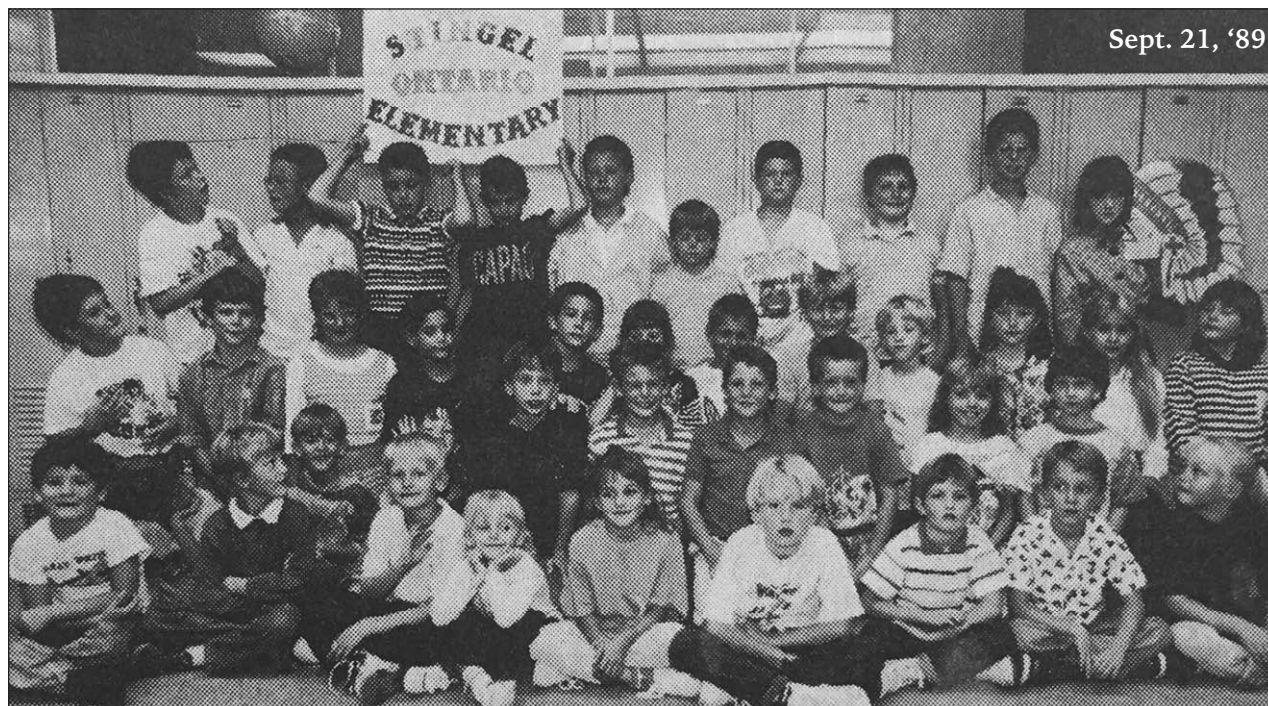

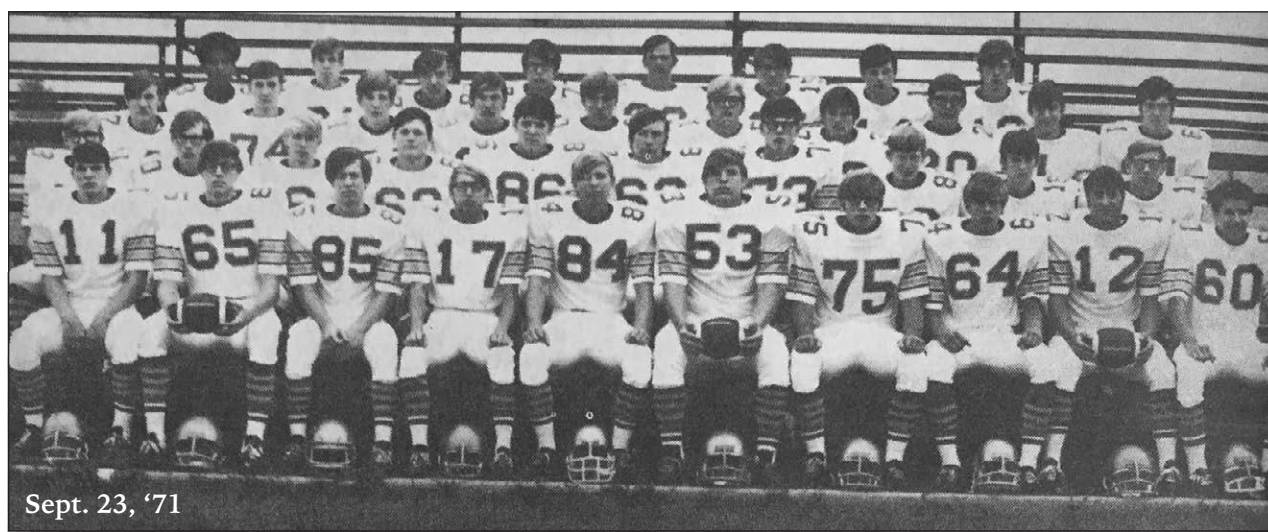

Sept. 23, 1846 — German astronomer Johann Gottfried Galle discovers the planet Neptune at the Berlin Observatory. Neptune, generally the eighth planet from the sun, was postulated by the French astronomer Urbain-Jean-Joseph Le Verrier, who calculated the approximate location of the planet by studying gravity-induced disturbances in the motions of Uranus. On September 23, 1846, Le Verrier informed Galle of his findings, and the same night Galle and his assistant Heinrich Louis d'Arrest identified Neptune at their observatory in Berlin. Noting its movement relative to background stars over 24 hours confirmed that it was a planet. The blue gas giant, which has a diameter four times that of Earth, was named for the Roman god of the sea. It has eight known moons, of which Triton is the largest, and a ring system containing three bright and two dim rings. It completes an orbit of the sun once every 165 years. In 1989, the U.S. planetary spacecraft Voyager 2 was the first human spacecraft to visit Neptune. *Source: History.com*

Voter registration deadline approaching for general election

The deadline to register to vote or change an address and/or name in the voter registration database for the Nov. 2, 2021, General Election is Monday, Oct. 4. The Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm.

The office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave. Suite 101 in the Longview Center. After 4 pm, visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner.

Qualifications for registering include:

- must be either a native U. S. citizen, or a naturalized citizen of the U.S.
- must be a resident of Richland County and Ohio 30 days prior to an election
- must be a minimum of 18 years of age on or before the date of the General Election on Nov. 2, 2021

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters who are currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov but must do it by the Oct. 4 deadline. Online registration is also now available at VoteOhio.gov

In addition to the Board of Elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at the following locations in Richland County:

- Any library branch
- All city and village hall offices
- The Bureau of Motor Vehicles Office
- The Department of Human Services

•The Richland County Courthouse (recorder or treasurer offices)

•All area high school offices

Registration forms may also be obtained at vote.richlandcountyoh.gov or can be requested by mail. Contact the board office at 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days prior to Election Day.

Ontario Local Schools, Madison Local Schools, Lexington Local Schools and Clear Fork Valley Local Schools will all have candidates running for school board.

Richland County will have candidates for Mid Ohio Educational Service Center for members of the Governing Board, Richland County District.

Washington Township will have an election for trustees as will Troy Township, Springfield Township, Jefferson Township and Madison Township. Candidates will also run for trustee in Perry Township and Mifflin Township. Madison Township will have a candidate for fiscal officer.

The Village of Lexington and the Village of Bellville will have candidates for member of council. The City of Ontario will have candidates for mayor, president of council, auditor, treasurer, director of law and council at large. Among the local issues on the ballot are a tax levy replacement for the Village of Bellville and a tax levy renewal for Village of Lexington.

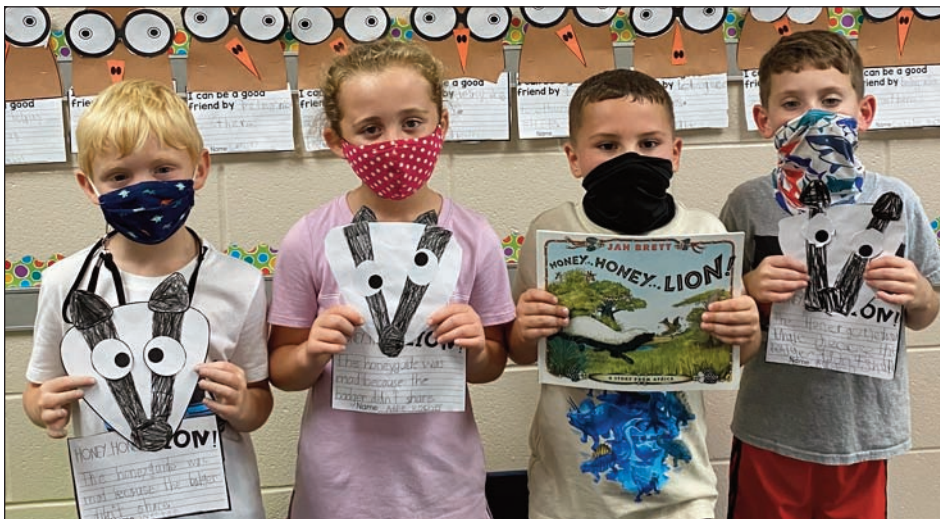
