

New security entrance open


Juvenile Court Judge Steve McKinley held a ribbon cutting ceremony on Friday, May 29, to officially open the court's new security entrance. The Juvenile Justice Center entrance is now manned by security officers and equipped with an x-ray scanner and a metal detector.

"The court is performing an important service in doing justice for the youth and families of our county and in making sure that our community is kept safe. To do this work effectively, the Court itself needs to be a secure place for the public to come," said Judge McKinley in his remarks. Engines ran local line from 1919–'58

February 18, 1958 was a sad day for railroad fans and a joyous occasion for engineers and fireman on the B&O railroad. The cab of a diesel was much more comfortable than a hot, dirty, smokey steam engine cab. The last steam engine on the Willard to Newark run was made on that date and renumbered B&O engine 389 would soon be retired and off to the scrap yards.

Engine 4589 was built by the baldwin Locomotive Company in February of 1919. The railroad had ordered 100 of what were named "Mickados" after a Japanese opera and all were delivered by 1919.

After the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, the name was changed to MacArthur, or as the railroaders called them "Light Mikes." The engines weighed 292,000 pounds and the tender held 16 tons of

coal and 10,000 gallons of water.

Not all folks in Lexington were fond of 4589 and her sisters. Whistles blowing and freight cars thunder-like slamming together in the middle of the night were not welcome. Wind direction at times brought coal soot to freshly washed clothes lines and unhappy mothers.

But the rail cars made deliveries to the Lexington Soy plant, Lutz Lumber Co., the Farm Bureau, Kell Hardware coal yard, Templeton Co. and the Red Head bulk gasoline and oil company. All are gone now, but the memory of a 12-year old paperboy being invited into the cab of 4589, learning what the guages, valves and levers were for and throwing a shovel-full of coal into the firebox and blowing the whistle, was truly amazing. What a thrill that was!

Engine 4589 was scrapped in October 1957 after 38 years of service. I'm still here, so is the memory.

Red Potato Salad with Dill

By Kim Sterry Who doesn't love potato salad? Red Potato Salad is always a good choice as well because you don't have to peel the potatoes, so it's a quick and easy salad to put together. If you want to kick this recipe up a bit, grill the potatoes for a few minutes after you have boiled them.

Ingredients

3 Lbs Red skinned potatoes washed and quartered 2 Bulbs of Garlic

fresh dill- USE FRESH NOT DRIED

1-8 oz. package of mascarpone cheese or cream cheese (room temperature)

olive oil Salt and Pepper

Red Pepper Flakes just a dash

Instructions

1. Bring potatoes to a boil and cook until tendermake sure you salt the water AND add to stalks of dill into the water.

2. Take off the tops of the garlic bulbs, coat with olive oil and salt, wrap in aluminum foil and roast for 30-45 minutes at 350 degrees. They should look dark brown and be very soft.

3. Remove the cloves from the bulbs and mash them up. Use a fork to remove the cloves as they will be hot.

4. When finished boiling, drain potatoes and discard the dill stalks. Then in a bowl toss the potatoes and the marscapone cheese. You want to do this while the potatoes are still very hot and steaming. (This will soften and become more creamy).

5. Toss in a few tablespoons of olive oil and salt and pepper, then take fresh dill and chop the leaves until you get a healthy 2-3 tablespoons. Add the dill, mashed garlic into the bowl and mix all together. Don't forget a wee dash of red pepper flake, just a dash we're looking for the flavor it gives not a lot of heat LIKE Kimmys Cucina on










