DAV holding virtual job fair for veterans Feb. 7

DAV (Disabled American Veterans) and RecruitMilitary[®] will co-host the Virtual All Veterans Job Fair on Tuesday, Feb. 7, from 11 am to 3 pm.

The event is free to veterans, their spouses, active-duty military personnel and members of the National Guard and Reserve.

More than 40 employers actively seeking the unique talents of America's veterans will be on-site representing a range of industries, from construction to medical to administrative and logistics, with career opportunities from entry level to senior management.

In addition to employment assistance, veterans can utilize career counseling and resume assistance, network with fellow veterans and military personnel, and get support with their Department of Veterans Affairs benefits and claims assistance — all at no cost.

This year, DAV will sponsor more than 90 in-person and virtual job fairs. Since the inception of its employment initiative in 2014, there have been nearly 2700,000 attendees and more than 167,000 job offers. New distracted driving law aims to make Ohio safer

Earlier this month, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine signed Senate Bill 288, which prohibits the use of electronic wireless communication devices (EWCDs) while operating a vehicle.

The new law goes into effect in April. Currently, Ohio is one of only four U.S. states that does not consider use of an EWCD while driving to be a primary offense for adults. That means adults can not be pulled over for using devices but could be cited if pulled over for a different reason. However, it has been a primary offense for teenagers under the age of 18 since 2012.

Traffic fatalities in Ohio have been on the rise for years. In fact, 1,068 were recorded in 2018. After steady increases of nearly 10 percent in each successive year, they reached 1,351 in 2021. We cannot deny the use of EWCDs has contributed: 11,910 crashes in 2021 were attributed to distracted driving, up 8.2 percent from 11,000 li 2020.

Public Opinion Strategies recently conducted a poll of 1,000 li-

censed drivers in Ohio. Their top concern on the roadways, regardless of age, political ideology or region, was distracted driving. More than 50 percent of respondents said they see another driver using handheld phones either "nearly every time they go out" or "most times they go out." With this, 61 percent of interviewed drivers believed a ban on EWCD use while driving would decrease accidents in Ohio.

This bill will help protect the safety of more than just motorists, pedestrians and road construction workers face danger daily at the hands of distracted driving. It is crucial that Ohioans work to make roads safer for everyone. SB 288 will assist with that effort in April.

Until then, drivers are asked that before sending a text message, making a phone call, emailing or watching video, they pull over and safely park first. Remember that life and the lives of your fellow Ohioans matter most.



Lewis and Clark sargeant visited Richland County



Patrick Gass was a truly remarkable man. Born June 12, 1771, in Falls Springs, Pennsylvania, he did not stay there long.

The family moved to Maryland in 1777, but Patrick went to live with his grandfather for several years to get an education. He spent much of his time exploring the countryside and did not learn to read and write until he was an adult.

In 1792, he joined the army to fight the Indians in the northwest under Major General Anthony Wayne. He served for two years and left to learn the carpenter trade. He reenlisted in 1801 and joined the Captain Bissell Company at Kaskaskia, Illinois, and served as a carpenter, helping to build winter quarters.

In 1803, President Jefferson purchased Louisiana and or-

A Gass descendant tried for many years to buy it and finally did when the hotel was sold. dered an expedition of the new unexplored lands. Patrick Gass was one of the volunteers. At the start of the expedition, Gass was a private but after the death of Sgt. Floyd, the men elected him to be the new sargeant.

His skills continued to be put to use in building winter camps at Camp Dubois (Illinois), Fort Mandan (North Dakota) and Fort Clatsop (Oregon). He also fashioned wagons to portage heavy canoes 18 miles through the forest around a series of falls on the Missouri River.

Lewis and Clark and First Sergeants Gass and Ordway were the only members of the exploring party ordered to keep daily journals of the journey. That of Sergeant Gass is particularity full and complete. It notes the name given to streams, the character of the Indians, animals and plants, the nature of the soil, the latitude and longitude of all marked places, etc.

This journal was the first account of the journey that was published in Pittsburgh in 1807, titled "Journal of the Voyages and Travels of the Corps of Discovery". Rather than printed in the words of Gass, a school teacher/book dealer named David McKeehan attempted to make a literary work of the journal and undoubtedly much of Gass' original comments and style were lost. Second and third editions were published in Philadelphia and in 1812 to 1814, English, French and German editions gave the book wide circulation. Gass received only 100 free copies for his effort.

In recent years, an original 1807 edition was sold at auction for \$21,000. The Gass original journal was evidently destroyed and the school teacher received all royalties from all future editions.



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William Gass, Patrick's brother, moved with his family from Brooks County West Virginia to Fairfield County, Ohio in 1800. Next they relocated to Knox County in 1806 and settled one mile east of Mt. Vernon. Patrick Gass visited his brother on his way home from the west.

William Gass' son James R. Gass recorded the visit in a family history, he penned; "I think it was December, 1806, that Uncle Patrick called on us on his way home from his long journey up the Missouri and down the Columbia Rivers with Captains Lewis and Clark. He was riding on an elegant red and white spotted horse and was steering for his parents home in Brook County, West Virginia., and remained with us some eight or ten days."

Gass was a notable character in and around Wellsburg, West Virginia, where he worked as a carpenter and other jobs, but grew restless and once more headed west.


At the outbreak of the War of 1812, he was in Nashville, Tennessee. He enlisted in the first Infantry and lost an eye during the battle of Lungy's lane. Discharged, he was given a pension of eight dollars a month.

Gass relished liquor and was well known for his rowdy behavior. At age 60 he was building a house for John Hamilton and eloped with his twenty year old daughter, Maria Hamilton. They would have seven children, two of which died in infancy.

It is recorded that Pat and his wife would banter back and forth. Maria would tell Pat, "I'll live to see the grass grow on your grave," to which he would tell Maria, "Be devil, no, I'm going to see geese eat grass off of yours."

Sadly, the young wife died of Measles Feb. 15, 1847, at age 36, leaving Pat with a young family to raise.

After having quite a week like a girl of her age would do, June soon discovers her mother is not at the airport when she goes to pick her up. This results in a huge worldwide search for her mother through any social medial channels she can get while also revealing so many buried secrets.

It's great this movie has been achieving a fine audience score and critical reviews. *Search*-

ing was praised for its structure and format and it's nice that *Missing* can continue in that trend while offering up lots of twists and turns within the story. Many people have seen the twists coming, though I am personally not someone who likes to

guess what happens, so some of these plot devices were quite surprising and welcome.

Missing is an engaging thriller with a fine performance from Storm Reid as this young girl just wanting to find her mother as she gets constantly dragged down by questions about her past. The movie runs at a good pace and is certainly a fun watch for anyone who is a fan of the genre.



He was baptized and absolved of his sins in the Ohio River in front of a crowd of hundreds who came to watch the colorful old man. It was like a holiday.

He had joined the Campbellites denomination and became a traveling speaker or exhorter for them.

He was known for his ability to sway an audience and as such visited Richland County and his brother William who lived in Troy Township several times.

Patrick Gass died April 2,

1870, at age 98, near Wellburg, West Virginia. He was the last survivor of the 32 members of the Lewis and Clark expedition.

He and Maria were buried in unmarked graves in a private farm cemetery until their remains were moved by a family member to a local Wellsburg Cemetery.

In the mid 1900s family or local veterans groups finally provided a suitable grave stone.

Richland County historian D. W. Garber once visited the site and much of the material in this story came from his writings.

CARROT SWEET POTATO SOUP

Ingredients

2 Tbsp. Olive Oil
1 medium onion chopped
1 large clove garlic
3 large sweet potatoes, peeled and cut in cubes
8–10 carrots, peeled and chopped
½ cup white wine to deglaze
1 1/2 Tbsp. chopped fresh sage
½ tsp. cinnamon
½ tsp. cumin
¼ tsp. nutmeg
Broth to cover (you can use vegetable or chicken)
Kosher Salt and Pepper to taste

Instructions

Heat oil in pan. Add onions and garlic and cook until they just start turning brown. Toss in carrots and sweet potatoes and cook for a few minutes. Add wine to deglaze the pan until liquid is reduced by half. Add rest of ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce temperature and simmer until veggies are soft. Remove from heat and carefully add to blender and puree (Beware Of Hot Liquid). Hold a dishtowel over the blender lid so you don't burn yourself. Turn on as low as it will go and slowly blend it. You can use an immersion blender, but you don't get the smooth consistency we are looking for in this soup. *This soup is delish if you finish it with a fresh cranberry relish and*

This soup is delish if you finish it with a fresh cranberry relish and some sugar toasted pecans For the relish: ½ cup fresh cranberries chopped, ¼ peeled chopped apple (a sweeter one), orange juice (maybe even some orange rind zested in there). Put cranberries and apple in pan and enough orange juice to just cover it. Cook for 15–20 minutes on low just until soft. In a frying pan toss the pecans with some sugar and kosher salt and heat until they begin to be "candied," be careful not to burn.

He was always fantastic with a volunteer's 8 year old son, and he always was perfect whenever he went on field trips away from the shelter, including the bike path and McDonald's. Stewart is good with other dogs, although he would probably chase cats (not hurt them just annoy them). Stewart does not have any food aggression, seems house trained, knows a lot of commands, and is all around fantastic and amazing! Stewart is still at the MANCI prison program and will remain there until he is adopted.

If interested in meeting any other dog, contact or visit the Richland County Dog Warden's Office and Shelter. Hours are 11 am to 4:15 pm Monday–Friday and 10–2 on Saturday.

Currently, adoptions are \$150, which includes spay/neuter, microchip, dog license and some vaccines.

Current needs are volunteers to walk and play with the dogs, bleach, laundry detergent and dog treats.

Help available for veterans

Beginning Jan. 17, veterans in acute suicidal crisis are able to go to any VA or non-VA health care facility for emergency health care at no cost. This includes inpatient or crisis residential care for up to 30 days and outpatient care for up to 90 days. Veterans do not need to be enrolled in the VA system to use this benefit.

The news release from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs explains that this expansion of care will help prevent veteran suicide by guaranteeing no cost care in times of crisis.

In September 2022, VA released the 2022 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report which showed that veteran suicides decreased in 2020 for the second year in a row and fewer veterans died by suicide in 2020 than in any year since 2006.

Eligible individuals, regardless of VA status are:

•Veterans who were discharged or released from active duty after more than 24 months of active service under conditions other than dishonorable.

•Former members of the armed forces, including reserve service members, who served more than 100 days under a combat exclusion or in support of a contingency operation either directly or by operating an unmanned aerial vehicle from another location who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

•Former members of the armed forces who were the victim of physical assault of sexual nature, a battery of sexual nature, or sexual harassment while serving in the armed forces.







This Day in History — Feb. 2, 1972: Pioneer 10, the world's first outer-planetary probe, is launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida, on a mission to Jupiter. In Dec. 1973, after successfully negotiating the asteroid belt and a distance of 620 million miles, Pioneer 10 reached Jupiter and sent back to Earth the first close-up images. In June 1983, the NASA spacecraft left the solar system and the next day radioed back the first scientific data on interstellar space. NASA officially ended the Pioneer 10 project on March 31, 1997, with the spacecraft having traveled a distance of some six billion miles.
