West Main Street on a warm summer day

On a very warm summer day, the streets were nearly empty in Lexington. If too hot to labor in the heat it was wise to seek a shady place to rest.

This 1910 era photograph was taken in the street in front of the present day city building, looking east towards the town square. The small white spots under the trees on the left side of the picture are men sitting on chairs, no doubt trying to stay cool.

It's a rather peaceful scene back then. All the buildings on the left burned down in 1929 in a disastrous fire when the village had little in the way of fire equipment.

The old Culp building on the right was torn down a few years ago for a planned

new structure but contaminated ground from an abandoned gas station across the alley caused the EPA to stop that.

The present Kell Hardware building was further along.

The mostly unpaved street shows the wagon and buggy tracks as at that time very few owned an automobile. The dark spots are today often referred to as "road apples" and, at times, the village hired someone to clean the streets.

Another problem was dust which penetrated the open shop doors and settled on the merchandise. A series of pipes once laid along the downtown section watered the street from a gasoline engine powered pump devised by doctor Henry Smith. That effort didn't last long. In places the dust became mud.

THE MADISON TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES held a special meeting on July 22, to put the final touches on the 2021 paving contract by rebidding the contract to include Mayer Dr., Burgraft Rd. and all of Evergreen Ave., after receiving notification from chief fiscal officer Leanna Rhodes that the road department has a balance of \$215,540. Hoping to get more bidders, the trustees moved the completion date from Sept. 15 to Oct. 15. The trustees also voted to look for a replacement for retiring road department employee David Murphy who will be retiring on July 31. New employees must be able to lift 50 pounds, operate equipment, drive and operate a plow and be able to back up trucks and trailers. The 2006 engine 75 will go to the ARFF corporation of Townsend, Georgia with a bid of \$26,101. Madison's Fire Chief Ken Justus addressed the trustees as his desire to purchase updates for the department policies and procedures, some of which are over 20 years old. The trustees said they will address the matter at the next meeting.

support engagement.

Repurposing Vacant City Lots into Affordable Housing Program, which addresses a critical need for safe and affordable housing for aging adults through an innovative development of Ritter's Run Apartments. This program was among the

top 15 of 36 local aging programs to receive honors during the n4a Annual Conference and Tradeshow, July 19-22.

The 2021 n4a Aging Innovations and Achievement Awards recognizes Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) and Title VI Native American Aging Programs that develop and implement cutting-edge approaches to support older adults, people with disabilities and their family caregivers. Ritter's Run Apartments, located on Ohio Street between Sturges and Blymyer in Mansfield, is a pioneering development of 12 single-story apartments designed to serve a low-income aging population, and is in alignment with the City of Mansfield's Consolidated Plan 2019-2023. Ritter's Run is made possible through the collaboration and partnership of many entities. The Richland County Land Bank donated the land for the apartments, which has been a targeted area by the City of Mansfield for revitalization and redevelopment. The Agency applied for and was awarded HOME Funds from the City of Mansfield. The dedication of these HOME funds will make it possible for rents to be kept below the market rate and affordable to low-income adults. The remaining costs was secured with a first mortgage from

Strawberry Bread Pudding

Ingredients

- 2 Loaves Italian Bread — cut in cubes (If loaves are large use 1 1/2)
(Keep in mind you want enough to fill the baking dish)
- 4 cups strawberries – washed and halved
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 cups milk
- 8 ounces mascarpone cheese
- 2/3 cup powder sugar
- 1 1/2 cups heavy cream
- (You will need an additional amount of brown sugar and powdered sugar to sprinkle later)

Instructions

In a bowl add the strawberries, 1/2 cup sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Let sit for at least 2 hours (you can even do this the day ahead and let sit overnight)

Butter a 13 x 9 x 2 baking dish.

Blend the mascarpone and the powdered sugar together. (You can soften it up with a few seconds in the microwave if you need too). Set aside.

In a blender add the eggs, brown sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla and milk. Blend (or whisk in bowl) well and put in bowl with bread to soak. (You may need to do this in two batches)

Drain Strawberries, reserving liquid for sauce. Layer bread, strawberries and mascarpone in the baking dish, repeating to make several layers. Sprinkle with brown sugar.

Bake at 350 for 25 minutes uncovered and then turn oven off and cover, leave in hot oven another 20 minutes.

In a saucepan, heat the heavy cream, bring to a slow boil and stir until it begins to thicken, add the reserved strawberry juice and whisk in. Set aside to drizzle over top as you serve pudding.

Sprinkle with some powdered sugar as well.

Two boaters saved at Charles Mill Lake after late-night rescue

Two anglers narrowly escaped being pulled into the dam at Charles Mill Lake late Thursday night, July 22. Rangers patrolling at Charles Mill and Pleasant Hill Lakes received a distress call at 10:57 pm that a boat had capsized, two people were in the water, and the current was pulling them towards the dam. MWCD Rangers; Corbin Mager and Adam McLellan, along with an Ashland County Sheriff Deputy responded to the scene.

Upon arrival, they found a small fishing boat had capsized, and a 57-year-old

male, and 56-year-old female in the water in front of the trash gates at the dam struggling to stay above water. The Rangers and first responders retrieved rescue ropes and PFD's (life jackets) and were able to pull the anglers to safety. They were treated by EMS before being transported to an area hospital for treatment of non-life-threatening injuries. Mifflin Fire Department, ODNr and Ashland County Sheriff Deputies responded to assist with rescue efforts.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Dam

Attendant was contacted and closed the gates to slow the rushing water, so the boat could be pulled from the water. Rangers were able to retrieve the small fishing boat from the dam and pulled it to the shoreline adjacent to the beach.

"There is no doubt the Rangers and the First Responders performed their duties professionally and with the sense of urgency that saved the lives of two fisher-

man," said John Maxey, MWCD Chief Ranger.

"They jumped into action, and heroically saved these people. I am very proud of our Rangers and first responders who prevented what could have been a very tragic day on the lake. We cannot stress enough to wear a PFD while on the water and use extreme caution when fishing near the dam."





NASA was created in response to the Soviet Union's October 4, 1957 launch of its first satellite, Sputnik I. The 183-pound, basketball-sized satellite orbited the earth in 98 minutes. The U.S. prided itself on being at the forefront of technology, and immediately began developing a response, signaling the start of the U.S.-Soviet space race.
