ODA Director Brian Baldridge visits Richland County

The last day of May was sunny and warm for the Ohio Department of Agriculture's (ODA) visit to Richland County. Richland Soil and Water Conservation District (Richland SWCD) Director Erica Thomas, met new ODA Director Brian Baldridge at the Ohio Federation of Soil and Water Conservation District Partner meeting during the winter and afterward extended an invitation to visit Richland County to see examples of conservation practices at work and get a feel of projects Richland SWCD is involved in throughout the county.

The first stop on the tour after a welcome from Commissioner Cliff Mears and Richland SWCD Director Thomas was at Kingwood Center Gardens to meet Executive Director Josh Steffen. He explained how the Garden Gateway project enhances the guest experience through artful and efficient stormwater management. The tour began in the parking lot in front of the Garden Gateway building. Steffen shared how bioswales were added to collect stormwater runoff from the building, parking lot and other hard surfaces to help filter and slow the water going into the Nature Pond.

The Story Book Trail has been enhanced with porous pavement which allows water to infiltrate the soil at a slow rate and prevent erosion. Throughout the tour, guests were treated to breathtaking blooming flowers and trees. Guests also got a sneak peak of Sean Kenney's Nature Connects made from LEGO bricks. Guests were shown how water is filtered and recirculated into the duckpond and Director Baldridge and guests got a behind-the-scenes look at the pumping station. Water is channeled off the Carriage house into a rain garden (planted with native plants to slow down water) and rainwater from rain barrels (used to water carnivorous plants).

To see how an urban farm operates, the tour continued to the NE-CIC Urban Farm in downtown Mansfield. Walt Bonham shared how the Farm is utilizing a former brownfield site located in a food desert area and using the site to produce food. The site formerly housed the Gorman-Rupp Company. High tunnels, greenhouses, raised beds, and some irrigation systems assist the collaborative efforts of

Voter registration deadline nearing for August special election

The deadline to register to vote or change an address or name for the Aug. 8, Special Election is Monday, July 10.

The Richland County Board of Elections office will be open that evening until 9 pm. The office is located at 1495 W. Longview Ave. Suite 101, in the Longview Center. After 4 pm., visitors must use the entrance at the lower level back parking area at the southwest corner of the building.

To register to vote, a resident must be either a native U.S. citizen or a naturalized citizen of the U.S. and a resident of The State of Ohio 30 days before an election.

Registered voters who have moved or changed their name must notify the board office in writing or in person. Voters currently registered in Ohio may change their address online at VoteOhio.gov but must do so by the July 10 deadline. Online registration is also now available at VoteOhio.gov

In addition to the board of elections office, citizens may register or complete a change of address/name at Richland County locations that include anylibrary branch, all city and village hall offices, The Bureau of Motor Vehicles Office, The Department of Human Services, The Richland County Courthouse (recorder or treasurer offices) and all area high school offices.

Registration forms may also be obtained from the Board of Elections website at www.boe.ohio.gov/richland or requested by mail. Contact the Board office at 419-774-5530 to have a form sent by mail. Completed voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days before Election Day.

Mansfield's Altman & Taylor Gas Engines

Altman Taylor was, at one time, Mansfield's largest industry. Founded in 1874 as the Altman Taylor Manufacturing Co., the owners were Cornelius Altman and H. H. Taylor.

Steam engines used to power equipment were mostly stationary units but in 1880, Altman Taylor developed the first steam driven traction engine. These became very popular and were the type of steam tractor copied by other manufacturers.

The company bought 28 acres in Mansfield. Three railroads became the Erie, Pennsylvania and the Baltimore and Ohio. This made shipment of incoming materials and out going equipment very convenient. Richland County farms supplied much of the oak, ash and hickory, but soon the volume of thresher production required more.

In 1869, the company built and shipped more than 400 threshers and by 1890 they bought 300 railroad cars of coal, 500 cars of lumber and 300 car loads of iron.

Starting with 150 employees, the company reached a peak of 900 in 1918, becoming one of Mansfield's largest employers. They manufactured a variety of farm implements and were the leaders in design and innovations in farm tool design, often copied by their competitors, John Deere, Case and McCormick.


As steam-powered tractors had a great pulling power, they had one draw back being that they needed a coal or wood fuel and water supply. To counter this, the company designed a gas and kerosene-powered tractor for farm and road work. These were built in a similar size and frame as the steam tractors. The competitor's gas and cheaper fuel tractors were smaller and more maneuverable. They were almost as powerful.

As a youngster, I remember the time after World War II when a man named Baughman, who lived south of Lexington on Route 546, came through town with one of those huge Altman Taylor gas tractors pulling a thresher. It was a sight to behold and I can still remember the thump, thump of the engine. It lumbered on through town leaving a wide eyed kid behind.

The best summer show was held at Malabar Farm where these

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


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whistle tooting snorting giants could strut their stuff to large crowds. But when the State stopped hauling them to the shoe and after one blew up near Cleveland injuring bystanders, the well meaning clown at Columbus passed a law demanding owners carry a \$1,000,000 insurance policy on them. These huge historic engines are seldom seen today.

Altman Taylor closed in Mansfield in 1923 and was sold to a firm in Indiana, and eventually to Allis Chalmers.

In 2018, Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse became an instant success due to its unique animation style which combined real-life looking characters with

actual comic book panels. It told the story of young Miles Morales who idolizes Spider Man and because of the explosion of a large machine, a multiverse opens up where Morales gets trained by Spider-Man and becomes his city's own superhero.

The movie was a huge hit and won the Oscar for best animated feature. Now, its sequel, *Spider-Man: Across the*

Spider-Verse has arrived and I am glad to say it is just as good as the original.

This story centers more on Gwen Stacy/Spider-Woman voiced

by Hailee Steinfeld. She has become the superhero of her multiverse. She ventures back to visit Miles (again voiced by Shameik Moore).

He follows her into a whole other universe where he meets another group of spider men and they band together to defend Miles. The film's main villain is really entertaining and

voiced by Jason Schwartzman named The Spot who has a connection to Miles and the original film. He opens portals and his first scene in the movie is one of the most entertaining.

These spider-verse films are so engaging and for being rated PG this is a pretty dark movie and more for older children and adults. There is enough of a recap at the beginning for viewers who did not see the original but seeing that first film is highly encouraged.

The computer animation and storytelling from Phil Lord and Christopher Miller is so engaging. For someone who does not see a bunch of animated films, these movies really excel and become more than just a generic kids flick.

At over a two hour run time, the movie goes at a really fast pace and it will be easy to miss things as they fly by on the screen. These characters are so much fun though and the different spider men are just as enjoyable as the group from the first movie.

Denver (Skittles)



After he is friends with a human, he loves to put his front paws on their shoulders, stare into their eyes, while touching noses together. Denver passed with dogs (male and female), cats and has no food aggression. Denver would need a home without children.

Denver is available at the Richland County Dog Shelter in Mansfield. Those interested in meeting him or any other dog, can contact or visit the Richland County Dog Warden's Office and Shelter. Hours are 11 am to 4:15 pm Monday–Friday and 10 am to 2 pm on Saturday.

Currently, adoptions are on a schedule based on the time the dog has been at the shelter. Dogs that have been at the shelter for more than a year are \$50; six months, \$100; longer than three months, \$125; and less than three months, \$150. This fee includes spay/neuter, microchip, dog license, and some vaccines.

The shelter needs volunteers to walk and play with the dogs as well as fill kongs for the dogs to play with when they are in their kennel, help with laundry or dishes, or clean the yard. The shelter uses a lot of bleach, laundry detergent, and dog treats and welcomes donations.

individual farmers. Walt explained in addition to selling at the Farm and the weekly Farmer Market (in season) they supply restaurants and grocery stores with produce. Dan Neef went on to say, "We've been getting anywhere between 60 to 130 pounds of lettuce per week out of our beds." Director Baldridge asked about supply versus demand and was impressed that the cooperative is not able to supply the demand. Walt stated, "I try to over-demand us. If I recruit a farmer, I need to make sure I can sell everything they are growing.

Governor Mike DeWine initiated the H2Ohio program to combat phosphorous runoff. Richland SWCD administers the program in Richland County and were pleased to have Director Baldridge meet one of the participants, Justin Ringler. This gave Director Baldridge an opportunity to hear how H2Ohio is working and

get feedback on the program.

Ringler and his family inter-seed a cover crop of wheat with the assistance of aerial seeding. Cover crops are planted to keep the winter soil covered to help prevent erosion. The Director asked Justin what he sees for the future. Justin answered, "We no-till for pragmatic reasons." He went on to suggest that H2Ohio be more representative of the landscapes and farming practices of a particular area, instead of a blanket of practices for everyone to adopt.

The last stop on the tour was an example of a log jam on the Black Fork River. The city of Shelby along with a group of citizens proposed a ditch petition request to remove log jams and debris along an 18-mile stretch of the Black Fork that starts at Mickey Rd. and ends at State Route 13. The ditch petition request is under consideration.

Additionally, Muskingum Watershed Conservancy District (MWCD) approved a grant of \$99,000 to Richland SWCD to clean up 5 logjams downstream of the ditch petition request, from Route 13 to Charles Mill Lake. Director Baldridge was able to view one of the five logjams that is funded by MWCD for cleanup as Richland SWCD explained both projects, and the logiam removal will begin this

The tour ended at the Richland SWCD office after a full day of Director Baldridge, staff, and guests learning about stormwater management, urban farming, H2Ohio practices, and ditch petitions in Richland County. Not a bad way to spend the day.
