The same trees that welcome visitors with a stunning show each fall are behind a day packed with free events and experiences at the annual Malabar Farm Maple Syrup Festival, held from noon to 4 pm March 7–8 and 14–15.

Visitors will see firsthand how sap is collected from Ohio maple trees and transformed into maple syrup. Live historical and fiber art demonstrations offer opportunities for travelers to immerse themselves in age-old traditions that date back to the earliest Native Americans.

Historical reenactors will demonstrate early sugaring

Historical reenactors will demonstrate early sugaring techniques, through present-day maple production. A self-guided tour of the sugar camp and sugarhouse will reveal the evolution of sugaring equipment and how it's used to create syrup, highlighted by samples of just-made real maple syrup. Walk-thru tours of the Big House introduce visitors to the history of Malabar Farm, while food and maple products are offered to taste, and to purchase to take home. Activities will take place throughout Malabar Farm State Park, including horse-drawn wagon rides.

DeWine warns of scams targeting senior citizens

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine and Ohio Department of Insurance Director Jillian Froment issued a consumer alert to warn older Ohioans of two telephone scams targeting them in an attempt to steal their personal information

"Unfortunately, older adults are one of the most targeted groups for scammers," Governor DeWine said. "We want to make sure older Ohioans are armed with the information they need to protect themselves in case they receive a suspicious call."

"We have been informed by several of our stakeholder partners of scams seeking to take advantage of our older Ohioan population," Froment said. "I urge people to be extremely cautious when deciding to share their personal information and to consider contacting organizations directly to initiate conversation and information sharing."

Medicare beneficiaries are receiving recorded phone calls that appear on caller ID as if they are from the Social Security Administration (SSA). The message states that the person's SSA account has been suspended and to press 1 for more information. Pressing 1 does connect the person with the SSA but a scammer is on the line ready to steal personal information the person may share with the SSA.

The SSA will not call a beneficiary unless the person requested a call from the SSA. A beneficiary can always call the SSA at 1-800-269-0271 to verify the legitimacy of a situation they encounter. Additional information is available at https://faq.ssa.gov/en-us/Topic/article/KA-10018.

The second scam is aimed at members of the Ohio Public Employee Retirement System (OPERS). Members are receiving phone calls from a scammer saying they are with VIA Benefits and are in need of personal information to establish the member's prepaid funeral account. VIA Benefits, which does provide certain insurance services, is not making such calls. Members who receive these calls can call VIA Benefits at 1-844-287-9945 or OPERS at 1-800-222-7377.

The Ohio Department of Insurance provides educational information for Medicare beneficiaries through its Ohio Senior Health Insurance Information Program, regulates insurance products, and monitors the marketplace for insurance fraud and professional misconduct, among many other duties

Ohioans can call the department's fraud and enforcement hotline at 1-800-686-1527 or contact non-profit Pro Seniors and its fraud-fighting Ohio Senior Medicare Patrol at 1-800-488-6070 if they suspect wrongdoing or have been victimized.

THE OLD ENGLEHART BUILDING (1974) — The big old 1843 red brick building east of the Lexington town square has quite a history. It was built by Peter Englehart as a combination home and business for the family. The Englehart General Store was on the east side and he rented overnight bedrooms on the second floor. His store sold nearly everything the customers might need, from dry goods to produce and even rented horses and wagons. He also sold vast amounts of whiskey and beer over the counter but did not run a saloon. In 1855, he purchased for resale nearly 5,000 gallons of whiskey and beer. A 40 gallon barrel of whiskey cost \$12 and a barrel of beer was \$5-\$8. If present proprietors Nickel and Bean Coffee Shop could still buy at those prices, business would surely boom.



The Richland County Dementia Capable Coalition, under the leadership of the Alzheimer's Association Northwest Ohio Chapter, will hold an educational program on the topic of effective communication strategies for families, friends and anyone impacted by the disease.

The hour-long event will be Monday, March 30, 2:30 pm at Primrose Retirement Community, 1301 Millsboro Rd. It is free and open to the public.

Individuals living with dementia often experience changes in behavior that can be confusing to friends and family.

For caregivers, learning to decode messages through attitude, tone of voice, facial expressions and body language can help both parties to connect and communicate in meaningful ways.

Effective Communication Strategies is a program provided by the Alzheimer's Association® that explores how communication takes place when someone has Alzheimer's disease. By the end of the program, attendees will be able to:

•Explain the communication changes that take place throughout the course of the disease.

 Decode the verbal and behavioral messages delivered by someone with dementia and respond in ways that are helpful to the person.

•Identify strategies to connect and communicate at each stage of the disease.

Effective Communication Strategies includes video interviews with professionals who explain critical aspects of communication throughout the Alzheimer's journey, and caregivers who share tips that have worked for their families.

"Holding a conversation with our loved ones with Alzheimer's disease can be a challenge" says Pam Myers, Program Director of the Chapter. "This program provides many suggestions and tips on how to enjoy your time with them versus being angry and frustrated".

Richland County Foundation awards grants totaling \$2,315,102

of Trustees approved grants totaling \$2,315,102 during its February meeting.

The foundation will celebrate its 75th Anniversary this year with free community events throughout Richland County. Grants were awarded to various nonprofit organizations to host the free events. Details on how to attend the free events will be released in April.

The Board approved a five-year, \$1.5M investment plan for Mansfield Rising projects. This year money has been allocated to improve facades on existing businesses, increase the number of public restrooms, public art and free public Wi-Fi. The foundation is seeking partners to help fund and work on Mansfield Rising projects. To review the plan, go to richlandcountyfoundation.org and click the Community Impact tab.

Four career technical education scholarships were approved for students to earn certifications and credentials at technical institutions. The Scholarship Committee implemented a rolling deadline for CTE scholarships to meet various enrollment deadlines. "Sometimes, youth aging out of foster care may not have had a family support system," said NECIC Executive Director Deanna West-Torrence. "As they are transitioning into adulthood, home and life skills become imperative. Their table of mentors become that person's network of support."

According to TheOpenTable.org, "Each Table is composed of a group of volunteers that make a year-long commitment to act, through relationship, as a team of life specialists, encouragers, and advocates. Over the course of a year, the Table works together to set goals, foster accountability,

North End Community Improvement and implement a plan to create change."

West-Torrence explained that this is a nationwide, evidence-based model. "The outcomes are incredible," she said, "with 9 out of 10 participants staying in relationships with their table members after completion of their year in the program."

She added that one-to-one mentoring, especially with an individual with high needs, can be very heavy on one person, but this model allows a shared responsibility, creating a new family-type unit for the individual. 



Fast start gives Ontario Warriors first twin sweep of Clear Fork Colts in 25 years

ONTARIO - For the second time this season good outside shooting lifted Ontario to a big win over Clear Fork, this time at 64-48. The Warriors scorched the nets at the Colt Corral for 15 treys to open the slate. They only canned seven this round, but were hot early on while the Colts were cold from the field until after the half.

It was the first time in a quarter of a century that OHS has double swept Clear Fork, although the rivals were not members of the same conference for 38 years until both joined the MOAC three seasons ago, so it was not possible for a double sweep except for years they collided in the tournament. The locals made it to state 25 years ago, and the Colts might have done it had it not been for Warriors, who nipped them 66-64 to begin the campaign and edged them again for the district championship 74-67 in double overtime.

Griffin Shaver fired in 10 of his game high 19 points in the first quarter while Shaquan Coburn tossed in 12 of his 17 in the first half as Ontario jumped all over Clear Fork before intermission constructing a 19 point lead. Kolten Kurtz earned coach Joe Balogh's defensive player citation, holding CF sharpshooter Brennan South to just three points prior to intermission. Brady Tedrow was leading the Colts despite having only four points at the half.

South found the range in the third

stanza but the margin dwindled as much due to OHS misses at the charity stripe. Clear Fork finally cut the gap to less than 10 after Ontario's final errant free throw toss two minutes into the fourth frame. After Amil Upchurch cashed both ends of a two shot foul, Clear Fork whittled the spread to 54-47 after a South traditional three point play. But they would put only one more point on the board the remainder of the fray. Forced to pressure hard trying to cause turnovers, the visitors were burned three times down the stretch by long Shaver assists to Kurtz for fastbreak layups.

Coburn had a tremendous shooting night, cashing 3 of 4 trey tries and 4 of 5 deuces. He nearly made it a double double by ripping down nine rebounds. Shaver did reach that plateau pulling in ten boards. He also dished off eight assists and pilfered the Colts on three occasions. Ty Namenyi was accorded off the bench honors. Upchurch and Jon Nagel rejected a pair of enemy shots.

The OHS reserves got back to their winning ways drubbing the guests 53–36. Owen Hatfield was 5 for 7 from the field obtaining his 13 points. Gage Weaver drove the paint a lot and got as many counters making baskets as he did free throws to notch 12 markers. Jacob Barabani almost reached double digits with nine. Weaver swept the backboards eight times while Alex Rathburn collared five rebounds. Hatfield earned coach Tim Henige's bench

laurels leading the squad in scoring and in assists with five of those. The jayvees had a field day filching the ball from the Colts 17 times. Weaver generated five thefts with Barabani, Hatfield and Darian Delbrugge joining in three times each.

Changes made to polling locations

The Richland County Board of Elections will not be changing any polling places for the March 17 Primary Election. The only exception would be in the case of an emergency, such as a fire or other disaster at one of our voting sites. If this were to happen, the affected voters would be notified through a mailed notification, if time permits, and/or press releases and social media.

One small change was necessary at a voting location in the Ontario/Springfield Township area of the county.

Due to a scheduling conflict, for the March 17 Primary Election only, voters will need to use a different entrance to access the fellowship hall at the Ontario Christian Fellowship Church, 636 S. Lexington-Springmill Rd., for voting for this election.

Voters should still park in the back parking area. They will need to use the entrance door to the south of the door that was their previous entrance. A large "Vote Here" sign will designate the correct entrance. There are steps to go down to access the voting area, or a small elevator is available if needed.

Individual postcard notifications were mailed to each voter in the Ontario 2-A, Springfield-B and Springfield-D precincts within this location.

Additionally, the River of Life Church, 111 W. Elm St., Butler, has changed their name. This voting location for Worthington-A and Worthington-B precincts in the southern part of the county is now called The Connection Church.

Avery Coleman scores 30 in Lady Lex blitz of Rams

MADISON TOWNSHIP Coleman authored one of the finest games in the history of Lexington girls' basketball at the start of this month and did it on the visitor's home court no less at the Madison Middle School. Coleman canned 13 of her 16 field goal tries for an astounding 81 percent accuracy and meshed 4 of 5 free throws in putting 30 points on the board for Lady Lex. She outscored the Rams as a team and notched more than half of her club's counters in the 57–25 romp. Coleman yanked down 14 rebounds, seven on each end of the floor, and stole the ball four times.

The fray was close for just a couple of minutes wherein two lead changes and two ties happened. Afterward, it was all Lexington with the visitors rattling off a 28-3 rampage after the final deadlock at 5–5. The home team fared the best right after halftime when they engineered an 8–2 run that nearly allowed them to play LHS even for the third stanza. A much better job putting the ball through the hoop was the main cog in the win. The other significant statistic was the 12-0 advantage Lexington wielded on points tallied on second shot possessions.

Gabby Stover joined Coleman in producing a double double, but not in the usual way. Stover tossed in 12 points but

aided Avery's monster outing by dishing off 11 assists. Stover grabbed six rebounds and Josie Dahlinghaus nabbed five. Josie pilfered the hosts thrice. Lizzie Hamler and Coleman each smacked a Madison cast at the hoop back toward its sender.

Chesney Davis topped the Lady Rams with nine counters, four rebounds and three steals. Jennifer Wigton dropped in six points. Debra Faith Kuhn was the only other member of the home team to connect more than once from the field. Leah Boggs issued most of her squad's assists with five. Madison won the JV preliminary tiff 46–34.

LEXINGTON — Max Waldruff and Kavdan Berry both had good marksmanship in their second round matchup versus improving Ashland, leading the Minutemen to a 62-52 triumph. Waldruff used his height to great advantage pumping in 19 points on 7 for 11 shooting. He swatted a trio of Arrow scoring attempts and tied with teammate Isaiah Pack as the game's top rebounder at nine. Kaydan Berry was much hotter on the offensive end than usual, nearly pulling even with Max flipping in 18 points including success on 2 of his 3 launches from beyond the arc and went 7 of 12 overall.

Lexington won both halves 31-26 but that implies much more consistency than actually occurred. There were 13 lead changes and four ties in this debacle. Just when the Minutemen were beginning to build some cushion by the early third period a 9-0 Arrow run turned it into a dogfight again. Ashland's superb freshman Grayson Steury was a sizzling 4 for 5 from downtown and 6 of 8 overall to pace the visitors. The locals finally exploded on offense in the last period scoring 14 out of 16 points in one stretch to clinch it.

The hosts were efficient getting the ball inside where they connected almost 60 percent of the time. In contrast, Ashland had to fire up 23 long shots although they hit a respectable nine of them. Lex offset that by outscoring the Arrows in the paint 24-8. Dylan Spears was a third LHS cager in double figures at 10 while Pack just missed it with nine. Danny Shaffer ran down six rebounds and tallied a like number of points. Berry drew six fouls in the fray and handed out seven assists. He pickpocketed the guests thrice. Pack stuffed Ashland five times in the contest while Spears bashed a pair of their attempts, giving Lexington a whopping 10 blocked shots for the Tuesday evening battle.

The LHS reserve team finished out January with back to back nine point victories, taking down the Arrows 45-36 and Madison 49-40.


