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

MRCPL will open for curbside service at all locations

When Mansfield/Richland County Public Library began the journey into sheltering at home, it entered a new world of unknowns. Now that the state is looking toward the future, the library is exploring how to resume services. At the forefront of that discussion is the safety of staff and patrons.

At this time, based on recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Richland Public Health, MRCPL will not begin reopening branch locations to the public however, it will begin offering curbside service at all nine branch locations on Monday, May 18.

MRCPL will offer this convenient, new pick-up option for all card-holding patrons. Curbside service is an extension of the library's personalized services. To take advantage of this service, patrons will place their requested items "on hold" through the website or by calling their local



William B. Cockley helped to open Lexington's steam-powered flour mill

William B. Cockley had an interesting life. Born in Lexington, his father dies when he was nine and he was appendance to a wagon maker.

In 1862, he volunteered to serve in the Civil War and was with his company when they captured 2,350 Confederate prisoners at Cumberland Gap. He rose to the rank of Captain.

Mustered out in 1866, back home he married Mary Urania Beverstock whose father owned one of the general stores in Lexington. Mary was very pretty and became one of the social leaders in the community for many years.

Eventually, William took over management of the store, which held the first bank in town. Later, with partners, he built a large steam-powered flour mill next to the railroad tracks. With this great business success, he was elected and served only two years of his term in the Ohio General Assembly when he died from cancer in January 1905.

The huge mill was the first major industry in Lexington until it burned in 1917. Two of his sons were successful in banking and law.

May is National Foster Care Month

May is National Foster Care Month and this year's theme is "Foster Care: A Support to Families, Not a Substitute for Parents.'

Strengthening families and focusing on their wellbeing is the key to building strong communities. Whether it's promoting a collaborative relationship between birth parents and foster caregivers or providing parents with the right combination of supportive services to enable reunification, keeping families together is the primary goal in a successful child welfare system.

This May, National Foster Care Month recognizes that foster care must act as a support system for families, not a substitute for parents. Developing partnerships between local agencies, community organizations, and individuals within a family's network is key to building a supportive foundation that supports reunification and preservation.

The goal of Richland County Children Services (RCCS) is always reunification. RCCS has on average 100 children in custody with close to 60 foster homes. Out of the 100 children, 30 percent of them are teenagers. Families are needed for all age children, but especially for older youth. The Agency currently only has two foster homes willing to care for teens.

RCCS encourages all individuals to invest in the lives of children and to provide them with unconditional love, support, guidance, and every available resource to ensure their health and well-being.

RCCS believes every child needs a permanent home. Many of our foster parents adopt the children who are placed with them. Others help children prepare for placement with an adoptive family or relative.

Richland SWCD offering CACY accepting grant for cover crops

Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) is partnering with the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District on a grant program for producers who plant cover crops. Last year, the grant program assisted in getting cover crops on over 206.23 acres of Richland County farmland and resulted in 87 tons of soil from eroding into our streams, kept 139 pounds of phosphorous on the land and 255 pounds of nitrogen out of waterways.

The 2020 cost-share rate is \$12.00 per acre for returning applicants and \$15.00 per acre for new applicants. Interested applicants may apply through Richland SW-CD. Producers in the Rocky Fork, Black Fork, and Clear Fork watersheds are eligi-

Applications will go through a scoring process to see which fields are the most eligible. The goal is to get winter cover on fields with low residue, such as corn silage and soybeans. Therefore, low residue fields will score higher.

Some of the benefits of planting cover crops include reducing soil erosion and runoff, increasing rainfall and snow melt infiltration into the soil and increasing soil quality.

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

Quarantine Cuisine

Tired of the same old recipes? Here's some new ones to try from the T-C and local readers

Homemade Mac and Cheese Casserole

12 oz dry macaroni, ziti or penne 1/4 cup butter 1/4 cup flour

1 1/2 cups milk (I used whole milk) 1 cup light cream

(I had heavy cream. So I used ½ cup heavy cream and 2 cups milk) 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard powder

1 teaspoon onion powder

salt & pepper to taste
1 can condensed cream of cheddar soup

4 cups sharp cheddar

(I used shredded Mexican blend and had excellent results)

1/2 cup fresh parmesan cheese

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Cook macaroni to just al dente to avoid getting mushy when it's baked. Melt butter over medium heat in a large saucepan. Bake 18-24 minutes or until bubbly. Do not over cook. Cool 10-15 minutes before serving.

In a large mixing bowl, combine 2 1/4 cup flour, yeast, sugar and salt, misx well. Add water, egg and the milk mixture, beat well. Add the remaining flour, 1/2 cup at a time, stirring well after each addition. When the dough has just pulled together, turn it onto a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth, about 5 minutes. Cover the dough with a damp cloth abd let rest 10 minutes. In a small bowl mix together the brown sugar, cinnamon and 1/2 cup margarine. Roll out dough into 12x9 inch rectangle. Spread dough with margarine/sugar mixture. Sprinkle with raisins (if desired). Roll up dough and pinch seam to seal. Cut into 12 equal size rolls and place cut side up in 12 lightly greased muffin tins. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 30 minutes. Bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until browned. Remove from muffin cups to cool.

1 tbsp. cajun seasoning

3 cups long-grain rice

2 tsp. cajun pepper sauce

In a large dutch oven, heat 1 tbsp. oil over medium heat. Add sausage in batches and cook, stiring frequently until browned, 5–7 minutes. Remove and set aside. Add remaining oil to dutch oven. When oil begins to shimmer, add chicken in batches and cook, stirrng frequently, until browned on all sides, 7-9 minutes. Remove and set aside. Add vegetables, garlic and parsley to dutch oven. Cook, stirring occassionally until onion is translucent, 5–7 minutes. Stir in sausage, chicken stock and cajun seasoning; increase heat to medium-high. Bring to a boil and add rice. Return to a boil.
