

# Free art workshop honors artist Lois Mailou Jones

Local artist Debra Weaver guided participants through painting techniques similar to that of artist Lois Mailou Jones. The event was put on by the City of Mansfield Parks and Recreation Department at

North Lake Park on Friday, Feb. 25. Weaver said, "Our evening of painting included the littlest of creators finding their own style, to seniors putting their wisdom and creativity to work when 'paraphrasing' Lois Mailou Jones' work on their own canvas."

'Our snowy and icy evening workshop was most certainly full of color, shape and form that had preschoolers to teens, from young adults and beyond enjoying each and every step, deeply seeped in the STEAM Model.'

Lois Mailou Jones grew up in Boston, raised by working-class parents who stressed the value of education and hard work. Soon after graduating from Boston's School of the Museum of Fine Arts, she began designing textiles for several New York firms. She was an influential artist and teacher during her seven-decade career.

Her style shifted and evolved over time in response to various influences in her life and her extensive travels throughout Europe, Africa, and the Caribbean. She felt her greatest contribution to the art world was "proof of the talent of black artists." Her work echoed her pride in her African roots and American ancestry.

In 1937, Jones received a fellowship to study in Paris at the Académie Julian. She produced more than 30 watercolors during her year in France.

Things didn't always come easy for Jones. Despite her talent, she was told to basically go back to the South and help "her people." She was denied a teaching position in Boston, despite the fact that she graduated with honors from the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Jones decided from the time she was a small girl that she would become a famous artist one day. It was a bold decision for a Black American girl born in 1905.

# **Madison BOE approves hirings and volunteers** Madison Local Schools Board of Education met Tuesday, Feb. 22 in the Madison Comprehensive High School Library.

Board President Tim Wigton called the meeting to order and treasurer Robin Klenk performed roll call.

Committee reports included legislative, athletic board of control, student representative's comments, facilities report, student achievement, board policy and superintendent's update.

A presentation was given by Eric Turlo, student services director. A donation of 978 pounds of scrap steel tubing from Jay Industries for the Career Tech and Adult Career Center welding technology programs was accepted.

Robin Klenk gave the treasurer's report, followed by a resignation from Dave Stupka, spring fitness coordinator, effective Jan.26.

Supplemental positions awarded for the 2021-'22 school year were to Andrea Gerich, half assistant varsity softball coach; Mico Castelvetere, half assistant varsity softball coach; Victoria Kasberg, Academic Booster coordinator; and Melissa Parish, assistant swimming/diving coach.

Volunteers approved for the 2021-'22 school were Paige Carper, softball; Tim Carper, softball; Theresa Hill, tennis; Kyle Galco, baseball; and Darien Payne, baseball.

Wendy Poland was hired as a STNA substitute instructor for Madison Adult Career Center.

Substitute teachers hired on an "on-call" basis, as needed for the 2021-'22 school year are Victoria Sloan, Darla Noblet, McKenna Stoffer, Autumn Hinds, Ronald Seifert, Stephanie Kososky, Ashley McLaughlin and Anna Stimpert.

Also hired as substitute employees on an "on-call" basis, as needed for the 2021-'22 school year were Diana Donohue, bus aide; and Carl Sprague, bus driver.

Melinda Stover, high school second shift custodian, resigned effective March 3.

Keyona Yates was named the MECLC latchkey teacher, effective Jan. 28.

An unpaid leave of absence was granted to Derek Dawson, middle school custodian, effective Jan. 7–July 7, 2022.

The 2022-'23 school calendar was approved and the board approved the first reading of new and revised board policies.

The board approved the creation of a 200 activity account for a Safety Town fund. The account will be used to manage funds raised for the creation of a Safety Town program for the Madison community.

Approval was given for membership in the Ohio High School Athletic Association for the 2022–'23 school year.

The district will purchase two eighty-four passenger school buses and one sixty-one passenger special needs school bus at a cost of \$292,591, purchased out of ESSER II funds and the School Bus Purchase Program.

The air quality and air conditioning improvement project will move forward with G & B Electric, Inc. in the amount of \$469,194.57, to be purchased out of ESSER III funds. Pricing was secured through a cooperative purchasing agreement administered by Sourcewell.

The next regular board of education meeting will be held March 23, at 6 pm in the Madison Middle School Auditeria.

# The Man Never Late for Work

George Neal was a very reliable worker. You could depend on him. He was never late for work. As soon as he got out of bed he was the first one there. You see George owned the last water-powered flour mill in Richland County, and he and his wife Clara, his only employee, lived in what was part of the second floor warehouse. Located in Bellville the mill had an interesting history.

It was built in 1831 by Reverend John Moody as a carding and fulling mill but it was not successful. There were not enough sheep in the area. He was then able to have it converted to a gristmill.


Due to a period when rains ruined much of the area heat crop, Moody's farm crops were abundant. It was recorded;

"Rev. Moody gave much to his community. During a famine in the 1830s, Moody did not hesitate to reach out to the needy. When his neighbors crops failed and people approached him to buy grain for bread, he would ask them, "Have you the money to pay for it?" If the customer said yes, he was told to go elsewhere. If on the other hand, the customer had no money, they were given well filled sacks and told to come back if they needed more.

In 1830, Bellville had a population of 173, Lexington 69, Newville 77 and Perrysville 9. There were then seven grist mills within four miles of Bellville. The competition resulted in the mill going through a long series of bankruptcies and owners.

George Neal had been running the Kanaga water powered mill at the edge of Butler when a flood took out the mill dam. He bought the Bellville Mill in April 1944, and had it running after rebuilding the fore-bay, installing a new turbine and cleaning out the head race.

He turned on the water and ground the first flour Aug. 3, 1948. Neal and his wife lived in a second floor apartment they created from the warehouse along with several cats that handled mouse control duties. Clara, was a small women and the sole employee. She could easily handle heavy bags of feed with ease and usually

wore dresses made from colorful feed sacks. The printed material was popular with frugal farm wives who fashioned aprons, dresses, children's clothes and other needed items from them. Colorful chicken feed sacks were the most sought atter.

George Neal had been a miller and mill wright all his life. He had been head miller at Hanlely Mills at the huge Hanley Milling Company in Mansfield, working under Jerry Hanley. His skill and effort saved the Bellville mill.

Alas, all was to come to a sad ending. The State of Ohio rerouted State Route 97 and the mill had to go. The Neals closed down the water to the turbine for the last time on Thursday, Feb. 28, 1952. The mill which had stood for 122 years was then torn down.

The mill dam along route 13 was to remain but later well meaning thinkers felt the dam was partially responsible for Bellville's flooding. Sadly, it was torn out. Bellville still floods like it always has. The village lost two very historic landmarks



# March of Prayer services have begun around community



**By Mátiece Thomas** Spring is just around the corner. I don't know about you but I am excited for warmer temperatures, the trees budding and flowers blooming – a fresh start.

Today lets talk about giving your body a fresh start for spring, lets talk detox. I like to encourage my clients to do a detox at the beginning of every season. Out with the old, in with the new.

I juiced vegetables, drank a lot of water, and one cup of collagen/protein coffee, protein shakes and green tea. I took in a lot of good nutrients, but I gave my digestion system the day off from the heavy work.

You can detox by cutting sugars from your diet for five days. Sugar is the "cancer" of our diet so any time you can cut it, you should.

If you are a meat eater, you can live the vegetarian lifestyle for seven days. I will warn you that if you do this, you just might be surprised how much better you feel and how much more energy you have.

Another great way to detox, if you have a juicer, is to do a 24 hour juice fast.

Make your own V-8 and with the right fruits and vegetables you can make your juice savory or sweet. Just be cautious of too many high sugar fruits in one drink. Be sure to have a good balance 3-to-1 ratio, veggies to fruits.

I hope these suggestions have given you ideas for a detox that could work for you. Look at your diet and decide what you need to detox from and make a fresh start.

# Madison's Lyndsee Young wins school's first women's state wrestling championship

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Last Saturday, Feb. 19, Madison senior wrestler Lyndsee Young defeated Warren's Kylee Tait by decision to win

the Ohio state title. Young is now Madison's only female wrestler to have won a state title and joins Nate Yetzer as the only Rams to win a state wrestling championship.

Leading up to the match, Young knew little about her opponent, practicing moves and finalizing a strategy for the match just moments before hitting the mat.

"We worked on one takedown about twenty minutes prior to the match just to counter what [Tait] did well," said Madison coach Brian Mosier. We worked on position and let [Tait] make a lot of mistakes after we had a lead and Lyndsee capitalized on those pretty well."

Young echoed her coach's point and emphasized the importance of using her opponent's tendencies against her in the match.

'She was the most aggressive opponent that I had all weekend," said Young. "A lot of wrestling is staying in good position and that's what I focused on – once I was up, it was all about staying in good position so I wouldn't get scored on.'

As the match continued with both girls vying to

score points, Young's positioning and tenacity was too much for Trait, allowing her to gain a sizeable lead.

"We have a pretty good philosophy," said Mosier. "If we shoot, we score and if they shoot, we [counter] and score. She capitalized off [Tait's] attacks late in the match to really get that score and make the points gap a little wider."

With Young's large lead late in the match, Tait could do little

to make up her lost ground. Young held superior positioning as the clock expired, sealing her state championship victory. With the win, Young's record improved to 22-1 against females.

After the victory, Madison High School held a celebration parade for Young with students and faculty cheering her on as she circled Madison's hallways. Coach Mosier hopes the win will continue to inspire other females to take up the sport.

"There's not a ton of girls, especially in our area - interested in wrestling," said Mosier. "Wrestling is a tough sport. Hopefully it will get more girls in the area, not just in our school district, but also surrounding districts, more interested in the sport.'

Since there are not many women wrestlers in the Richland County area, Young wrestled in men's matches throughout the year, too, which she credited to helping her in her state victory.

"Wrestling the boys makes me stronger and it made me more aggressive for when I was wrestling against girls," said Young. "I was better prepared to be aggressive and score instead of waiting on [opponents]."

Coach Mosier also mentioned how wrestling and practicing in men's matches has helped not only Young, but her teammates, as well.

"She is one of the more technically sound wres-

tlers that I have when we drill," said Mosier. "She does everything right and changes levels well – it helps her and [her partner]. She has the experience - and it definitely helped her in the long run."

After winning the women's wrestling championship, Young then competed in the men's sectional tournament on Saturday, February 26. Young wrestled in four matches and finished in sixth place. Her overall record including men's matches was 28-12 before sectionals.





# •Free art workshop honors artist Lois Mailou Jones

*(Continued from Front Page)* "I was just full of the desire to be an artist and I don't think anything could have stopped me," Jones passionately stated.

She began her career in textiles, selling bold African-inspired designs. But credit was never given to her amazing work! Her name was never published with her designs. If she wanted her name to go down in history, she soon realized that she would need to shift towards being a painter. Unfortunately, for a Black woman artist to succeed in the United States, she needed some grit and determination to back up her talent. She blazed the path for future artists by teaching, mentoring, and guiding others to discover their own hidden talents.

Why is this short history lesson about a famous woman of color, named Lois Mailou Jones, important? Debra Weaver states, "It is important for us to celebrate black history by knowing, seeing, hearing, and practicing the skills of people of color. This honors and gives them credit for their awesome talents. It doesn't happen enough! Brown and black faces have been scripted and part of history that have always been awesome and worth the awareness and support!"

Debra Weaver has been an educator for over thirty years. She's taught special needs children in the inner-city schools of Toledo and eventually became a principal in Toledo. After being hit by a semitruck in 2014 due to bad weather, it changed the course of what her life's work would look like. She has most recently started her own consulting business. Her special needs background, Masters and Doctorate degree all morphed together into her business called Woven Opportunities Business and Educational Consulting, LLC established in 2021.

She is passionate about hands on teaching that allows children and adults to explore through inquiry learning. She believes everyone deserves the opportunity to try new things, despite their educational or financial challenges.

The goal of teaching art is to let the students have the space and time to produce unique work, inspired from within. This first comes by providing the opportunities to do so. Mansfield Park and Recreation offers several free of charge occasions like this painting night! The north end is the biggest poverty-stricken part of Mansfield.

The free summer camps that the city provides are one of a kind. They are educationally sound and full of rich opportunities for kids to try new things like martial arts (Richland Academy of The Arts), learning about nature through local nature centers programs and the YMCA, and much more! The goal is to create a safe environ-ment for kids to experience true joy through learning! These camps create a common ground for children to feel valued, important, and loved! Camps are educationally sound and emotionally enriching.

Weaver describes herself as a bit of a "brain nerd". She loves exploring the neuroscience behind thinking and learning as an educator. "We can take these anxious, fearful, scared individuals and turn them into inspired learners. We do this by giving them a safe space to relax and enjoy learning. Once comfortable and relaxed, their brain function can transition from the base of the brain to the frontal lobe," she explained with a large grin.

'The inability to problem solve and critically think, is one of the biggest stumbling blocks to learning. When we give a person the freedom and space to explore through learning, there are endless possibilities in store!"

The community summer camps usually fill up fast. There are 25 spots available in each of the two camps. The camps run Monday through Friday, from 9 am to 3 pm throughout the summer months. Funding happens through donations and contribution of time and talents.

'Fear and courage hold hands and are partners. It's about taking chances and trying new things. We were not meant to fit a mold, but to be unique!" said Weaver.

### OhioHealth now allowing more visitors

OhioHealth is now allowing two visitors per inpatient at all Ohio-Health hospitals. Most hospitalized patients will select two designated visitors for the duration of their stay.

Emergency departments, surgery and invasive procedure areas will continue to allow one visitor per day. Outpatient centers will continue to allow visitors by exception only.

All visitors will be required to wear a mask, except while eating, and be asymptomatic of COVID-19 symptoms.

Patients that have tested positive for COVID-19 can have one visitor per day from 2–6 pm for the duration of their stay or while in isolation.

Patients receiving behavioral health care must have scheduled visitation

Patients receiving end-of-life care and acute end-of-life patients may have up to three visitors at any given time, and no maximum number of visitors per day.

Maternity patients can have two visitors during the duration of their stay as well as a doula, if they so choose, during the labor and delivery portion of their stay. If laboring patients are minors, they may have parents/guardians in addition to the parent-to-be of the baby. Hospitals with NICUs will follow Nationwide Children's Hospital visitor management policy.

# Partnership announced to promote road safety for teen drivers

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced a partnership between the Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) and the Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) to raise awareness about the resources available to help teens drive safely.

"We want everyone on the road to make it home safely. If we put teens in controlled driving situations before they face them in real time, they will be better prepared to navigate the road safely," said Governor DeWine. "Inexperience behind the wheel is a major factor in crashes for new drivers. Giving our young people more opportunities to practice making good driving decisions will prevent crashes and save lives."

OTSO houses the Teach Your Teen to Drive (TYTTD) website, which includes links to short videos for teens to learn how to safely enter and exit a highway, change lanes, and manage intersections. Other links feature a guide with tips and tricks to prepare for behind-the-wheel practice, Ohio driving laws and requirements, and a tool to help families track their progress and record which driving environment their teens need more practice with.

Governor DeWine has placed a priority on safe driving during his administration.

In 2019, he launched a statewide virtual driver assessment program, Ready, Test, Drive!, to better equip Ohio's new drivers with critical skills to safely navigate the roads. Additionally, by executive order in 2020, Governor DeWine created the Ohio Traffic Safety Council of federal, state, and local partners to focus on ways to make Ohio's roadways safer by using proven education, engineering, enforcement, emergency response, and public policy countermeasures.

The OTSO/OHSAA partnership builds on Governor DeWine's initiative by raising awareness during the boys and girls district, regional, and state basketball tournament games and sectional, district, and state wrestling tournaments. TYTTD messages will be included in programs, on parking passes and tickets, during public address announcements, and on signs and banners during the sporting events. The goal of this campaign is to create an open conversation between teens, parents, and other family members on the importance of road safety.

Crashes are the leading cause of death among young drivers (ages 15-20) nationally.

In Ohio, young drivers ages 15 to 25 represent almost 30% of deaths and 35% of serious injuries each year. This age group is more likely to be involved in fatal and serious crashes because they lack driving experience and tend to take greater risks.
