Bloodmobiles scheduled to help supply

Plasma from whole blood donations made through the American Red Cross that test positive for COVID-19 antibodies may now help current coronavirus patients in need of convalescent plasma transfusions. Donors are encouraged to make an appointment to give blood now to help ensure coronavirus patients and others who depend on transfusions have needed blood products this fall.

In April, the Red Cross began collecting COVID-19 convalescent plasma from previously diagnosed individuals, who could only give at one of approximately 170 Red Cross blood donation centers across the country. Convalescent plasma contains COVID-19 antibodies that may help the most critical patients actively fighting this virus. Now, whole blood donations made at any Red Cross blood drive or blood donation center could be helpful in this effort.

Donations that come back positive for COVID-19 antibodies now undergo secondary testing to confirm antibody results, and that enables the Red Cross to then potentially use the plasma from those donations for COVID-19 patients," said Rodney Wilson, communications manager for the Red Cross Central Ohio Region. "With approximately 2% of the U.S. population testing positive for COVID-19 antibodies, every donation is important to ensure patients with coronavirus have access to every treatment option available to them.'

The Red Cross encourages eligible individuals to schedule an appointment, download the free Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

Antibody testing may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus, regardless of whether an individual experienced COVID-19 symptoms. Donations are tested using samples pulled at the time of donation and sent to a testing laboratory where they will also undergo routine infectious disease testing.

COVID-19 antibody test results will be available within

one to two weeks in the Red Cross Blood Donor App or donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org. A positive antibody test result does not confirm infection or immunity. The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test.

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions – including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff - have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face covering or mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.

Items being collected include prescription pills of any kind, over the counter medications, medication samples, pet medications and vitamins.

The site will not collect needles, syringes, lancets, thermometers, aerosol cans, IV bags, hydrogen peroxide, bloody or infectious waste, empty containers and personal products such as non-medicated shampoo and soap.

Springfield Township Fire Department has approximately 300 residents in Springfield Township and the City of Ontario who participate in the Smoke Detector Program.

Although this program begins in September, it is in operation year round. Residents in the program are encouraged to contact Springfield Township Fire Department anytime throughout the year if a smoke detector is malfunctioning or signaling a low battery.

Department members not only replace batteries, they also replace non-hardwired detectors that are past the manufacturers recommended 10 year mark. It is important to check the date to determine if the smoke detector is 10 years or older. If so, a new smoke detector is needed.

Smoke Detector batteries should be changed twice a year. The department funds the program with donations and contributions of batteries as well as smoke detectors from The Modern Woodmen of Aerica, Sam's Club, Lowe's, Home Depot, Target and Walmart. Enola summons her brothers Sherlock (Henry Cavill) and Mycroft (Sam Claflin). Enola becomes a detective in her own right while trying to find her mother.

Brown is perfectly cast in this role as are Cavill and Claflin as her brothers. It's

interesting to see this story from a different point of view. The costumes and dialogue are quite good but the movie never really took off in the way it could have. There is a great deal of coming of



age with Enola which is certainly understandable but there are quite a bit of mother/daughter flashbacks that takes away from the continuity of

the story. There is nothing really wrong with the movie as it has everything you want in a Sherlock Holmes story; it's just that nothing seemed new or terribly exciting. There are some engaging action scenes, especially one on a train, but those are too few and far in between. Enola Holmes is a good effort and as much as it does right unfortunately just becomes rather underwhelming for too much of its run time.

Federal Funds from ODOT help to enhance mobility in Richland County

Richland County Regional Planning Commission (RCRPC) Executive Director Jotika Shetty announced the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) awarded \$57,615 in federal transportation Ohio's funding for Specialized Transportation (5310) Program to Regional Planning for federal fiscal year 2021.

These grant funds will be used to continue to assist in financing coordination projects of the Richland County "Mobility Management" program, and enhance mobility efforts in our community.

"These funds allow our Mobility Manager, Lyndsie Martin, to continue to coordinate county-wide transportation services between local human service agencies and transportation providers"," said Ms. Shetty.

RCRPC serves as the broker between human service agencies such as the Area Agency on Aging and Richland Newhope Industries, Inc. and transportation providers scheduling trips, determining transportation options that meet specific needs of their consumers and handling all invoicing and billing between the two.

RCRPC completed the Public Transit-Human Service Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan) as part of the 5310 grant requirements. The purpose of this

plan is to identify community resources for transportation and mobility, to understand the gaps and unmet needs within those resources, and to determine the approach to addressing those gaps and needs. ODOT uses this Coordinated Plan to ensure that requested projects address identified unmet needs and are in compliance with Federal Transit law and guidance.

Warning signs of suicide:

- •Talking about wanting to die or to kill ones self
- •Looking for a way to kill one-self

•Talking about feeling trapped or being in unbearable pain

- •Talking about being a burden to others •Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs
- •Acting anxious, agitated or reckless
- •Sleeping too little or too much
- •Withdrawing or feeling isolated

•Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge •Displaying extreme mood swings

What to do if you notice these signs in others: •Demonstrate true care, concern and compassion for them and their pain by listening to them.

•Tell them suicidal thinking passes and it can get better. •Get help- contact a doctor, take them to a hospital, find others to help.

 Create a safe environment by removing lethal access to means.

•Stay with them. Don't leave someone suicidal alone. What to do if you notice these signs in yourself:

•Talk to someone. Be honest and tell them what you're thinking.

•Remember that suicidal thinking doesn't last forever. •Get help by calling a suicidal hotline, 1-800-273-8255 or text Hello to 741741, or go to a hospital.

•Do something you enjoy. ex listen to music, exercise, call a friend

•Find someone to be with. This is not a time to be alone

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


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Memorial concert is Sunday




