Columbia Gas of Ohio acknowledges Safe Digging Month

Since 2008, April in Ohio has been proclaimed Safe Digging Month. Columbia Gas of Ohio encourages customers and contractors to contact 811 at least 48 hours before starting any digging project.

Thousands of buried utilities are damaged each year due to digging activities.

Safe Digging Month reminds homeowners and contractors that digging without knowing the approximate location of underground utilities can result in serious injuries, inconvenient service disruptions and costly repairs when gas, electric, communications, water and sewer lines are damaged.

Contacting 811 is free. Dial 811 or visit https://www.oups.org/ at least 48 hours before digging.

After an initial contact of 811, professional locators will arrive at the digging site to mark the approximate locations of underground lines with flags, spray paint or both. Each color of paint and/or flag represents a unique type of underground utility.

As part of National Safe Digging Month, Columbia Gas encourages homeowners to take the following steps when planning a digging project this spring:

•Always call 811 a few days before digging. Call at least 48 hours before beginning your project.

•Consider moving the location of your project if it is near utility line-markings.

• If a contractor has been hired, confirm that the contractor has called 811. Don't allow work to begin if the lines aren't marked.

Gages Ontario Airport

Very few remember when Gages Airport was a popular landing field. Paul Gages established it on fairly level ground just off Beer Rd. and Park Avenue West or old Rt. 30. He had given up farming and his milk route to Mansfield and his first smaller airfield he had was between Scotland and Ireland Blvds in what is now the eastern edge of Ontario. He had laid out an allotment there and was building houses.

The Beer Rd. location offered more space and better landing surtace for early bi-planes. Gages built three good-sized hangers and my wife remembers that as a little girl flying with her father, their office had a candy counter. She always liked that airport because her dad would usually give in and buy her something.

In an interview, the late Paul Gages Jr. said his dad's first airplane was a used 1917 Lincoln Standard with a 90 horsepower OX5 Wright Whirlwind engine. That was a reliable and much preferred engine, the same engine Lindburg flew the Atlantic with.

Although he owned the field and had his own plane, Paul Jr. said his father could fly but never got his pilot's license. He always took a licensed pilot with him.

As a promotion, Gages put on an air shows each summer which attracted thousands. There were aerial acrobatics and parachute jumps. In one event, a flier would drop a bag of flour at a target on the ground, and when it hit, young Paul, hidden in a fence row, would set off a stick of dynamite.

Young Paul Jr. took flying lessons from his older brother, Glenn, who had a commercial license and could teach pilots. Paul Jr. got his when he was 12. Sadly, Glenn was killed in 1930 when a student froze at the stick and both were killed in a crash.

No airshows were held after that.

A major fire occurred in 1947 when one hanger burned. At that time Springfield Township had no fire department and five planes were lost or damaged.

Paul Jr. suspected it was arson but refused to name the suspect. Gages field passed into history when the business and field were


sold for the location of the General Motors Plant. Sadly, both have passed into history.

Vice president Howard White, wonderfully played by Chris Tucker, believes in him and the company's CEO Phil Knight (Affleck) wants them to take a different path. Sonny is determined and goes to visit Jordan's parents to hopefully make the deal of a lifetime.

This movie is great because it's really centralized around Damon's terrific performance as Sonny and watching this extremely determined guy not stop until he gets the deal he wants. The cast is excellent from Bateman, Tucker, Affleck, Marlon Wayans in a brief scene and Viola Davis, who shines as always, as Jordan's mother. It is

also interesting how *Air* approaches the character of Jordan.

One of the best things about the movie is its script by Alex Convery, who makes this dialogue pop on screen. There are arguments over the phone that Sonny is having with Jordan's agent, played

by Chris Messina, that are just as wonderful to listen to as to watch.

Air is a very engaging movie and Affleck with movies like *Argo, Gone Baby Gone* and *The Town* has showed that he is a very competent director. This is a different kind of movie for him, and he handles it well. It's also great to see him and Damon back on screen together for the first time since their terrific *Good Will Hunting.*

Go see *Air* in theaters if you are or are not a sports fan (I am not and really enjoyed this one). There are so many layers to this story. The performances, direction and script really sparkle and this is one of the best movies that has come out so far this year.

Mayor White announced a joint meeting with council and the Planning Commission is scheduled for March 29 for a housing study.

The mayor read the Ohio Senate commendations for the village's outstanding achievement for leverage of Lexington's comprehensive plan.

Chief Brett Pauley reported that the annual Police Drug Take-Back day is April 22, and will be held in back parking lot from, 10 am to 2 pm. Body cameras have been failing and the village was asked to cover the costs of new cameras. Approximate cost is \$6,800.

Councilman Kearns updated Council regarding new practices at the Cemetery Board; including hiring two financial officials. Township meetings will take place twice a month on the second and last Monday until further notice with meeting time moved back to 6 pm from 6:15 pm.



Richland County Foundation grants help meet emerging needs

In aligning with Ohio's Attainment Goal, the Foundation wants to help fill the gap between job openings and certified employees as well as lead the way to support workforce development through CTE scholarships.

The board approved grants from donor-advised funds which allow individuals and families the opportunity to make grant suggestions to favorite charities. Donor-advised funds are a flexible and convenient alternative to a private foundation. It is also a way to keep charitable contributions anonymous, at the preference of the donor.

Senate Passes Brenner Bill helping spouses of disabled veterans

The Ohio Senate passed a bill sponsored by State Senator Andrew Brenner (R-Delaware) that will expand the situations in which surviving spouses of disabled veterans may receive the "homestead" tax exemption.

The special enhanced exemption of \$50,000 is available for the homesteads of military veterans who are rated as totally disabled by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. If the disabled veteran dies, the veteran's surviving spouse may continue to claim this exemption until the spouse dies or remarries.

Currently, a surviving spouse may claim the exemption only if the disabled veteran received a total disability rating and qualified for exemption before the veteran's death. Senate Bill 43 allows a surviving spouse to claim the exemption in the rare case that the veteran applies for a total disability rating but dies before receiving it.

"This bill addresses an oversight in current law that left surviving spouses of veterans in the rare but unfortunate situation of having applied for disability status but died before their application was accepted," said Brenner. "Our veterans are not the only ones who make tremendous sacrifices for our country – their families do, as well. I would like to thank the constituent who brought this to my attention for her outreach, and her and husband's service to our country."

Earth Day is April 22, and the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) is celebrating with an Earth Day Cleanup Challenge.





This Day in History — On April 13, 1970, disaster strikes 200,000 miles from Earth when oxygen tank No. 2 blows up on Apollo 13, the third manned lunar landing mission. Astronauts James A. Lovell, John L. Swigert, and Fred W. Haise had left Earth two days before for the Fra Mauro highlands of the moon but were forced to turn their attention to simply making it home alive. Mission commander Lovell reported to mission control on Earth: "Houston, we've had a problem here," and it was discovered that the normal supply of oxygen, electricity, light, and water had been disrupted. The landing mission was aborted, and the astronauts and controllers on Earth scrambled to come up with emergency procedures. The crippled spacecraft continued to the moon, circled it, and began a long, cold journey back to Earth. The astronauts and mission control were faced with enormous logistical problems in stabilizing the spacecraft and its air supply, and providing enough energy to the damaged fuel cells to allow successful reentry into Earth's atmosphere. Navigation was another problem, and Apollo 13's course was repeatedly corrected with dramatic and untested maneuvers. On April 17, with the world anxiously watching, tragedy turned to triumph as the Apollo 13 astronauts touched down safely in the Pacific Ocean. (history.com)
