Buckeye Imagination Museum ceremony celebrates opening of second floor

Executive Director, Fred Boll, said this project was eight years in the making. Opening up this second floor is another big step for the museum.

The joint capital campaign between the Renaissance Theatre and Buckeye Imagination Museum to create the Imagination District started under Mike Miller's leadership. Miller was the previous CEO of the Renaissance Theatre and now

He had this to say, "I want to personally thank all of the donors, individuals and everyone that made this happen," he said. "When Fred and I started this, it had really never been done before. Part of what nonprofits should do is help each other out. This has really been a fabulous project."

"The mission of the museum has always been to empower families through the power of play," Boll said. "All the research shows families that play together stay together. This was one of the big reasons we moved, because as kids started getting older, people didn't bring them to the museum as much. But now, you can bring your entire family and your entire family can play together."

It is truly a beautiful and bright location, full of natural light and vibrant colors. Local Artist, Allison Pence, created a colorful and stylized Mansfield mural, the laser room with the interactive "kind" and "bubble" wall, and the "dojo" room which includes the bamboo wall and rock climbing wall.

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It was in the Newspaper

Old newspapers are a curious thing to read. Found in the bottom of an old dresser drawer or library files, devoid of recent events, they often perk one's mind and give a side trip into days gone by. What an unusual life some folks lived in. What were they doing?

The October 1878 issues of the *Mansfield Herald* contained the following awry of news and notices;

"In our reference last week to the magnitude of business of the cracker bakery of Crawford and Zellers, we said last winter that they made as high as thitry-seven barrels of crackers daily, whereas we should have said they consumed as high as thirty seven barrels of flour daily. The bakery at present is making between one hundred and one hundred fifty barrels of crackers daily." (Note: this was the beginning of Nabisco.)

"It has been the custom in many parts of the country, to decorate the churches at harvest time as a token of gratitude for the goodness of the Great Giver. The ladies of the Congregational Church will give a festival in the church parlors on Wednesday evening, Oct. 23, at which time they will be happy to see all their friends and serve them the finest oysters of the season. Admission ten cents."

"Henry Carroll, charged with burglarizing the residence of George Byrd, south of the city, and attempting to ravish Eliza Lipham some months since, returned last week and was lodged in jail."

"The rumor that a lately married woman who resides on East Fourth street had committed suicide is without foundation."

"Many since our last report, the Mayor has had the following parties before him: Frank Clark, drunk, stands committed; Henry Carroll, Drunk, \$4.60; Henry Carroll, attempted rape, case dismissed, prosecuting witness not appearing; Mary Hamilton, drunk, \$4.60, and in cooler until paid; Rudy Isinghouser, drunk, \$4.60; W. H. Brown, drunk, \$4.60, in cooler until paid; Thomas Kinney, drunk and disorderly, \$4.60, in cooler until paid; and Wm. Conway, Thomas Strong, Ed Osborn, and Frank Casey, tramps, ordered to leave city.

"We announce with pleasure that the Rev. G. T. Bowling, of Cleveland, will deliver at the Baptist Church of this city, Nov. 7, his celebrated lecture, "Men who did something and how they did it." This lecture has been delivered in a number of cities, East and West, and in every instance is spoken of in every instance with earnest approval."

"Phillip Walls, who lives near Spring Mills, while moving his bees to a new location, came near being stung to death. In removing his hive, two fell to the ground where upon the bees swarmed out and attacked him. His hands, wrists, neck, face and ears were stung severally. He became sick and could not help himself. He was removed to his house and remedies applied. He remains in precarious condition."

"Ida F. Glover has sued William H. Glover for divorce. Catharine Frame has sued Charles C. Frame for divorce."

"Some of our citizens were greatly alarmed on last Thursday evening when numerous tramps had congregated at his place. There were eighteen assembled in one body to roost on the bank of the railroad, and it was feared by many they would storm the town, but as morning came they departed in various directions, and no damage was done."


Ah, today's news people tone local things down a bit, don't they. Nowadays all we hear are drugs, mass shootings and politics.

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DEMETER

The Last Voyage of the Demeter is a story taken from Bram Stoker's Dracula, which entails the classic monster attacking

sailors on a ship. This movie has been in development for a long time and has finally been released into theaters.

Corey Hawkins stars as Clemens, a doctor aboard this fateful ship that has headed for London from Bulgaria. They have taken on several boxes of cargo includ-

ing one with a mysterious insignia. Soon, Clemens and the other crew on board discover they are not alone as a mysterious creature is picking them off one by one.

Director Andre Overdal, who directed the quite good *Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark*, has a good eye for making this film dark and foreboding. Dracula only comes out at night so there is always a heightened sense of fear for the night time scenes. Liam Cunningham and David Dastmalchian are also well cast as the captain and another crew member who get quite a bit of time to shine in their performances.

Unfortunately, as there are quite a few positives to this movie, it just takes too long to get going. It seems like there are

several scenes where Dracula attacks and it takes the characters too long to either realize certain things or come up with a plan.


Dracula itself, in a creature and bat-like form, looks pretty good most of the time though there are times when the CGI is a little too apparent. The movie is also more emotionally heavy and depressing than being a fun Dracula on a boat movie and this was unexpected and worked most of

the time while there were moments where it was almost too much for the kind of movie they were wanting to make.

The Last Voyage of the Demeter gets the definition of a mixed review. It has strong performances from its cast and some great atmosphere and story, though the slow pacing, reliance on jump scares and emotional feeling can be draining.

Also, the movie has an open ending so it's unknown if they planned on making this into a series though from the handful of people at my showing and the low box office totals, maybe this should be a one and done effort.

Whisky is available at the Richland County Dog Shelter in Mansfield. Those interested in meeting him or any other dog, can contact or visit the Richland County Dog Warden's Office and Shelter. Hours are 11 am to 4:15 pm Monday-Friday and 10 am to 2 pm on Saturday.

Currently, adoptions are on a schedule, based on the time the dog has been at the shelter. dogs that have been at the shelter for more than a year are \$50, dogs there more than six months are \$100, dogs at the shelter longer than three months are \$125, and dogs there less than three months are \$150. This fee includes spay/neuter, microchip, dog license, and some vaccines.

The shelter's current needs are volunteers to walk and play with the dogs as well as fill kongs for the dogs to play with when they are in their kennel, help with laundry or dishes, or clean the vard. The shelter uses a lot of bleach, laundry detergent and dog treats and welcomes donations.





Great Smoky Mountain Railway, Wildwater provide unique adventures for all interests

If you are looking for a peaceful mountain experience, The Great Smoky Mountain Railway (GSMR) has a wide variety of train excursions to choose from.

I have traveled the GSMR a few times in the past and I wanted to make sure my kids were able to experience a trip down the line.

As a child, my family traveled along the GSMR rails and something I always wanted to try was whitewater rafting. I would watch out the train window to see families riding the river. It always seemed like a great adventure and so I decided this year would be the year.

GSMR has a Raft & Rail excursion on the Nantahala River. Booking this allowed my family to experience the best of both worlds a relaxing train voyage and a thrilling eight-mile white water trip.

We arrived a little early and decided to visit the Smoky Mountain Trains Museum located adjacent to the train depot. GSMR passengers receive free complimentary admission to the museum with any train ticket purchase.

The museum has a collection of 7,000 Lionel engines, cars and accessories and guests can watch the trains zoom around the expansive layout. There is a children's activity center and a gift/toy shop.

We had fun as a family pointing out all the fine details of the train table's scenery. The walls are lined with glass cases displaying the great collection of train engines and box cars. It's definitely fun to stop in for a visit and provides great entertainment for kids of all ages.

As we checked in at the Bryson City Depot in North Carolina, we were provided our boxed deli lunches to enjoy on our ride.

We boarded and took our seats in the Cherokee train car. Our seats faced each other with a table in the middle. We were pulled by a diesel engines 1751 and 2467.

As we traveled along we were able to watch some of the towns go by with many friendly residents stopping to wave hello.

We journeyed beside the Little Tennessee and Nantahala Rivers, across Fontana Lake and into the beautiful Nantahala Gorge. Crossing the Fontana Trestle across Fontana Lake, we gazed out at the picturesque lake and mountain scenery.

After an almost two-hour ride covering 44 miles from Bryson City to the top of the line, some of our fellow passengers stayed aboard for the return trip, but this is where we departed and met up with Wildwater Rafting.

We boarded buses which would take us to the beginning of our whitewater rafting adventure. Leaving our dry items behind on the bus, we departed for our afternoon of rafting.

As we arrived, we were furnished with all the equipment we would need — paddles, life jacket and optional helmet. After safety instructions we were led to the send-off ramp.

We met our Wildwater guide, Caleb, and were chosen as the first boat to cast off. As we embarked on our exciting trip back on the Nantahala River, we became acquainted with our guide and the other three passengers in our boat.

My son, who is a bit apprehensive about water, sat at the back of the boat with Caleb. As the trip progressed, Caleb worked to ease my son's worries and helped to make sure he felt safe.

During our trip, there were moments of calm to enjoy the river and the nature around it. We would then be instructed to be ready and would paddle as a team through the class II and class III rapids and around rocks and boulders.

I thoroughly enjoyed this first rafting trip and hope to do it again soon. For those apprehensive about the rapids, the guide offers the chance to opt out before the last and most powerful plunge.

With some reluctance from my son, we all opted to stay aboard and went over the rapids with ease.

Being the first raft in our caravan, we parked to the side and waited for the rest of the Wildwater boats to come down the line. We were appointed this special opportunity which allowed us to watch as kayaks and rafts went through the last rapid. Caleb stood ready to help anyone in need of assistance. A few boaters flipped and thankfully nothing major happened, but it made for exciting entertainment. Caleb explained how each guide has his own way of challenging the rapids and it was fun to see the different techniques used.

After all our fellow rafters were accounted for, we exited the raft and collected our items from the bus. We were greeted with changing rooms, the chance for hot showers and a photo show from our final rapid of the day. I even bought my son a t-shirt in the gift shop for "surviving" the ride.

We boarded the bus once more for our return trip to the Bryson City Depot.

Raft & Rail debuted in 1988 and is available spring, summer and fall and includes a deli boxed lunch.

I definitely recommended this all day excursion but be prepared to be tired at the end of the journey. The Rail & Raft trip takes approximately (Continued on Page 21)

six-hours and is a good fit for rafters of all skill levels with a minimum participant age of seven.

The Raft & Rail option can only be booked by phone at 1-800-872-4681 from April through October. All transportation is included to and from the Bryson City Train Depot.

GSMR, awarded a Tripadvisor.com Travelers' Choice Award in 2020, has 53 miles of track, two tunnels and 25 bridges. It journeys over river gorges, across valleys and through mountain tunnels and offers a variety of scenic, round-trip excursions departing from Bryson City which range from 3 ½ hours to a full day.

There are so many choices on how to travel on the GSMR. There are options for those who prefer an indoor setting with tables, standard train seating or an open air gondola. Guests can even choose to include a meal during their excursion and book a ride in air conditioning or a train car that allows them to open a window and enjoy the fresh mountain air.

Depending on the date and time, passengers can choose the diesel or steam engine excursions. Special trips are offered throughout the year including rides with the Easter Bunny in the spring and The Polar Express at Christmas. A Carolina Shine Moonshine Experience, BBQ and Brews, Uncorked, the Smoky Mountain Beer Run and sunset and fall foilage tours are also available.

The Tuckasegee River Excursion is a relaxing ride through old railroad towns and scenic meadows which departs from Bryson City. The four-hour excursion travels 32 miles round-trip to Dillsboro and back to the Bryson City Depot. Passengers will ride past movie set of *The Fugitive* starring Harrison Ford. The excursion includes an 1 hour and 20 minute layover in Dillsboro, where there are more than 50 shops, restaurants and a brewery.

This railway and the surrounding land has been featured in oth-



er movies too. One of the diesel engines was the train used in My Fellow Americans starring Jack Lemmon, James Garner and Dan Akroyd. The railway was also used in Forces of Nature with Sandra Bullock and Ben Affleck and Digging to China.

When traveling, I often like to learn a bit of the history behind the places we visit and the GSMR has an abundance to discover.

Rail travel came to the area in 1880 and passenger business was so good by the turn of the 20th century that six passenger trains ran every day between Asheville and Lake Junaluska and four daily between Asheville and Murphy.

It was not easy to cut this branch line through the mountains. Self-educated engineer Capt. J. W. Wilson's most challenging tasks were the grade on the west side of the Balsams that was steep and curvy, with gaping ravines and the 836-foot Cowee Tunnel through a shaky mountain west of Dillsboro. The lines topped the Balsam Mountains at 3,100 feet, at the time it was the highest elevation of any railroad in the Eastern United States.

The railroad was built by convicts and The Murphy Branch experienced its heaviest use during wartime, in the early 1940s when the massive Fontana Dam was constructed. Thousands of carloads of cement, equipment and other materials reached the construction site by rail. Shipments of copper ore from mines in the western end of North Carolina and Copperhill, Tennessee, increased the line's tonnage.

With the increasing popularity of the automobile, passenger traffic on the railway began to decline and all passenger traffic on the Murphy Branch was discontinued in 1948 and freight traffic dropped off by 1985. Norfolk Southern closed the Andrews to Murphy leg of the Murphy Branch and the State of North Carolina purchased the Dillsboro to Murphy tracks to keep them from being destroyed.

By 1988, many entities had come together to form the Great Smoky Mountains Railway, which then began running passenger excursions. Rolling stock for the GSMR was purchased from various railroads around the nation. The Dillsboro to Nantahala route was one of the most scenic on the Murphy Branch and the excursion trains caught on right away.

Upward of 200,000 passengers enjoy the scenery and the experience of a true operational railroad each year aboard passegner excursion trains. American Heritage Railways purchased the GSMR in

The railway continues to preserve its many years of history with a new project. The Historic Southern Railway Engine 722 has begun its restoration process at the Great Smoky Mountains Railroad. The projected completion date is early 2026 when it will debut back into service.

The Great Smoky Mountains Railroad successfully relaunched its steam program in 2015 with the rebuild of Locomotive 1/02.

Steam-powered excursion trains are extremely rare with fewer than 150 operating steam locomotives in the United States.

Built in 1904, the 722 is a 2-8-0 Consolidation-type locomotive built by Baldwin Locomotive Works in Philadelphia. PA. Originally built to haul freight, the locomotive historically operated on the Southern Railway's Murphy Branch Line between Asheville and Murphy, NC until it was replaced by modern diesel engines in the early 1950s. It was sold in 1952 to the East Tennessee & Western North Carolina Railroad where it ran as a switcher in Johnson City, TN.

Southern Railway reacquired the locomotive in 1967 where the engine was instrumental in building the Southern Railway's steam program. GSMR acquired 722 in December 2000.

722 will undergo a conversion from coal to oil burner during the

rebuild process and will transport GSMR passengers down the very line it traveled nearly 100 years ago. Once completed, it will be the only former Southern Railway locomotive still operating on it's original line. It will also be the largest engine in the GSMR fleet.

In addition to the Rail & Raft, Whitewater also offers a Rails & Trails package which includes a backroads Jeep tour to learn area history while viewing waterfalls, the mountains and the Appalachian Trail after a scenic train ride to the top of Nantahala Gorge. The six-hour trip is available in the spring, summer and fall.

The Tarzan & Train package includes a ride on the GSMR followed by a fully-guided Nantahala Gorge Canopy Tour. The original zipline canopy tour in Western North Carolina, this tour offers 13 different zip lines and eight sky bridges.

In addition to the combo packages offered, guests can also do the Jeep Tour, rafting trips and ziplining as stand-alone attractions. Renta-raft is also available.

Visitors can stay overnight with Wildwater at the Yurt Village which has eight Mongolian Yurts on a 22-acre setting with ponds, waterfalls, firepits and barbecue areas or at the Group Lodge which can accommodate up to 44 guests in several bunk room suites, each with a private bathroom and deck.

Wildwater has five locations In The Blue Ridge and Smoky Mountains in Ducktown, TN; Bryson City NC; Asheville, NC; Long Creek, SC; and near Gatlinburg, TN. The Bryson City location is at 10345 Highway 19 South/74 West. For information visit https://wildwaterrafting.com or call 866-319-8870.

Councilman O'Brien asked if enough space was available for an event this size. Vaughn confirmed the skate park and swimming pool parking lot would provide ample space for a fundraiser. The village is still waiting for finalization of the new website with GovOffice. All data has been submitted.

Bryer Miller has been hired to work fulltime in the street department. Brever has proven his worth through hard work as a seasonal employee.

Options have been received from KEM for parking across the street. These will be reviewed by CIC. There will also be discussion regarding accessibility for the lot across the street.

The mayor and Smallstey met with Richland County Health Commissioner, Julie Chaya, and Fiscal Officer Kevin VanMeter regarding potential federal grant funding for numerous park picnic tables, both regular and ADA compliant, park benches, drinking fountains for the park and the square, and bike repair station.

Mayor Brian White attended a mayor's conference in Columbus June 21 and 22. There were good talks regarding budgeting and the state. There were also some good conversations regarding the need for more police officers.

A meeting regarding the Main Street revitalization project was scheduled for July 27.

Police Chief Weaver reported that the new Chevy Tahoe is in Bucyrus getting all equipment installed. Applications have been received for the several positions that are available in the police department. Patrolman Alex Keding will be resigning as of July 17, which makes the department short of three officers.



charter, one supplementing the residency qualifications for members of council, the second supplementing the residency qualifications for the mayor, and the third amending the posting of publication of ordinances and resolutions.

An ordinance giving consent of the village for the Ohio Department of Transportation to remiove snow and ice and use snow and ice control material on state highways inside the village corporation limits was approved.

A request by ODOT has been established, this will be done yearly. An ordinance was established providing for permanent budget amendments and appropriations for July for the administration, general and water funds.

New money is needed in the engineer line for the upgrading of E. Main St. \$24,500 has been approved by the finance committee who met prior to the meeting.

A resolution adopting the tax budget for the village for the fiscal year 2024, and declaring an emergency, was approved.

Resolution no. 23-21 entered into an agreement with the Ohio Department Of Transportation (ODOT) for roadway and intersection improvements within the village and declaring an emergency.

Councilman Kearns reported he met with the Cemetery Board. Mr. Worley's house caught on fire and was not able to attend the meeting. The discussion whether to have a levy on November ballot

Attorney Studenmund advised of necessary details needed to be complete prior to placing on the ballot. Councilman Kearns stated one opinion for new levy money is high and another opinion is low. Kearns would like to see the current levy monies modified and maybe go for the May 2024 primary election. O'Brien stated a primary election will be held on March 19, 2024.

Councilman Gongwer confirmed that Ordinance 23-19, the debt service for the water department and the oversight is corrected for next year's payments.


