Pioneer accepts numerous donations for scholarships

The Mansfield Riots of 1900



Part 4

Mayor Huntington Brown and Police Chief Clark were in a heck of a fix. Fockler had been rescued from an angry mob and they had him safely locked in a cell at Mansfield City Jail. A doctor examined Fockler and a new set of clothes were ordered.

A large crowd had followed and still remained outside the prison. The plan was to hold Fockler over Sunday so he couldn't preach. Next was to get him to the railroad station and send him away back to wherever. But a crowd remained outside even on Monday.

The getaway was reported by the *Mansfield News*. "His escape from the city was arranged without further delay. The mayor drove up the alley at the south side of the jail with his two horses and a two-seat open rig. Fockler came out through the coal hole in the cellar and was hustled to the buggy by police and the mayor whipped




THE MANSFIELD JAIL AND POLICE DEPARTMENT on the corner of Walnut and Park Avenue West.

up his horses and the outfit drove through the crowd of spectators before the latter fully realized what was happening. Some of the crowd tried to stop the rig but did not succeed. In the buggy with the mayor were attorney Douglas and officer Goodman. The mayor drove to Ontario, but when they reached that place they saw a big crowd around the town pump listening to one of it's members reading from a Mansfield newspaper. They decided to take Fockler to Galion. It was his intention to take the Big Four train to Crestline from which place he could take an Erie train to Canton."

Though not always recorded in the Mansfield newspapers, there is evidence that nearly all protestant and catholic congregations would wrestle with which course of conduct they should follow. The choice ranged from condemnation to forgiveness or simply remain silent and look the other way. The eyes of God and country were all on them. It was a very uncomfortable time for some.

Dowie then announced that he was sending Fockler and three other elders to hold services in Mansfield the next Sunday. He said if they were harmed in any way, he would follow in person with 300 Zion guards and train loads of Dowites from Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Lima and Ada and take the town! Director George Miller is back with *Furiosa: A Mad Max Saga*. This is the prequel to 2015's excellent *Mad Max: Fury Road* (the best of the series).

Young Furiosa is growing up in the green place when the apocalypse comes to her door, and she is taken by the villain Dementus. He takes her to Immortan Joe who wants to take her in as his own. Furiosa escapes and tries

to chart her own path forward and find her home.

Anya Taylor-Joy plays Furiosa with a steely determination, though she comes into the movie about an hour in as another actress plays her younger self as she is growing up. Hemsworth is solid as the villain. He seems to be having a blast as he is funny and yet menacing at the same time. It's great to see Hemsworth really bring out a character besides Thor and it works out so well for him.

Miller is really the only person who can tackle a film in this world and his action sequences are top notch as always. One on a truck is extremely memorable and just non-stop. His camerawork has always been masterful in this series and the entire look of the film from the setting, costumes and cinematography just shine.

The downside of the movie is that it never gets to the level of its predecessor. *Mad Max: Fury Road* brought the series back

with a vengeance after not having an installment since the third movie with Mel Gibson in 1985. Tom Hardy took over as Max and Charlize Theron played Furiosa in a movie that after about five minutes just took off and never let up. Furiosa is more of a character study com-

plete with chapter titles and while that is fine it makes for some uninteresting moments and scenes. At two and a half hours, there is just not enough there to sustain the runtime. This seems to be an issue with a great deal of movies these days.

While I am certainly recommending Furiosa for its determination, great performances, action sequences and entire look of the film, I did not love it like I wanted to and found it frustrating because there was a little more filler than was needed. I would rank this movie in the middle of the series after *Mad Max: Fury Road* and the excellent *The Road Warrior* from 1981.



Senate passes Romanchuk's bill that prioritizes Ohio's patients

The Ohio Senate concurred with changes to Senate Bill 81, legislation sponsored by Senator Mark Romanchuk (R-Ontario) to improve Ohio's mental health care. Senate Bill 81 will provide flexibility to patients and their families to expedite the admission process, enhance the ability of clinicians to begin necessary treatment, stabilize patients quickly, and allow a smooth discharge process.

"Ohio is experiencing a shortage of qualified behavioral health workers, including an acute shortage of psychiatrists," said Romanchuk. "According to the Association of American Medical College, we are not on track to replace current psychiatrists as they retire. Senate Bill 81 will ensure all Ohio patients receive compassionate

care and best practice techniques.'

The new bill would permit hospital-based, Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) and Physician Assistants (PAs) the ability to sign certain documents under the supervision of physicians. This change will eliminate barriers for mental health care when the need is at an all-time high. These documents include intake, treatment, and discharge orders only for inpatient behavioral health services.

The bill now goes to the governor's desk for his signature.

The award was established to recognize an individual with at least five years of experience in the field of victim assistance who has demonstrated leadership in the crime victims' rights movement.

"This award is a tremendous honor, and I hope it serves to shine a light on the important work of survivor advocacy," said Donnenworth. "I love my job because I get to walk alongside people as they make lasting changes that empower them to break free of cycles of abuse. But I hate that there's even a need for a



job like mine. I hope this award can be a reminder that this work is ongoing, it's necessary, but it's also entirely preventable."

paper that reported this column ended with this sentence; "The above letter was given to the public this afternoon and its contents will no doubt create a sensation."

It did just that. A telegram was received at police headquarters directed to Mayor Brown:

"Rev E. P. Fisher, evangelist in charge of Zion Tabernacle in Mansfield informs me there is danger of mob violence. I demand his protection by authorities. We will never yield to mob law. He will stay and minister to the members of his church come what will. Your duty is to protect at all risks.'

The Mansfield Police Department had a chief and four officers. Sheriff Pulver had one full-time deputy and one part-time for the whole county. Big trouble was coming.



Makaree Chapman, with an astounding 1.40 ERA notched eleven strikeouts, facing 22 batters.


