May is National Foster Care Month and Richland County Children Services (RCCS) believes that every child deserves a loving home.

There are over 423,000 children and youth in foster care across the country, and many have been facing increased isolation over the past year.

It is more critical than ever for our communities to work together in identifying the right mix of supports to establish meaningful connections for children and youth in care.

This year, National Foster Care Month focuses on how to strengthen these connections and the role of family and youth engagement at every stage. We should ensure all families and youth have meaningful involvement.

Strengthening families and focusing on their well-being is the key to building strong communities. Whether it's promoting a collaborative relationship between birth parents and foster caregivers or providing parents with the right combination of supportive services to enable reunification, keeping families together is the primary goal in a successful child welfare system.

The goal of RCCS is always reunification. RCCS has on average 100 children in custody with close to 60 foster homes. Out of the 100 children, 30 percent of them are teenagers. Families are needed for all age children, but especially for older youth.

Foster care involves the temporary care of children ages newborn to age 18, all races, sibling groups, various religions, and children with special needs.

RCCS encourages all individuals to invest in the lives of children and to provide them with unconditional love, support, guidance, and every available resource to ensure their health and well-being.

RCCS believes every child needs a permanent home. Many of our foster parents adopt the children who are placed with them. Others help children prepare for placement with an adoptive family or relative.

Holy Trinity Farmer's Market to return





Robert L. "Bob" Wolfe

Robert L. "Bob" Wolfe, of Ontario/Mansfield, passed away on Friday, April 16, 2021, at the age of 92 from natural causes. His wife, Ann (Schira) Wolfe, preceded him in death in 2013.

Bob was born on May 28, 1928, in Findlay, Ohio, to Russell and Mary Ellen (Roseberry) Wolfe. He was raised in Upper Sandusky, Ohio, where he was a USHS graduate in 1946. He had an outstanding athletic career in football (1945 - undefeated NOL champions; 1st team All-NOL), basketball (1st-team All-NOL), and track and field (placing third in the state 880-yard run with a time that was the 4th fastest scholastic time in the nation his senior year). He was a graduate of Heidelberg College prior to launching a 35-year career in high school teaching (mathematics) and coaching.



Bob began his teaching and coaching career at Harpster (1950-'53), followed by Bucyrus (1953-'61), and Ontario (1961-'85). He coached several sports, but his specialty was track and field. His teams won 4 consecutive NOL championships at Bucyrus and 10 consecutive JAC championships at Ontario. His summers were spent painting houses with the rowdy Shelby paint crew. After his teaching career ended, he served as the Ontario Zoning Inspector.

Bob and Ann raised four children and numerous pets at their home on Park Avenue West. Yearly automobile vacations during summer break were the norm — Expo 67, New England, and the most memorable being a 1968 trip to California. In their retirement years, Bob and Ann enjoyed their home and boat on Lake Erie - a favorite spot for the grandchildren. In his spare time, he enjoyed playing Bridge, doing puzzles, pursuing genealogy, and avidly following Ontario High School and OSU sports. Bob was

also active in the Ontario United Methodist Church, where he was a member since 1961.

Bob is survived by daughter, Deborah Langford of Northfield; son, Dan (Diane) of Ontario; daughter, Diana of Columbus; and daughter, Molly of Columbus. Grand- and step-grandchildren are: Rachel (Ryan) Boyle of Carlsbad, CA; Josh Langford of San Francisco, CA; Ben Langford of Columbus; Kristi Wolfe (Eilil Yuvarajan) of League City, TX; Julie (Joel) Baker of Portland, OR; Cory (Kelly) Baumberger of Apex, NC; and Ben (Caitlin) Baumberger of Apex, NC. He is also survived by 11 great- and step-great grandchildren (with one more on the way); special friend, Shirley Wright; and numerous nieces and nephews.

In addition to wife, Ann, he was preceded in death by his parents; sister, Laurel Jane Webb; brothers, Fenton, Russ, and William "Billy". He was the 'last man standing' of an all-star cast of aunts and uncles.

Dad was remembered and his memory celebrated with visitation hours from 10 am to 12 pm Friday, April 23, 2021, at Ontario United Methodist Church, 3540 Park Avenue West, Ontario, followed by a funeral service conducted by Pastor Christine Bell at 12 pm, also at the church.

Sweedish Meatballs

This sauce is the perfect addition to your ice cream, or try it in your next cocktail. You are going to love all these refreshing flavors. It takes a bit of work but it will make enough to last for a while. Store it in a canning jar for a quick topping for whatever you might think of!

For the Meatballs:

- 3 lbs Ground Beef
- 1 lb ground pork
- 1 1/2 cups unseasoned bread crumbs
- 1 egg
- 1 cup finely chopped onions
- 3 T dark brown sugar
- 1 t freshly ground nutmeg
- 1/2 t allspice
- 4 t salt
- 2 leaves fresh chopped sage
- 2 sprigs thyme
- 1-2 T fresh chopped parsley
- 1/2 cup heavy cream

For the Gravy

- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 of a large onion left together
- 1/2 t ground ginger
- 1 t nutmeg
- 3 cups chicken broth
- 6 T butter
- 6-8 T flour

Added to gravy after removed from heat:

- 1 cup sour cream or 1/2sour cream and 1/2greek yogurt
- 2 T chopped parsley
- 1 T lemon juice
- 1 cup sautéed mushrooms and sprinkle on top in 3T butter

Instructions

Mix all the ingredients for the meatballs together. Should yield 100 "ping pong" sized meatballs. Add milk to saucepan along with ginger, nutmeg, 1/2 onion in one piece, (if you are using cloves, stick them in the onion), sage and thyme.

Simmer until onion becomes almost soft. Remove from heat and strain, return liquid to the pan and add butter. Simmer until butter is melted, then while stirring, continue to add flour to make a roux. Cook the roux over low heat stirring continually until light golden brown. Add a Tbsp. of white wine and while stirring add enough broth to desired consistency. 1 cup sautéed mushrooms (in 3T butter) and sprinkle on top.



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

The MOAC League Tennis Tournament was held April 29 and May 1. Galion High School took the tournament as champions with 27 points. Ontario took second with 19 points.



Mergel replaces Hall of Fame coach Joe Balogh who is retiring after an illustrious 36 years of teaching and coaching at Ontario High School.

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

As warmer weather approaches RPH reminds parents that children should never be left in cars

It was confirmed on April 30, that a North Carolina five-month-old baby lost her life after being left alone in a hot car Sunday, April 25. This was the first hot car death of the year.

Though it is too late for this little girl, we need to double our efforts to focus on education and awareness regarding the dangers of hot cars.

"After more than 20 years of public education, the number of children dying in hot cars has gotten worse, not better," stated Janette Fennell, president of Kids and Cars Safety. "The years 2018 and 2019 were the worst in history with a total of over 100 children that died in hot cars nationwide," she continued. 883 children have died due to Pediatric Vehicular Heatstroke since 1998.

Nobody believes that a hot car tragedy is going to happen to them or their family until it does. Richland Public Health joins many national child and car safety organizations in encouraging parents to adopt several simple habits to protect their children, even if they believe this could never happen to them.

Look Before You Lock Safety Checklist

- Make sure your child is never left alone in a car:
- Place the child's diaper bag or item in the front passenger seat as a visual cue that the child is with you.
- Make it a habit of opening the back door every time you park to ensure no one is left behind. To enforce this habit, place an item that you can't start your day without in the back seat (employee badge, laptop, phone, handbag, etc.)
- Ask your childcare provider to call you right away if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.
- Clearly announce and confirm who is getting each child out of the vehicle. Miscommunication can lead to thinking someone else removed the child.
- Make sure children cannot get into a parked car:
- Keep vehicles locked at all times, especially in the garage or driveway. Ask neighbors and visitors to do the same.
- Never leave car keys within reach of children.

- Use childproofing knob covers and door alarms to prevent children from exiting your home unnoticed.

- Teach children to honk the horn or turn on hazard lights if they become stuck inside a car.

- If a child is missing, immediately check the inside, floorboards, and trunk of all vehicles in the area carefully, even if they're locked.

If You See a Child or Pet Alone in a Vehicle

- Every year on average, 38 children die in hot cars. KidsAndCars.org is calling on the public to be prepared to take action to save a life. If you see a child alone in a car; get involved.

Here's What You Should Do:

- Don't wait for the driver to return. Call 911 right away. The 911 operator can help give you instructions on how to care for the child or pet.

- If the child or pet is not responsive or is in distress, immediately:

- Get them out of the car by any means necessary*

- Move them to a cooler environment (somewhere with AC or shade if AC is not available)

- Remove child's clothing to let the heat dissipate from their skin

- Dampen them with cool water or wet rags, immerse in cool water (not in an ice bath).

- If the child or pet is responsive and not in distress:

- Stay with them until help arrives

- Ask someone else if they can locate the driver. You might suggest they ask security of a store manager to page them.

Warning Signs of Heatstroke:

- Hot, flush or red

- Slow, weak pulse or strong, rapid pulse

- Lethargy, confusion or strange behavior

- Nausea

- No sweating

It's never okay to leave a child alone in a car, even for a few minutes and even if the car is running.





Safety Tips for Riders:

- Protect your head. Always wear a helmet
- Make sure your bike is road-ready
- Bike Riders Be Visible: wear bright or florescent colors
- Motorcycle Riders Gear Up: wear proper protection including boots and eye-wear

•Use signals (hand or turn signals) to indicate your intentions to other road users

•Check for traffic: 70% of car-bike crashes occur at driveways or intersections

•Obey the rules of the road (traffic laws)

•Bicyclists should avoid riding at night or in low light conditions

Safety Tips for Drivers:

•Protect your life: Always wear a seat belt

•Be especially cautious around young bike users

•Remember that bike users are entitled to the full lane Slow down and stay behind until safe to pass

•When passing a bike or motorcycle rider, give a three-foot safety cushion

•Look twice for other road users, especially at intersections

John supports House budget bill

The Ohio House of Representative passed House Bill 110, the House's version of Ohio's two-year budget plan. State Representative Marilyn John (R-Richland County) voted in support of the bill. Among various aspects, the bill establishes the Fair School Funding Plan and provides a two percent income tax cut to Ohioans.

"House Bill 110 is a balance budget that introduces several imperative measures to Ohioans," said John. "A priority of mine is the 2 percent income tax cut that will allow hard-working Ohioans to keep more of their hard-earned funds in their own pockets. I am also proud to support the creation of the Fair School Funding Plan to ensure Ohio school children are receiving the best education possible."

House Bill 110 creates the Fair School Funding Plan, a fair plan to all of Ohio's public schools. The Fair School Funding Plan is the result of more than three years of work by educators and policymakers with a formula that is predictable, sustainable and transparent.

The legislation also includes a two percent income tax rate cut across the board, which will reduce taxes and withholding amounts by approximately \$380 million over the course of the biennium. Coupled with recently passed legislation conforming Ohio's tax code to federal law, the House has provided nearly \$500 million in personal income tax cuts this biennium. The bill also establishes greater government oversight and accountability to ensure that state resources are being spent reasonably and used in a manner consistent with the intent of the General Assembly.

Additionally, the bill support jobs and Ohio's economy through targeted investments to support job retention and creation, workforce training and economic

development efforts. It allocates \$200 million for the House's broadband expansion package, House Bill 2, which John supported earlier this year. It also creates a 13-member joint legislative committee to study career pathways and workforce training.

The bill supports law enforcement, firefighters and public safety by funding a series of initiatives to support those who protect and serve Ohioans every day. Some of these initiatives include the following:

- \$26 million for Recovery Ohio Law Enforcement to support anti-narcotics efforts

- \$24 million for safety grants for schools

- \$15 million for a one-year police training pilot program to assist law enforcement agencies with training costs

- \$10 million for grants to small fire departments for equipment and training

- \$10 million for grants to state and local law enforcement agencies to implement or enhance body-worn camera programs

House Bill 110 also appropriates \$155 million in grants for industries negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including newly formed businesses. Grants from this funding will be available in the fiscal year beginning July 1. The grants include the following:

- \$100 million for bars and restaurants

- \$25 million for the lodging industry



- \$20 million for indoor and outdoor entertainment venues

- \$10 million for new businesses
