Senator Sherrod Brown makes stops at 179th, NCO Industrial Museum

U.S. Sen. Sherrod Brown (D-OH) visited the 179th Mansfield Airlift Wing before heading to Mansfield's North Central Ohio Industrial Museum for a tour.

"The 179th Airlift Wing and the North Central Ohio Industrial Museum illustrate the way the base and local industry work together and how they can both drive innovation and job growth," said Brown.

Brown has continually worked to bring jobs to the Mansfield Base and advocated for its selection for the

Brown has continually worked to bring jobs to the Mansfield Base and advocated for its selection for the new Cyber Warfare Mission. The Cyber Warfare Wing will create 180 new jobs and put Mansfield in the middle of the military's cutting-edge cyber capability.

The industrial museum opened its doors in July and highlights Mansfield's historic past and its role in the next generation of industry in North Central Ohio.

"The selection by the Air Force for the 179th Airlift Wing to take on the Cyber Warfare Wing (CWW) is confirmation the Air Force has confidence in our wings ability to execute this new and very important capability for our Department of Defense. Since 1948, the 179th has demonstrated its ability to 'get the job done,' and there is no doubt that it will perform this new cyber mission with the same level of excellence. We also thank Senator Brown, our other legislators and our community for their long-standing support of the 179th," said Rich Green, Brig. Gen. (Ret.) and Chair of Mansfield Military Affairs Council.

"We are extremely proud of the 179th and their long and successful flight history. We are equally excited to see them take on this new mission as a Cyber Warfare Wing and to bring these future facing jobs to Mansfield. This exciting news is a result of a long collaborative effort from partners at the local, state and federal levels and the current base leadership. Thanks to all involved," said Barrett Thomas of the Richland Chamber of Commerce.

Marvel Studios Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings is one of the best Marvel origin stories they have done and a thoroughly enjoyable movie. This movie gave a huge boost to a struggling box

office that has not seen big numbers in a long time. Many studios have been moving their release dates around again but with Shang-Chi being released only in theaters and doing so well, these studios may be rethinking their strategies.

Simi Liu stars as Shang-Chi, a man trained in martial arts from his father Wenwu (Tony Leung). His father is the keeper of ten mysterious rings that have some amazing powers. Working as a valet, Shang-Chi and his

friend Katy (Awkwafina) are stalked by members of the ten rings organization and this takes them to mysteries surrounding his father and the legend behind the rings.

There are so many elements that make this movie enjoyable. The martial arts feel like a throwback to old Bruce Lee-style movies that have not been seen in a long time. The fight scenes, including on a speeding city bus and another on some scaffolding on the side of a big high rise,

are very impressive.

The performances are great too and Awkwafina supplies many of the movie's laughs but there is also a depth to her character as she learns new skills. There is

> also a minor cast member from a previous Marvel movie that makes a welcome appearance.

> As a big Marvel fan, it's easy to be critical after all these years but the filmmakers really stepped up their game with this entry. It will be great to see what they do next with these characters. The cast also includes Michelle Yeoh and Benedict Wong from the Doctor Strange movies.

> Absolutely see Shang-Chi and the Legend of the Ten Rings on the big screen. Get

your popcorn, drink and sit and have a great time. Great characters, action scenes and laughs make for a fun experience. Marvel definitely put out a great entry with this movie.

In September of 2001 I was living in Goshen, NY, a town just close enough to NYC that many of my friends' parents commuted and worked in the city.

I remember sitting in Mrs. Wilson's math class (2nd row, 3rd seat) and I remember another teacher coming in and saying she needed to talk to her immediately. I remember watching the footage.

I also remember days later watching my Little League coach interviewed as one of the last firefighters pulled from the rubble (if you remember the final group of firefighters and the one citizen trapped in a stairwell, he was one of them).

But more than the hate and anger and violence and fear, I remember the highways around our town in every direction filled with volunteers rushing from out of state to help. I remember citizens lining those highways handing out food and water, loading up trucks with supplies to be brought into the city. I remember people laying aside all the pettiness we usually allow to divide us, and recognizing there are more important things than politics. That's how I remember 9/11 every year.

In times of adversity, courage and love have the chance to stand out. The greater the adversity, the brighter our response shines.

4 Tbsp. chardonnay wine






