

Zack Snyder's *Army of the Dead* is a fun, albeit exhausting, movie centered around a group of mercenaries headed by

Dave Bautista who decide to risk going into a walled off, zombie infected Las Vegas to go underground and retrieve a fortune in a safe.

This will be a very divided review because the movie could have been so much better had its two and a half hour run time been shortened to about 90 minutes. Many scenes, especially near the beginning and the middle, really drag and the resolution

of that scene is usually not very satisfying. Besides Batista, who is very good, there is a fine supporting cast including Garrett Dillahunt, Tig Notaro, Ella Purnell, Theo Rossi and Omari Hardwick. They all have very unique characters and everybody has a special skill going into this mission. Interestingly, Notaro was cast after another actor dropped out and filmed all of her scenes on a green screen (knowing this while watching the movie makes it very obvious) and the movie has also been in development since around 2007 until Netflix picked it up in 2019.

It's too bad the movie is so long because there are some very effective villains including a queen that seems to be

in control of all the zombies and even an infected white tiger that could have been explored even more giving them a little more backstory.

Zack Snyder is a fine director for these kinds of movies and has directed a Dawn of the Dead remake, Batman v. Superman, Watchmen and the recently praised four-hour cut of Justice League that premiered on HBO Max, so he certainly

knows what he is doing in terms of big action pictures.

If *Army of the Dead's* runtime had been cut down and the movie condensed this could have been much better, though the last 45 minutes to an hour are really effective and well done. Look for The Entertainment Examiner's video posts on YouTube.

Red Cross urges donors to give

The American Red Cross urges all who are healthy to make this a summer full of life for patients by scheduling an appointment to give blood or platelets.

Individuals of all blood types are urged to schedule an appointment now to give blood, and in most cases, those who have received a COVID-19 vaccine can donate. However, knowing the name of the manufacturer of the vaccine they received is important in determining donation eligibility. Appointments can be made by downloading the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enabling the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

In thanks for making it a summer full of life, those who come to give blood, platelets or plasma in May will automatically be entered for a chance to win a travel trailer camper that sleeps five, powered by Suburban Propane, via their SuburbanCares initiative. The Red Cross is also thanking those who come to donate May 28 through June 13 with a limitededition t-shirt, while supplies last.

The Red Cross is testing blood, platelet and plasma donations for COVID-19 antibodies. The test may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to coronavirus, regardless of whether they developed symptoms. Testing may also identify the presence of antibodies developed after receiving a COVID-19 vaccine.

Plasma from routine blood and platelet donations that test positive for high levels of antibodies may be used as convalescent plasma to meet potential future needs of COVID-19 patients. Convalescent plasma is a type of blood product collected from COVID-19 survivors who have antibodies that may help patients who are actively fighting the virus.

The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test. To protect the health and safety of Red Cross staff and donors, it is important that individuals who do not feel well or believe they may be ill with COVID-19 postpone donation.

Donors can expect to receive antibody test and sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org.

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows high standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions — including temperature checks, social distancing and face masks for donors and staff — have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face mask while at the drive.

Richland SWCD encourages residents to choose native plants when gardening

As gardening season gets underway, Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) encourages residents to go native when planning a garden or landscape. Going native means utilizing native plants because of their many benefits.

Native plants are more suited to our climate and soil and typically do better in our gardens than non-native species. They also provide excellent habitats and food for insects, pollinators, and wildlife. Because they have a strong root system, more soil is held in place which slows stormwater runoff, helps prevent soil erosion and filters pollutants before they enter rivers, lakes and streams.

Richland SWCD is hosting a Native

Plant Sale in conjunction with Natives in Harmony on Tuesday, June 15, from 4–6 pm in the front parking lot of the Richland County Longview Center, 1495 W. Longview Ave., Mansfield. Plants cost \$3 per plug, \$6 per quart and \$10 for gallon sizes. Species are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Garden gloves will be available to purchase at \$5 per pair.

There will be table exhibits about container gardening and "greenhouse" cover to extend the growing season, ideas for plant markers, including how to use recycled materials and soil testing information.



Each year, \$1,000 will be awarded to a high school student who meets the criteria of the scholarship through an application process.


As the scholarship fund grows with support, MCS will be able to offer more funding to more students.

John applauds signing of cost-saving legislation

State Rep. Marilyn John (R-Richland County) has had her first sponsored legislation under House Bill 87 signed into law. The governor signed John's legislation, which allows more flexibility for counties and assisting them against rising energy costs.

"I'm thankful this bill moved swiftly through our legislative process as it establishes an exemption for utility supply contracts entered into under a joint purchasing program," said John. "With a limitation of ten years for county utility supply contracts, this legislation would change current law to exempt contracts from the 10 year

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limit. Because the state, municipalities, and townships already have the ability to enter into longer term contracts, this change does not apply to them."

The agreements will allow counties to lock in a portion

The agreements will allow counties to lock in a portion of their energy loads for county facilities and aggregation programs. Additionally, the legislation could serve as a long-term constraint against rising energy costs and can produce savings for both counties and customers alike.

The bill passed unanimously in the Ohio House back

The bill passed unanimously in the Ohio House back in March. John spoke to the bipartisan bill on the House floor. Subsequently, the Senate followed suit by passing it in early May.

Along with John, State Rep. Jason Stephens (R-Kitts Hill) serves as a joint sponsor of the bill in addition to over 30 other cosponsors in the House and Senate. The legislation included an emergency clause and went into immediate effect.



May 27, 1937 — San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge opens to the public after five years of construction. On opening day "Pedestrian Day"some 200,000 bridge walkers marveled at the 4,200-foot-long suspension bridge, which spans the Golden Gate Strait at the entrance to San Francisco Bay and connects San Francisco and Marin County. The next day, the Golden Gate Bridge opened to vehicular traffic. The concept of bridging the nearly mile-wide Golden Gate Strait was proposed as early as 1872, but it was not until the early 1920s that public opinion in San Francisco began to favor such an undertaking. In 1921, Cincinnati-born bridge engineer Joseph Strauss submitted a preliminary proposal: a combination suspension-cantilever that could be built for \$27 million. Although unsightly compared with the final result, his design was affordable, and Strauss became the recognized leader of the effort. During the next few years, Strauss' design evolved rapidly, thanks to the contributions of consulting engineer Leon S. Moisseiff, architect Irving F. Morrow, and others. Moisseiff's concept of a simple suspension bridge was accepted by Strauss, and Morrow, along with his wife, Gertrude, developed the Golden Gate Bridge's elegant Art Deco design. Morrow would later help choose the bridge's trademark color: "international orange," which resists rust and fading and suits the natural beauty of San Francisco. In 1929, Strauss was selected as chief engineer. To finance the bridge, the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District was formed in 1928, consisting of San Francisco, Marin, Sonoma, Del Norte and parts of Mendocino and Napa counties. These counties agreed to collectively take out a large bond, which would then be paid back through bridge tolls. In November 1930, residents of the district voted 3-1 to put their homes, farms, and businesses up as collateral to support a \$35 million bond to build the bridge. Construction began Jan. 5, 1933, at the depths of the Great Depression. Strauss and his workers overcame many difficulties: stro

Construction continues on Rt. 30

The following construction projects are anticipated to affect highways in Richland County this week. All outlined work is weather permitting.

U.S. Route 30 major rehabilitation – U.S. 30, from State Route 309 to just east of the 5th Avenue ramps, will have single lane closures for a major rehabilitation project. Traffic will always be maintained.

New impacts are: The U.S. 30 westbound exit ramp to fifth Ave. will close Tuesday, June 1, for conduit installation and full depth pavement reconstruction. The detour route for motorists will be to continue on U.S. 30 westbound to the SR 13 exit, south on SR 13 to Longview Avenue, east on Longview Avenue to U.S. 30, east on U.S. 30 to the Fifth Ave. exit. Estimated completion: Monday, June 21, 2021

Continuing impacts are:

S. 30 eastbound – One lane of eastbound traffic will be maintained from just west of SR 309 to SR 13, and two lanes of traffic eastbound from SR 13 to just east of 5th Avenue.

S. 30 westbound – One lane of westbound traffic will be maintained from just east of 5th Avenue to SR 13, and two lanes of traffic westbound from SR 13 to just west of Trimble Road.

S. 30 westbound access to exits at 5th Avenue, SR 13, Trimble Road, and SR 309 are currently being maintained. Access from U.S. 30 westbound to SR 545 and SR

39 will not be permitted (ramps closed).

Construction of the U.S. 30 westbound lanes and reconstruction of the ramps is tentatively scheduled to be complete September 2021.

Closure of the U.S. 30 westbound exit and entrance ramps to SR 545. The detour route will be U.S. 30 westbound to the SR 13 exit, south on SR 13 to Longview Avenue, and east on Longview Avenue to SR 545.

Closure of the U.S. 30 westbound exit and entrance ramps to SR 39. The detour route will be U.S. 30 westbound to the Trimble Road exit, south on Trimble Road to U.S. 30 eastbound, and U.S. 30 eastbound to the SR 39 exit.

Closure of the 5th Avenue entrance ramp to U.S. 30 westbound. The detour route will be 5th Avenue to U.S. 30 eastbound, east on U.S. 30 to the Reed Road exit, and north on Reed Road to U.S. 30 westbound.

Lane widths will be 11' throughout the length of the project.

All eastbound exits will be maintained throughout the season, except for the SR 545 exit which has been permanently removed per project plans.

Eastbound and westbound traffic will be separated by portable concrete barrier throughout the length of the project.

Estimated completion of entire project is May 2023.

Protecting Ohio kids from child abuse By Senator Sherrod Brown potential solutions.

Sadly, we know child deaths due to abuse are far too common. The National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System estimated that 1,840 children died from abuse and neglect in 2019, and we know those numbers probably don't even tell the full

Right now, the lack of a clear definition for "child maltreatment fatality" lets too many kids slip through the cracks. We can't solve the problem if we don't even have accurate data on how bad it is.

That's why I joined my Republican colleague, Senator Roy Blunt, to reintroduce our bipartisan Child Abuse Death Disclosure Act, to provide policymakers and public health officials with a clearer picture on exactly how many children we are losing each year.

Our bill would require the Department of Health and Human Services to consult with state and local officials, child welfare practitioners, pediatricians, public health officials, and law enforcement to develop a national standard definition related to child abuse deaths

Without a standard, national definition, we are never going to be able to accurately track this problem and advance

The bill would also require states to report case specific information to the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention to better understand the circumstances around a child's death. This would include requiring states to look into whether the family had access to housing, mental health services, or drug treatment services.

In addition, the bill would provide resources to improve culturally competent training for pediatricians and medical professionals, to better identify and respond to injuries in infants that could be signs of abuse

Our bill has the support multiple child advocacy organizations, including the National Children's Alliance and the National Child Abuse Coalition.

The fight to end child abuse and neglect deaths starts with community awareness and responding to at-risk families before they are in crisis. It includes better training medical professional, and creating national standards.

We need to treat child abuse prevention like the public health crisis that it is. I'm hopeful that we can make real bipartisan progress on this commonsense plan to save children's lives.


