

First grade students receive books in celebration of Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month

With the ongoing concerns of COVID-19, Richland Newhope was not able to celebrate March Awareness in the traditional manner. One of this year's awareness activities included a book distribution to celebrate Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month with the local schools.

Newhope distributed a book about inclusion to all public and private first grade students in Richland County. With the help from Scholastic, Richland County Youth and Family Council and United Way's Big Red Bookshelf, Newhope was able to order and distribute 1,400 copies of the book *Strictly No Elephants* written by Lisa Mantchev.

Strictly No Elephants is about the local Pet Club that won't admit a boy's tiny pet elephant, so he finds a solution — he creates a pet club that doesn't exclude any pet. This is an excellent book for young readers about inclusion, friendship, and acceptance. It is a smart, funny and an easy read.

The Community Education Department reached out to the author, Lisa Mantchev, to share with her the event involving her book. Lisa stated, "Thank you so much for sharing the fantastic work your organization is doing, as well as the pictures of all the amazing students. My heart was truly warmed by this news, and the tiny elephant who lives in my office is waving a greeting to all his new friends!"

When asked about the books, Butler Elementary received, principal Libby Nickoli stated, "We are so thankful for Richland Newhope's donation of *Strictly No Elephants* to our first graders. This story about inclusion allows our teachers to create meaningful discussions through pictures and storytelling. Ontario spring limb clean-up to start next week

The City of Ontario will be offering spring limb cleanup the weeks of April 12–23. Crews will make one pass along all city streets during the two weeks to collect branches and sticks that accumulated through the winter months.

Residents are asked to limit items to less than 6" in diameter, and only debris from winter conditions; no leaves, yard clippings, or branches resulting from tree/shrub trimming. The city will not follow a set schedule, so make sure debris is at the curb on Sunday, April 11.

In addition to this service, Ontario is partnering with a number of student organizations from Ontario High

School to provide litter pick-up along the Lexington-Springmill Rd. corridor. Amy Nagel, Ontario Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator, is recruiting students from No Use, Inc., Student Council, FCCLA and Key Club to assist with this event, Thursday, April 22. Nagel has been very instrumental in the success of this program, now in its seventh year.

Absentee and early voting has begun

Absentee/Early voting commenced Tuesday, April 6, by mail and in person at the Richland County Board of Elections, 1495 W. Longview Ave., in the lower level classroom. The closest entrance is in the back of the Longview Center by the "Vote Here" sign and flag.

Those who enter through the front entrance must take the stairs or elevator down to the lower level. Those who have requested absentee ballots by mail will have their ballot mailed out starting April 6. Absentee applications to vote by mail are available at https://www.richlandcountyoh.gov/departments/public_administration/board_of _elections/absentee_voting.php or by calling the office at 419-774-5530.

Early voting dates are: April 6–23, 8 am to 5 pm, each weekday; April 26–30, 8 am to 7 pm each weekday; Saturday, May 1, 8 am to 4 pm; Sunday, May 2, 1–5 pm; Monday, May 3, 8 am to 2 pm; and Election Day, May 4, polls open 6:30 am to 7:30 pm

Voters in the City of Mansfield may request a republican or an issues only ballot. No democratic ballot is available since candidates were unopposed and nominated on through to the general without a primary. Voters in the City of Ontario will only have the charter issue and charter candidates on their ballot. Their only choice is an issues only ballot. Voters in the Village of Cass and the Village of Plymouth and Washington Township will only have an issue on their ballots will be given an issues only ballot. No other precincts in Richland County will be open for voting on May 4,,

The only procedure available under Ohio Election Laws to change a party affiliation is to request the party's ballot in a primary. It does not matter which party a voter is currently affiliated with in their voter registration records. The voter simply states to the poll worker which ballot they want to cast for that election.

The Little Yellow Baskets

A new building on an old foundation brought back a business that had burned to the ground in 1907.

George Frye's Caramel and Condensed Milk factory was only partially insured but he managed to erect, replace and expand his building in 1908. His factory employed many local men and women and possibly, because his father was a minister in that era, he kept them separated.

Most women were the caramel wrappers and candy makers while the men were doing the heavier tasks with the milk. The factory was one of the first big employers in Lexington at that time.

\$8,000 worth of copper boilers, machinery and galvanized tanks for the milk went into the three-story building. The employment of so many young men and women created a housing shortage in Lexington. It was also a boon for local farmers who supplied the milk. Frye also had a factory in Chicago.

But things did not go well for Frye. He had grown up in Lexington while his father was a minister at the Congregational church from 1864–'71. Then the government branded his new method of making butter from cream Oleo.

While here, and after a long illness, his

wife died. She was originally from Lucas and had relatives here, The Cooks.

A firm he hired to develop his new method of making plastic from cream went out of business. Heartbroken, the plant closed and he sold his beautiful home on the town square and went to live with a sister in northern Ohio.

After the business closed, a group of local investors headed by a local minister, converted the building into a wood veneer factory that also made baskets. The wicker-side baskets for the Halliday automobiles were made here for a time in addition to the production of useful home or household baskets.

Local farmers supplied the logs which were sliced into thin sheets on a latherlike machine. The finished products were veneer for sale to furniture manufacturers and to weave baskets.

The venture proved to be a financial failure and after the plant closed again. The building was used for storing farm supplies and fertilizer. Another fire in the 1920s leveled the building and today all that remains is a portion o the sandstone foundation wall hiding in the weeds.


It is unknown whether anyone still owns one of those baskets. If so, it would be over 100 years old.

Frederick Charles Friend

Frederick Charles "Chuck" Friend, 89, passed away at his home after a long illness on Sunday, March 28, 2021.

March 28, 2021. Born Jan. 11, 1932, to Susanna Freund, he spent most of his young life on a farm with his mother and grandparents, Henry and Amelia Freund. He attended a one-room school-bouxo in Little Washington and house in Little Washington and East Mansfield School and attended Madison High School until his senior year when he left for the United States Army. He served in Germany in the 142nd Armored Signal Co. during the Korean War and was honorably discharged March 13, 1953. He married Bernice "Bea" Claire Bessler Nov. 26, 1955 in Mansfield.

He worked at Pace General Industries before going into business for himself making thermostat equipment for Norwalk Thermostat. He then became involved with Faultless Rubber and built a small shop on the back of his home on Forest Dr., in the Madison area. In 1969, he purchased property on S. Illinois Ave. and estab-lished Friend Engineering and Machine Company. The company completed work for customers including Eagle Rubber, National Latex, Faultless Rubber, Garber Company, Procter and Gamble, Ohio Brass, Therm-O-Disc, Tappan and Norwalk Thermostat. In 1981, the couple bought a farm on Windsor Rd., Mifflin Township, where they lived for 38 years. He spent that time working hard to make the land look as pristine as a golf course. He made hay

and rented out the crop fields to local farmers. He was always inventing and fixing things to make them better. He also enjoyed building and flying model airplanes and was a member of the Mansfield Area RC Society and sponsored a trophy at the Shelby Quarter Scale Air Fair from 1984-2004. He was also a member of Ashland Cloud Chasers. He spent his time rebuilding



Silver King Oil Pulls and designed and made a smaller replica oil pull he called "Oil Pull Pup." He was a member of Richland County Steam Thrashers since 1961. He built two small bull-

dozers with articulated steering and rebuilt a 1937 Chevy car, a small parade car and a larger parade car.

He retired in 2000 but contin-ued to visit the shop where his son, David, took over. His enjoyment was working on the farm. He built a wagon for a calliope and he and Charlie Otcasek pulled Bea and friend, Jean Otcasek, with a tractor or truck as they played dur-ing local festivals including the Shelby Bicycle Parade, Lexington Blueberry Parade and Miss Ohio Parade and numerous others for over 14 years.

over 14 years. Surviving are his wife of 65 years, Bea Friend; sons David (Deb Catlett) Friend and Richard Friend, all of Mansfield; sister Pat (Mike) McClure; grandchil-dren Jenna (Jeremy) Wolford, Taylor Smith, Gwen Smith, Daniel (Ashlee) Catlett; and great grandchildren Audrey Wolford, Cody Wolford, Lucas Catlett and Natalee Catlett. He is also sur-vived by son-in-law Bon (Stella) Smith, coursin vived by son-in-law Ron (Stella) Smith, cousin Shirley Freund, nephews Brian Phillips and Jeff Phillips and good friend Jean Otcasek. He was preceded in death by his daughter, Dianne Claire Smith and good friend Charlie Otcasek.

Penne with Roasted Veggies

Ingredients

1 lb. penne pasta Veggies to roast — pick 4 or 5 (or more): Onions (a must for flavor) Zucchini/and or summer squash Asparagus Mushrooms Sweet potatoes Peppers (assortment of colors) Eggplant Tomatoes (grape or cherry left whole) a must for nice tomato flavor Fennel Broccoli or cauliflower 1/2 cup olive oil Parmesan cheese to grate on top Salt and pepper Italian seasoning Crushed red pepper

Instructions

Get your water boiling for your pasta. Cut all your vegetables into pieces, be aware of what vegetables you are using and cut so that they are all pretty uniform in size, obviously asparagus and tomatoes will be different. Coat them well with olive oil, salt and pepper and some italian seasoning.

Spread on a baking sheet and roast 350 degrees for 20-30 minutes. When you put veggies in the oven you can begin cooking the pasta. Before draining the pasta, reserve 1 cup of pasta water. Turn veggies half way through cooking. When they are nice and roasted, pull them out. Add veggies to drained pasta in a serving bowl, be sure to add any oil left in the pan. Add pasta water a little at a time, you don't want it too soupy. Grate parmesan over top and you are all set.

Parents will have one account that will service all of their students in the district. Please do not create a duplicate account for your kindergarten student.

Parents who have current students in grades K-11, but



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are not registering a new kindergarten student should confirm their account with FinalForms in the e-mail, however, the forms for students will not be available/updated until May 2021. Please refrain from filling them out at this time.

Those who do not currently have a student attending Madison will need to create a new account with FinalForms. A link to create this account is posted at www.mlsd.net. Kindergarten registration will take place April 6–30. A child must be five years old on or before Aug. 1, 2021 to enroll for the 2021–'22 school year.

Expansion Project approved

State Rep. Marilyn John (R-Richland County) announced that the Ohio Tax Credit Authority (TCA) approved a manufacturing expansion project in Mansfield that will bring new jobs and millions in new and retaining payroll.

"Economic development especially during a worldwide pandemic is definitely uplifting news for our communities," said John. "Richland County remains economically competitive during these times, and it's exciting to see investment and jobs coming to Mansfield."

The announcement is in coordination with Edge Plastics Inc. and the city of Mansfield. Edge Plastics provides plastic manufacturing services for consumer, commercial, and industrial product companies.

The project expects to create 67 full-time positions and generate \$2.3 million in new annual payroll and retain \$3.3 million in existing payroll. The TCA approved a 1.107 percent, six-year job creation tax credit for this initiative.




