Pollworker training session date approaching

The Richland County Board of Elections needs additional poll workers for the March 17 Primary Election. Many of the regular workers are "snowbirds" who are in warmer climate areas for the winter months.

The board has scheduled a class for new precinct election officials (poll workers) for Wednesday, Feb. 26, at 6 pm at the Longview Center, 1495 W. Longview Ave., Mansfield, in the upper level classroom.

Those participating should enter through the front entrance from the main front parking area, the classroom will be on the right, past the elevators. The class will consist of an overview of the electoral process and should last approximately two and a half hours. A brief presentation will be included to demonstrate how to set up the voting equipment. Attendees will receive \$25 with their first check for working the polls and attending this class.

Additionally, the new workers will be required to attend a station training class in this same classroom, which will offer hands-on experience for each facet of the voting process. Persons who attend will be compensated \$15 with their check for working the polls, issued after the election. The class times and dates will be distributed at the poll worker class.

Most new poll workers are considered substitute pollworkers. They will be assigned in case of a vacancy in a precinct polling place. The board tries to place workers as near as possible to their home area, but sometimes it's necessary to ask them to travel to another part of the county.

Each polling precinct is staffed by one Precinct Election Official - Presiding Judge (PEO-PJ), who is considered to be the lead poll worker, one Precinct Election Official - Presiding Assistant (PEO-PA) who must accompany the PJ back to the office with the equipment and ballots after the polls close, and two Precinct Election Officials-Clerks (PEO-Clerk). Vote centers, which are polling places with more than one precinct, will also have a Voting Location Manager (VLM) to oversee the entire location. Usually the more experienced workers are assigned as a VLM or PJ. An equal number of poll workers from each party must be assigned to each precinct.

VLMs are paid \$175; PJs, \$165; PA, \$140; and Clerks \$130; plus their training compensation. No taxes, social security, or other deductions are taken out of these checks. Contact the BOE office at 419-774-5530 to sign up for the class, or to ask any questions.

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

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

After measuring the distance the impulse travels from their arm to spine, students can calculate the speed of voluntary and involuntary nerve impulses using the formula for speed.

During Humphrey's time at Ashland County Health Department, she implemented foundational plans such as Quality Improvement (QI), Community Health Improvement, Strategic Planning, and Performance Management (PM) while overseeing a budget of \$1.1 million.

While Health Commissioner, Humphrey facilitated the collaboration of the Ashland City Council and Ashland County General Health District to reduce cost and service redundancy to create one Health Department in Ashland. She then oversaw technological advancements to more efficiently and effectively provide services to the public.

Humphrey graduated from The Ohio State University in March 1999 with a BS in Animal Science from the College of Food, Agriculture, and Environmental Sciences. She began her career in public health as an Environmental Health Specialist and Registered Sanitarian for Holmes County General Health District from 2001 to 2003 and again from 2009 to 2012. She became a Tier 2 Epidemiologist in Holmes County from 2012 to 2016 while completing her Masters of Public Health (MPH) from the University of South Florida in December of 2015.

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Unbeaten Lucas pulls out thriller at O'Rena

ONTARIO — It was the last of three straight nonconference games in the same week featuring battles with former foes of the previous three leagues of which OHS was a member. This was a throwback to the old NCC, but this one didn't turn out as well as the other two. It was very similar to the turn of the century season when Ontario and Lucas locked horns twice for NCC supremacy and each won a one possession game on the other's court. This game was at OHS and again Lucas won a thriller although the score was about 20 points lower each way than it was in 1999-2000.

The undefeated Cubs rallied over the final four possessions of the contest to wrest a 53-50 victory from the Warriors who led 48-47 for a good stretch in the middle of the fourth quarter.

It started out like it would be the shootout of 20 years ago with three lead changes and four ties before the Cubs won the opening segment 18–17. Kolten Kurtz erased much of the Lucas 28–19 advantage scoring seven of his 10 points in the fray during this period, getting OHS as close as 31-29 when he ripped the cords from way out front.

The Warriors finally regained the lead 39-36 on a Shaquan Coburn trey in the middle of the third. Lucas responded with seven consecutive points and held command until a Griffin Shaver long shot with one second left hit the mark for a 44-43 home team edge. One point leads were the norm in the last stanza, but Ontario let it slip away at the foul line where up until then the locals were almost perfect but missed them all down the stretch.

Riley Gossom became a nightmare for the Warriors to defend driving the paint. He tallied all but one of the Cub counters in the period. Kurtz stuffed him near the hoop after he rallied Lucas to a 47-46 advantage. He didn't drive the lane for a while and Coburn put OHS back up 48-47 on a second shot possession. Finally, the guests called timeout and went back to Gossom. His two back to back layups had the Warriors on the brink. They missed a golden opportunity on a four shot series in the final minute. Jon Nagel grabbed an errant shot and was fouled on the putback to cut the gap to 52–50. His free throw missed but a teammate nabbed the rebound. The front end of a one and one was missed and again OHS scarfed up the rebound. This time the hosts turned it over and Gossom got the first free throw to fall when he was deliberately sent to the stripe. That gave Ontario time to set up a tying three pointer, but Lucas savagely defended the arc and no one could get an open look. Shaver was blanketed on his desperation trey at the buzzer which was wide of the mark.

The Warriors connected nine times from 20 feet or more, but the Cubs were hot inside, cashing 19 of 35 twos. Nagel was the lone local to have a good shooting night making 3 of 4. He earned off the bench honors. Jon was also best on the boards nudging out Shaver 9-8. Amil Upchurch and Coburn each collared six rebounds while Nolan Payne nabbed five. Coburn nipped Shaver for top scoring slot on the Warrior side of the ledger 15–13. Griffin was accorded coach Joe Balogh's defensive player award. He and Kurtz both pilfered the Cubs thrice.
