Lew Ryan, Arbor Day both celebrated in Lexington

On May 19, the Village of Lexington celebrated Arbor Day and also honored their oldest citizen, Lewis (Lew) Ryan, who is 101 years old. There was a ceremony at 10 am on the square, which the third grade students from Central Elementary attended.

Lew Ryan was honored and helped put the first shovel of dirt into the ground around the newly planted tree. He still lives in the same white house on Frederick Street that he's lived in since he was a young boy. His parents moved from his farming community of Palmyra, Ohio when he was about 10 years old. He told me he has many fond memories of farm life and how he's also loved living in the small town of Lexington.

Monday through Saturday he has coffee at Kell Hardware for about an hour. He still drives at one hundred and one years of age! I spoke with his niece, Missy Saprano, who had only words of admiration about her uncle:

"He is so very sharp and has led a very simple life. He's really loved (Continued on Page 7)

Ontario board prepares to close another school year

The Ontario Local School Board of Education met May 9.

The board recognized Connie Brinegar's retirement and Condrea Cannada presented an Overview of the Food Service Program.

A CCP and Academic Update/Presentation was given for 2022–'23 student achievements.

A federal programs update was given by Mike Ream, Director of Education.

The board approved employment of certificated staff personnel on one-year limited contracts for the 2023–'24 school year for Holly Hale, third grade teacher, BA, \$42,674; Jamee Burke, high school math, MA, \$61,271; and Ashlee Scott, kindergarten long term sub, \$125 per day first 60 days/\$230.67 per day for 125 days, \$36,334.

The board approved the contract for Veregy to complete an energy project. The project provides for the upgrade of the pool to a salt water system. Building problems are also going to be addressed with insulation, caulking and weatherstripping. Through the savings, new soccer bleachers are going to be installed for spectators at the soccer complex.

The five-year forecast was submitted by the treasurer.

The resignation of Wendy Henige, first grade teacher, effective at the end of her 2022–'23 contract, was accepted.

The board amended the previously approved retirement date of June 1, 2023, for Mike Lyons to reflect July 1, 2023, due to the state track meet being held after June 1, 2023.

Isaac Gruber was hired as temporary employment for summer help in bus garage at \$12 hourly.

The board approved the 2023-'24 salary notices.

The board authorized the participation in Federal Grants (IDEA, IDEA-B, Title I-A, Title II-A, Title IV-A) for the 2023–'24 grant year.

Four extended days at the per diem were approved for math teachers to attend math training July 10-13. Training is required to offer the new MMR Math Class at the high school. This was approved for Scott Kreger, Jamee Burke and Sarah Krichbaum.

Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 9943 Auxiliary and Mansfield Memorial Park will hold the 52nd Annual Avenue of Flags Ceremony Sunday, May 29, at 1 pm at Mansfield Memorial Park, 2507 Park Avenue West, Ontario.

Over 200 flags donated in the past by families of deceased Veterans interred at the park will be up throughout the park.

Five new flags will be presented during the ceremony Joseph J. Bapka, U.S. Army; Richard L. Geog, U.S. Army; Gene A. Hartland, U.S. Navy; Robert G. Keller, U.S. Marines; and Raymond T. Shaum, Jr., U.S. Marines.

It's crazy to think the Fast and Furious franchise has been going since 2001. What started out

as a fun street racing movie turned into an action-packed chise known for its outlandish chase sequences and being a part of the family.

The tenth (!) entry in the series Fast X is everything fans of this movie would expect.

After a flashback scene from a previous film that shows Dom

Toretto (Vin Diesel) and Brian (the late Paul Walker) stealing a huge safe, the son of the man whose money they stole is now out for revenge. His name is Dante and proves to be the most maniacal and outrageous villain this franchise has produced.

Jason Momoa plays Dante with such insane gestures and style that it is almost difficult to take him seriously. Momoa balances it out nicely though and he becomes the most memorable part of this movie.

Dante goes after the team one by one including Letty (Michelle Rodriguez) who has been kidnapped and has some rather unnecessary scenes with Charlize Theron's Cypher.

Han, Tej, Roman and Ramsey have their own mission that is entertaining though some more fleshed out humor between Tej and Roman is always appreciated. Chris "Ludacris" Bridges and Tyrese Gibson always make a fun comedy team. John Cena is

back as Dom's brother who must help his young nephew escape the people coming to get him.

The action scenes in this movie are always top notch though. There is a giant bomb shaped like a big rolling ball that they have to chase down the streets of Rome, a chase between Dom

and Dante involving two helicopters is fun and it's nice to see Jason Statham return briefly as Shaw with some good hand to hand combat.

Fast X does not bring anything new to the franchise, it is certainly an improvement over the previous entry which was so outlandish and crazy that they actually went to space (which was something that was joked about).

Fast X is at least grounded the whole time and the action scenes are so fun with a scenery chewing villain played by Jason Momoa. If you are a fan of this franchise, there will be plenty to enjoy and viewers should definitely stay for the end credits for a big surprise for the next film in the series.






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Many Civil War Soldiers were from Richland County

U.S. Senator John Sherman was in Washington and returned to Mansfield, and without ever wearing a uniform or being a member

of the military, was in a span of three weeks able to organize what was named 'The Sherman Brigade," consisting of 2,300 volunteers.

Addressed as "Col. Sherman" he had no military office. The way was smoothed by permission from President Lincoln. He was to receive no pay, no rank or compensation for expenses.

It consisted of the 64th and 65th Regiments, 6th Battery and McLaughlin's Squadron of Calvary, all volunteers from Richland County.

The Sherman Brigade is remembered by the people of Richland County by the hundreds of ancestors of men who served from this area. Many of the finest men from Richland and surrounding couA portrait of John Sher--nties paid the supreme sacrifice and left a heritage of heroism.

The 64th and 65th were assigned to the 20th Brigade, under General James Richland County Public A. Garfield, and saw action in the Battle Library. of Shiloh.

The regiment, in a brigade of other troops from other states, participated in many battles and were often miles apart. The list of engagements of each is too numerous to mention.

After the war, Col. John Sherman was affectionately called "Uncle John" by the people of Richland County.

When he died on Oct. 22, 1900, an honor guard marched at his funeral. With the thinning roll of living veterans, only about 50 were able to answer the last call of the Brigade.

As a Richland County historian and writer who researched much of this story was to write, "The members of the Sherman Brigade had lost their hero – their horn had been silenced."

Lexington starts discussion about possible levy

Lexington Village Council met May 1, with Mayor Brian White presiding. This meeting was a joint meeting with the Troy Township Trustees and council members present were Bob Jarvis, Zack Alleshouse, Adam Gongwer, Wynn Rearns, Kim Little and Jeff O'Brien.

Also attending were Attorney John Studenmund, Chief Brett Pauley, Administrator Andrew Smallstey, Troy Township Trustee Jeff Carter, and Troy Township Trustee Mike Schuster and Troy Township Trustee Tom McCready.

During even years, two Troy Township Trustees serve on the Cemetery Board with one Council member. During odd years, two council members serve and one trustee.

Councilman Kearns reported the resignation of Troy Township Fiscal Officer Dean Strohminger in February 2023. DiAnn Jamerson as treasurer and Kevin Angle as secretary will fill the remainder of the year for that position.

Councilman Kearns noted that the township has two CDs in good standing. The township has also cleaned up and utilized better systems for purchasing, invoicing and paying bills. Jamerson has implemented and confirmed all paperwork must be filled out prior to starting any work orders.

Councilman Kearns informed members that the cemetery board has organizational authority for all three cemeteries. However actual maintenance and expenses are separated. Lexington Union Cemetery, E. Main St., has 14.8 acres that are Cemetery Board expenses. Bell Road and Gass Road cemeteries are Troy Township expenses with oversight and organization by the Cemetery Board.

Trustee Schuster noted that they have hired contract mowing services to maintain the two Troy Township Cemeteries after a review was made by the Cemetery Board.

A possible levy discussion was held. The current ½ mil levy was put in place 45 years ago. Things have become more costly since then. A possible second joint council/trustee meeting may be held some time in September of this year. The bottom line, based on initial findings, is that the village can no longer keep up with all the expenses. Attorney Studenmund advised all paperwork for the ballot must be completed 90 days before the election.

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Mr. Mitchell of Fox Road asked for clarification regarding the status of the Troy Township Fiscal Officer and if his finance records were available for public viewing. Councilman Kearns stated the fiscal officer resigned after completing and submitting the 2022 audit report. All records appear to be in good standing.

Mr. Bacin of Cedarwood Drive asked if anything was new regarding Gables Crossing's sidewalks and streetlights. Mayor White said they are still researching.

As reported by Administrator Andrew Smallstey, the first round of street sweeping was scheduled for the beginning of May. The village planned to celebrate May 19, as Arbor Day on the square honoring

Illegal signs and high grass ordinances have been reviewed and they will be monitored throughout the season. The website upgrade will be completed soon and hopefully live before Memorial Day.

Councilman Kearns asked when the rebidding of the street resurfacing project will be and Smallstey replied that May 10 is the bid opening date.

Councilman O'Brien asked if Patriot Park's driveway will be done this year. Smallstey confirmed that it will.

As reported by Mayor Brian White, he and Smallstey visited Mid-Ohio Sports Car to work on embracing the track's heritage with the village. A ribbon cutting at Jackie's Cheesecake was to be held May 2.

"I am continuing to work on the Comprehensive Plan and have received a proposal from Edge Group from Delaware regarding Main Street Design. This will include the intersection at State Route 97 and U.S. Route 42," said Mayor White.

'We expect to have the project complete within six months. Costs should not to exceed \$45,000. Council approved this funding."

Councilman Little asked if the person who hit electric pole on Plymouth Street was hurt and Chief Brett Pauley said they were not injured.

An Executive Session was held to discuss purchase or sale of property. Mayor White requested Administrator Smallstey to also attend the Executive Session.

the small-town feel of Lexington. He was a wonderful husband to his late wife, Alice (Lewis) Ryan and a great father to his three children, Gary, Marcy (Ryan) Brown and Kevin. He is an amazing person to just sit with and talk about his days of long ago; the historical experience is so worth it! All of the Lewis family love him very much and are looking forward to seeing him at this year's family reunion which they celebrate every two years.

Regardless of his age, Lew can still remember every detail of his childhood. The brick roads where farmers would ride into town, and where every shop was located. Ryan graduated from Lexington High School in 1940 with 32 students in his class. He owned the Sinclair Service Station (located at the current Buck's Bar and Grill) for over 30 years.

It's been said that when you plant a tree, a miracle occurs. The tree becomes a place for kids to play and climb. A shady spot for a picnic, a pleasant addition to your home, and beauty for your city.

I believe this Greek Proverb says it best, "A society grows great when old men plant trees whose shade they know they shall never sit in." There's something to be said about selflessly caring for future generations. It was neat to see the correlation between Lew and the young third graders.

Village of Lexington Mayor Brian White welcomed the guests and read a proclamation. The Village of Lexington was recertified as a "Tree City U.S.A." for 2022 by the National Arbor Day Foundation. This Nebraska based organization is dedicated to encouraging tree care and tree planting programs across the country. Ohio leads the United States with 225 cities and villages receiving this recognition.

Administrator, Andrew Smallstey, also gave an introduction and greeting. Peter Them, Finance Director, talked about the history of Arbor Day. Parks Superintendent, Todd Ward, talked about the importance of planting trees to the third graders. They listened with anticipation and took turns lifting a shovel of dirt around the newly planted tree.

Arbor Day was founded in the 1800s. A pioneer named J. Sterling Morton from Detroit settled in Nebraska. As true nature lovers, Morton and his wife surrounded their newly built home with trees, shrubs, and flowers. Morton was a news reporter and soon had the job as editor of Nebraska's first newspaper. This gave him a chance to spread his knowledge and love for trees to all of his readers. As his reputation increased, he became secretary of the Nebraska Territory, which provided another chance at teaching people the value of trees. On Jan. 4, 1872, Morton proposed a tree-planting holiday to be called "Arbor Day." The date was set for April 10, 1972. It was estimated that more than one million trees were planted in Nebraska on the first Arbor Day.

ORECCHIETTE WITH SAUSAGE AND BROCCOLI RABE

Ingredients

3 tbsp olive oil

2-3 cloves garlic, chopped

1 lb Orecchiette pasta
1 bunch broccoli rabe (You can substitute broccoli or spinach)


1 lb loose Italian sausage (If links, take out of teh casing)

1/2-1 cup white wine or chicken broth (optional)

1 cup Grated Parmesan Cheese (more if preferred)

Have a pot of water boiling for pasta. Add some salt to the water and cook pasta. (This can be done while you are preparing the rest of the ingredients.) Drain (you can save some of the pasta water as well to add back into pasta if it is too dry). In a large sauté pan, heat the olive oil and add the garlic. Saute for 2-minutes, be careful not to brown the garlic, you just want a nice saute until you really start getting some fragrance. Add sausage and cook stirring often to make sure garlic does not overcook. (If you are worried about the garlic, you can pull garlic out after you saute it and just set it aside while you cook the sausage. Then add garlic back in after sausage is cooked.) While sausage is cooking wash and chop the broccoli rabe. When sausage is browned add the broccoli rabe. Saute for a few minutes until greens are wilting. Cover and let greens cook make sure they do not get too mushy. Add wine or broth if pan becomes too dry. Add sausage and broccoli rabe to drained pasta, add pasta water if you would like. Sprinkle cheese over pasta and mix in. Add a nice green salad and loaf of bread and you have a perfect meal.

Former Ohio State Football players running back Antonio Pittman, defensive tackle Doug Worthington and offensive guard Ben Person will be at the benefit dinner to meet and greet

Pittman rushed for 2,945 yards from 2004-'06 for the Buckeyes. He now is a Columbus City firefighter.

Worthington was a defensive tackle for the Buckeyes from 2005-2010. The Pittsburgh Steelers drafted him in 2010. After the Steelers released him, he went on to play for the following teams: Tampa Bay, Washington, San Diego and St. Louis. Person was an offensive guard from 2004-'09 and started all 13 games as the Buckeyes played for a national title in 2007.

Since its inception in 2018, the Doug Castle Legacy Fund has awarded three college scholarships to Mansfield Senior High School graduates. This year the Doug Castle Legacy Fund awarded grants to the North End Community Improvement Collaborative for its new community center and to the Blessed to Run Track organization for scholarships for student athletes.

His wife, Liz; son, Michael, and daughter, Beth, want to support education programs, racial equity and inclusion, mentorship, and community building.

Doug began his teaching ca-

reer in 1965 at John Simpson Junior High School and took an active role in coaching football, basketball, and track.

Castle retired from Mans-field City Schools in 2000 after years of leadership including as principal of Simpson, and then worked as the Galion Middle School principal for the next five

For years he was the director of the Mansfield Mehock Relays and then the Gorman Wrestling Tournament. Ohio State University Football Coach Jim Tressel hired Castle to work as an Academic Encourager for the young men on the football team.

Castle developed an administrative philosophy based on being fair and keeping a sense of humor. He was a staunch believer in disciplining children in a way that would not destroy their dignity or self-respect. He valued every student.
