



Kingwood to present landscape inspirations symposium April 1

Kingwood Center Gardens will hold a half day symposium on Saturday, April 1, from 9 am to 12:30 pm in the Garden Gateway King Ballroom. The 2023 symposium theme is "Fostering Intentional Plant Communities." The event is open to the public and advanced registration is required.

The keynote speaker will be Austin Eischeid of Austin Eischeid Garden Design, Chicago, IL. Eischeid is the designer of the Meadow Garden in Kingwood's Perennial Garden. He will present methods to create a four-season garden by using the right combination of plants. These gardens can reduce watering and weeding needs as well as attract a wide variety of birds and other pollinators.

An Iowa native with a bachelor's degree in Horticulture from Iowa State University, Eischeid's work experience after studying include: Hermannshof Garden in Germany under the direction of Cassian Schmidt, Orchard Dene Nursery in England, and Chanticleer Garden in Philadelphia. In addition, he worked with mentors and colleagues Piet Oudolf and Roy Diblik on a number of projects to gain practical knowledge on dynamic planting plan designs and layouts.

Kingwood's Executive Director, Josh Steffen, will also speak and introduce the concepts of intentional plant communities and how these design approaches differ from traditional garden design.

The symposium has been approved for the following continuing education units: 1 OCNT through the Ohio Green Industry Association; 1 CEU through the Professional Grounds Management Society; 3 CEUs through the National Association of Landscape Professionals.

HEAP helps Ohioans at or below 175 percent of the federal poverty guidelines pay their heating bills. Anyone age 18 and older may apply for this assistance. Those 60 and over can get assistance with filling out the application. All heating types are eligible, including electric, wood, coal, natural gas, propane and kerosene.



March of Prayer returns to area churches

The Fifth Annual March of Prayer will fill 40 nights with worship and prayer, each night hosted by a different church, as a commitment to the unity they have in Jesus.

The churches, which affiliate with more than 20 denominations and associations, each will offer worship in their particular, authentic style, inviting the community to join in prayer and praise.

The services begin each night at 6 pm, except March 9 and 25, and five of the services during Holy Week leading to Easter, and will offer prayer for a variety of topics and concerns, including local ministries, community leadership, and national issues, with a special focus on victims of addiction and the path of recovery.

Of special interest will be the creation of the Jericho Wall of Remembrance and Recovery, planned for this summer at a retaining wall next to a parking area east of First Christian Church, on West Dickson Ave, near West Third and Bowman Streets.

Fundraising will begin in March, with artists' painting in the Summer and dedication during Mental Health Month in September. The Planning Committee includes representatives of the City Arts Council, local churches, Mansfield Council, Volunteers of America and Mansfield Rotary Club.

"I know of no other event just like this," said Rev. Paul Lintern,

who again organized this year's March of Prayer.

"It is often that churches in any city will have cooperative worship services, for special occasions, and it is not unusual for a church to host nightly prayer events indefinitely, but I am yet to find any community that will schedule a prayer service at a different location so many nights in a row."

The first March of Prayer, in 2019, filled every night in March, then was continued for another 19 days until Easter, because of other churches wanting to join in, using the theme, "Mansfield is Gods-

field," then "Richland is God's Land.

The next year, was cut short by COVID after 16 days, but continued for 45 days through nightly "living room" prayer services offered on the Godsfield Facebook page, which still keeps participants up-to-date on March of Prayer services and local church events.

The last two years have filled March, and added nightly services during Holy Week, concluding with the Sunrise Service at KingOne of the special parts of each service occurs when guests from other congregations are invited to offer blessings for that evening's hosting church.

God moves in a community when its people come together to pray; several ministries along Park Avenue West, including ARC Empowerment Center, Rubies, and Elijah's House, can safely be described as Godsfield ministries, as many congregations helped to start and maintain these addiction-related ministries," according to Lintern.

"This is a remarkable opportunity for people to visit churches they are curious about, and to join in singing and prayer with their Godsfield partners."



"ROOT VEGETABLE SOUP WITH DILL DUMPLINGS

For the Dumplings: 2 cups flour

2 Tbsp. baking powder

1/4 cup chopped scallion

1 cup + 2 Tbsp. buttermilk

1 Tbsp. salt

3 Tbsp. dill

1 tsp. pepper

Ingredients

2 onions, chopped

Olive oil

4 cloves garlic, chopped

5 stalks celery, chopped

2 turnips, peeled and cubed

2–3 parsnips, peeled and cut

2 sweet potatoes, peeled and cubed

2 yellow potatoes, cubed

2 cups red cabbage shredded/or sliced medium thickness

Salt & Pepper 1 Tbsp. dill

1-2 32 ounce boxes of chicken broth

Instructions

In a stockpot cover bottom with olive oil and add garlic and onions and saute for 5–10 minutes until they become fragrant and translucent. Add celery, turnips and parsnips and stir around for 5 minutes. Add potatoes and broth and bring to a boil. Add the cabbage and simmer until potatoes are soft. Add salt & pepper and dill. While the soup is simmering, mix all the dumpling ingredients in a bowl. When soup is boiling (and 10 minutes before serving) drop the dumplings into soup (we used a small ice cream scoop). Cover and cook for 5–10 minutes until dumplings are cooked. (Size will depend on cooking time.)



The Mansfield Symphony & Chorus join forces at the Renaissance Theatre as they continue the 2022–'23 season on Saturday, March 18 at 8 pm to present Carl Orff's choral masterpiece, "Carmina Burana."

Considering that rhythm and rock'n'roll fit together like a hand and glove, when it comes to classical music the percussion generally take a back seat to rows and rows of stringed and wind instruments. For this unique performance, the percussion will be getting a real workout – along with the rest of the orchestra.

"Carmina Burana" is a 24 piece cantata that is the only work for which its composer, Carol Orff, is known for today; however, it is a standard component of the classical repertoire – or at least the first and last movements. "O Fortuna," which features an overwhelming martial air, has been featured many times over in everything from film scores to television commercials for generations.

Sung in its original Latin and middle high German, no translation is needed – the music speaks for itself. Once the military feel of the opening movement is dispensed with, the cantata slows down and becomes lighter, relying on rhythm as it heralds the arrival of spring, celebrating love.

The composer wrote this work in a very sophisticated time and location in a time when academic composers such as Schoenberg were in his contemporaries. It was the equivalent of a pop show, music that was definitely shunned.

This performance will be directed by Mansfield Symphony Orchestra Music Director and Conductor Octavio Mas-Arocas.

Ohio NRCS announces Conservation Stewardship Program Funding

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Ohio Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is accepting applications from land-owners interested in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) to build on existing conservation efforts to increase operational efficiencies and environmental benefits as well as reduce overall input costs. This year, Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) funding is providing additional financial opportunities for select conservation practices and enhancements to increase direct climate mitigation benefits. The deadline to receive fiscal year 2023 funding for both CSP-Classic and CSP-IRA is April 7, 2023.

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like cover crops, ecologically-based pest management, buffer strips, and pollinator and beneficial insect habitat – all while maintaining active agriculture and forestry production on their land.

"In addition to the environmental benefits, NRCS conservation programs are good for your operation's bottom line," said John Wilson, NRCS Ohio State Conservationist. "The Conservation Stewardship Program allows farmers to address resource concerns like nutrient management, soil quality and energy use, which can really impact an operation's margins."



This Day in History — March 2, 1967, Senator Robert Kennedy proposes a three-point plan to help end the war. The plan included suspension of the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam and the gradual withdrawal of U.S. and North Vietnamese troops from South Vietnam with replacement by an international force. Secretary of State Dean Rusk rejected Kennedy's proposal because he believed that the North Vietnamese would never agree to withdraw their troops. Kennedy had been Attorney General under his brother, President John F. Kennedy. When the elder Kennedy was assassinated. Robert staved on to serve his successor, Lyndon B. Johnson, but resigned his post in 1964 to run for the Senate. In the Senate, Kennedy initially continued to support U.S. efforts in Vietnam despite his growing apprehension about the war, especially the massive bombing of North Vietnam, because he was reluctant to disagree with the Johnson administration. As racial strife and urban violence intensified Kennedy found it increasingly difficult to remain silent. The presidential campaign of 1968 opened the door for him to act on his concern. Kennedy announced his intentions to run on March 16. When President Johnson announced that he would not seek re-election, Kennedy quickly emerged as a serious contender for the presidency. On June 4, 1968, he won the all-important California primary, thereby becoming his party's front-runner. That night, after addressing his supporters at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, he was shot by Sirhan Sirhan. He died the following day at the age of 42.
