Ontario 4th of July Festival is this weekend

The Ontario 4th of July Festival has been a staple of the community for over 20 years and will be held in Marshall Park in Ontario on Saturday, July 1.

This year there will be more Friday night activities on June 30, including a live band, car show, music and kids' activities.

On Friday, the car show, presented by Brian & Michelle Gates State Farm Insurance, will be held from 5:15–9 pm.

Band performances will be from 6–9 pm, a corn hole contest will be held from 6–9 pm, a beer garden will be open from 6–10 pm and concessions will be available from 6–9 pm.

The cost for a corn hole two-person team is \$30. Limited registrations will be taken.

On Saturday, there will be an expanded parade including a pets division and old favorites such as The Ontario Lion's Club Frog Jumping contest at 5 pm and food eating contests throughout the day.

The Ontario Liberty 5K Run will begin at 8:30 am. Registration ends June 29, at 8 pm. The entry fee is \$25 and cash prizes and gift cards will be awarded.

A kids area will be open from noon to 10 pm and will include inflatables and jump houses.

The first ever sky diving show will be added Saturday at 6 pm as well as a craft show from 11 am to 5 pm.

The Ontario 4th of July Pup Parade will be held at 3 pm Saturday, followed by the Ontario 4th of July Parade at 3:30 pm.

The Pup Parade will help support the Richland County Dog Warden's Office. The warden and her volunteers will be on hand with pups that are up for adoption. Local dogs and their owners will join in the parade.

Both parades will run down a portion of Shelby-Ontario Rd. and go through the park.

County Line will perform on the main stage at 8 pm Saturday night. Entry to Pour One Nine is 21 and over with an ID required.

Lexington's Sorellé, stars on NBC's "The Voice," will sing "The National Anthem" to kick off the largest fireworks show in North Central Ohio.

The most extensive raffle in festival history will take place this year. Raffle prizes include TVs, area restaurants and even a car from New Haven Auto Sales.

Butler's Mormon Miller

Jacob Myers was a millwright, a trade he had learned from his father. Sometime in the 1818s Myers moved to Jefferson Township just outside of Butler.

As part of a bargain, Myers built a water-powered grist mill near Applecreek which took a year and then received the future Butler land. There he built a large gristmill of his own in 1819 with an added saw mill and cooper shop for barrel making. A brother in law also opened a blacksmith shop. It was a profitable center of operation.

Sometime during either 1832 or 1833, Myers joined the newly created Church of The Latter Day Saints. This did not set well with his father, his wife or older children. Neither did it go well with many of his friends or mill customers.

New congregations were being formed in Worthington, Perry and Green Townships with Myers soon elected as Presiding Elder. As members of other mostly Protestant denominations began loosing members, ministers pounded their pulpits in condemnation of this "new" sinful church. It divided friends and families, some of the hatred and disconnect would never heal.

Myers, rather well off, was called upon to donate and borrow funds for the construction of the new Mormon Temple at Kirtland, where a wagon train of saints had settled after leaving New York.

Myers not only gave what he could, but being a mill wright, went there to help.

Hated and angered by some friends and family, in 1836 Myers led a wagon train of Mormons mostly from southern Richland County congregations, to Missouri and settled at Shoal Creek in Caldwell County.

Along the nearly three month trip they were threatened and harassed. He built a grist mill for David Hawn and the place became known as Hawn's Mills.

The Mormons settled in together in an area and worked and helped one another. Soon the settlement dominated the local population, economy and elections. This led to big trouble and even murders. It got to the point that Governor Boggs of Missouri ordered all Saints out of Missouri and had the leaders arrested. A few scattered but most went back east across the Mississippi River and settled in the Navoou, Illinois area. One again the

One again the JACOB MYERS was buried in the very corner of the Ankenytown Cemetery because of his Mormon faith and the fact that his daughter was married to the Leedy family.

same trouble erupted and the Mormon leader Prophet Joseph Smith was murdered while in jail.

In 1846, Myers in Illinois would lead a wagon train of fifty west and north through lowa to settle near Council Bluffs. There he would build more mills including one for Jacob Haun and the settlement became known as Haun's Mills. As had happened before, the population of Caldwell County grew to an estimated 5,000 with 4,900 being Mormon. Threats and violence occurred and with those threats the settlement armed themselves.

Again, Mormons were ordered out by the lowa governor but the next day, Oct. 30,1838, a mob of an estimated 200 to 240 armed men attacked the settlement and seventeen men and a twelvee-year-old boy were killed or died days later of their wounds. Thirteen men and one woman were injured. The attackers plundered and pillaged everything they could and left after two hours. One leader of a pack of the gang was a Methodist minister. Much was the hatred.

Jacob Myers was three miles away when the bloody attack was made, but arrived and helped with the wounded.

Fearing the attackers would return and desecrate the slain, Myers with two survivors and a woman put the bodies on a plank and carried them to a dug well that had not reached water and slid them in. Myers son had dug the well. Straw and dirt covered the dead.

Most fled the area. Myers stayed in Iowa a while, building mills and then then went back to Illinois, where he was a Presiding Elder of Freedom, Adams, County. Then back to Iowa.

Myers wife died in 1861 and her remains are buried in Bertram, Iowa. The loss of his wife of over fifty years and mother of his fifteen children and his advancing age caused him to slow.

He returned to Richland County a downcast old man and lived the rest of his life with daughter Delilah Myers Leedy, not in Butler, but a few miles away in the Knox County village of Ankneytown.

He died in 1867 a Mormon and because of his daughter being a Leedy, was allowed to be buried, but in the very south-east corner of the Brethren (Dunkard) Church Cemetery, in Ankenytown.

Jacob Myers lived a useful and colorful life. It started in Butler.

Currently, adoptions are on a schedule, based on the time the dog has been at the shelter. dogs that have been at the shelter for more than a year are \$50, dogs there more than six months are \$100, dogs at the shelter longer than three months are \$125, and dogs there less than three months are \$150. This fee includes spay/neuter, microchip, dog license, and some vaccines.

The shelter's current needs are volunteers to walk and play with the dogs as well as fill kongs for the dogs to play with when they are in their kennel, help with laundry or dishes, or clean the yard.

The shelter uses a lot of bleach, laundry detergent, and dog treats and welcomes donations.

This funding will keep individuals informed of the importance of vaccination benefits. The focus will center on older adults and people with disabilities who are most at-risk for negative health consequences and the underserved populations and disadvantaged communities. The grant will support vaccine accessibility, public health events, vaccine clinics, community outreach and education, and more. Together with other Aging and Disability Vaccination Collaborative grantees, the Area Agency on Aging will deliver vaccines and supportive services to more than 2 million older adults and people with disabilities.

"Older adults need to prioritize vaccinations, as research shows that as we age, our immune system slows down, chronic conditions become more common, and the body may be less able to fight off infection and more vulnerable to its complications. We are very thankful at the Agency to receive funds that will allow us to help older adults navigate the health system and stay up to date with recommended vaccines, including boosters for enhanced protection," Nicole Williams, Chief Operating Officer of the Area Agency on Aging.

USAging's Aging and Disability Vaccination Collaborative is funded by the U.S. Administration for Community Living. This Day in History — On June 29, 1995, the American space shuttle Atlantis docked with the Russian space station Mir to form the largest man-made satellite ever to orbit the Earth. This historic moment of cooperation between former rival space programs was also the 100th human space mission in American history. With millions of viewers watching on television, Atlantis blasted off from NASA's Kennedy Space Center in east-ern Florida on June 27. Just after 6 am on June 29, Atlantis and its seven crew members approached Mir as both crafts orbited the Earth some 245 miles above Central Asia, near the Russian-Mongolian border. Over the next two hours, the shuttle's commander, Robert "Hoot" Gibson expertly maneuvered his craft towards the space station. To make the docking, Gibson had to steer the 100ton shuttle to within three inches of Mir at a closing rate of no more than one foot every 10 seconds. The docking went perfectly and was completed at 8 am. It was only the second time ships from two countries had linked up in space; the first was in June 1975, when an American Apollo capsule and a Soviet Soyuz spacecraft briefly joined in orbit. Once the docking was completed, Gibson and Mir's commander, Vladimir Dezhurov, greeted each other by clasping hands. history.com
