Ontario makes plans for next school year

The Ontario Board of Education met May 14. Condrea Cannada presented an overview of the food service program.

Bethany Rachel, program manager for Junior Achievement, presented about career services that Ontario is providing this school year. Mike Ream, assistant superintendent, gave a federal programs update.

The board approved the five-year forecast as submitted by the treasurer and the resignation of Tesla Gray, Stingel Intervention Specialist, effective at the end of the 2023–'24 school year.

Kristina Weese resigned as the PM latchkey supervisor, effective at the end of her 2023–'24 contract.

The board approved teachers to teach an eight-period per day schedule for the 2024–'25 school year including Julie Buker, \$10,612 and Jim Buker, \$8,485.

The board approved the 2024–'25 salary notices and the revision of the staff weapons board policies to reflect changes to the school safety plan.

The board authorized the participation in Federal Grants (IDEA, IDEA-B, Title I-A, Title II-A, Title IV-A) for the 2024–'25 grant year.

The board approved the employment of substitute classified staff personnel for the 2023–'24 school year including Brenda Weber, secretary; Natasha West, secretary; and Joilee Eutsay, cook.

A nursing service contract was approved for Matt Wentz for the 2024–'25 school year at eight hours per day for 179 days at an hourly rate of \$37.50.

The board approved the 2024–'25 North Central Ohio Educational Service Center substitute teacher and tutor list including updates.

An FCCLA National Leadership Conference overnight field trip in Seattle Washington, for June 28–July 5, 2024, was approved.

A contract was approved for Ashley Ritz to provide transportation for her child. The board also approved the North Central Ohio Educational Service Center 2024–'25 Service Agreement.

The classified substitute list for the 2024–'25 school year was approved as was an agreement with River Education Services, Inc. for alternative school placement for a student.

The board approved the 2024–'25 Ontario Athletic Handbooks and Ontario High School seniors for graduation with the Class of 2024, pending completion of all local and state requirements.

The board approved the Ontario Local Schools Off-School Grounds Solicitations Calendar for the 2024–'25 school year.

A \$1,000 stipend was granted to Joe Baumgard for conducting a Youth Football Camp.

The board approved extending the contracts, through META Solutions with Alfred Nickles Bakery, for supplying bakery products and Smith Dairy, for supplying dairy products, both for for the 2024–25 school year.

A list of items for disposal was approved.

The contract of Charlie Ridenour, middle school science teacher, was amended from a three-year contract to a continuing contract effective for the 2024–'25 school year.

The board approved the Stingel Preschool student handbook for the 2024–'25 school year.

The Mansfield Riots of 1900

Now, Mansfield was in a bit of a bind. There were some who thought there might be a lot of trouble too big to ignore. A telegram was received by police and directed to Mayor Brown:

"Rev. E. P. Fisher, evangelist, in charge of the tabernacle in Mansfield, informs me there is danger of mob violence tonight. I demand protection by authorities. I shall never yield to mob law. He will stay and minister after the members of this church come what will. Your duty is to protect them at all risk. Signed John Alexander Dowie."

Shortly after Chief Clark had received this message, and with the mayor being absent, Fisher, the evangelist, walked into police head-quarters. Chief Clark informed Fisher he was in danger of being mobbed. The elder resisted and moved around town trying to rent a hall for services on Sunday.

Sheriff Pulver received two telegrams on July, 27, one from Dowie and one from the Ohio governor. Both related to the Mansfield riots.

Sunday, July 29 passed rather peacefully. A period of contemplation had set in. The CCC church held services at the tabernacle on Park Avenue East, while police and Sheriff Pulver stood by. There was a small crowd outside, but no trouble.

During the evening, five large boxes arrived at the tabernacle and immediately the rumor spread that they contained firearms and ammunition. An excited group of young men demanded that they be open under police supervision and church members. The people pried them open. Inside were several thousand copies the *Leaves of Healing* the church newspaper.

Overseer William Hammer Piper had arrived with evangelist E. P. Fisher who had taken over for Fockler. They had notified them by

telegram that they were coming.

Unfortunately the town had been blasted with hundreds of new copies of *Leaves of Healing*. By 6 am, nearly everyone in town found a copy on their doorstep. Twenty-five copies were left on Mayor

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Brown's doorstep. The piece was written by John Alexander Dowie and was full of vile condemnation of the mayor and "Devil's Field," as he called Mansfield. All it did was to stir the pot of hatred more. Personal attacks and abuse were heaped on Mayor Brown and it was reported some of the bad language bordered on being of obscene. It made matters worse and appeared to have canceled everything Piper had tried to accomplish.

Then it was learned that Fisher and elders would be preaching at the home of Mrs. Lydia C. Frederick at 16 Wayne St. A mob gathered on the square, bent on interrupting services.

As the group increased in size, they made their way north of the square down to Wayne Street. By the time they reached their destination they became an angry mob of people lining both sides of the street.

What happened next was covered by a reporter on the scene. His words reprinted beautifully detail the mob action as they appeared in July 31, 1900 in the *Mansfield Daily Shield*.

"His flock numbered to 40 or 50 and were gathered in the parlor of the Frederick house and services were being conducted by elders McClurkin, Stevens, McFarland and evangelist Fisher. In a short time the members of the mob went to the house and demanded Fisher. The elders barricaded the doors and sent some frightened women upstairs. Soon the trouble began.

Someone in the crowd threw a rock through one of the windows and the trouble was on. The Zion Elders returned the rock out the window and injured three or four young men who had approached the house for the purpose of taking the women to a place of safety. This incensed the mob and the rear door was battered down. The situation looked critical."

"Chief Clark, Sheriff Barney Pulver, Deputy Tom Bell and several police officers appeared on the scene and made a stand in the front porch of the besieged house. The crowd however could not be cheated out of its objective and crowded its way up the porch with wild yells. Sheriff Pulver commanded the mob to disperse the name of the law, but had no effect on the determined mob. The police offered to take the ministers to jail for safekeeping, but the mob would not listen to it. Before the police arrived the elders fought desperately in the sitting room of the house which was soon demolished. Flammable waste material was thrown into the room where the Zion ministers fought desperately. A number of threats were made to dynamite the building."

Thus the greatest mob violence in the history of Mansfield began.

Successful applicants will present a clear and innovative plan for how they will interact and engage with at-risk older adults in group settings throughout the year. Awardees can receive up to \$10,000 to fund their project. The funding period is from July 15, 2024, through December 31, 2024.

Applications are available. The deadline to apply is Friday, June 14, by 4 pm.

Ashland police officer commended for saving a 3-year-old

State Rep. Melanie Miller (R-City of Ashland) invited and presented a commendation from the Ohio House Representatives to Ashland Police Officer Soren Osicka, during a recognition ceremony on the House floor. Miller also acknowledged Ashland Police Chief David Lay (30 + years), Captain Craig Kiley (24 years), and Lieutenant Aaron Klein (17 years) for their distinguished service in law enforcement to the Ashland community during the legislative session.

"Today, as we remember Police Week, just being this last week, we have a very special young man that we want to honor today, Officer Soren Osicka for his heroic actions and acting swiftly when there was an emergency," Miller said.

Officer Soren Osicka is 23 years old and became a police officer less than a year ago. After about five months on the job, he saved a 3-year-old girl's life by administering CPR after she hit her head and stopped breathing.

"On behalf of the Ohio House of Representatives, myself, and our Speaker of the House, Mr. Jason Stephens, we would like to honor you with a commendation from the House of Representatives to recognize you and your heroic efforts."

Including Osicka, Miller invited members of the Ashland Police Department to the Statehouse to tour the grounds and be recognized during the House session to be recognized for police week and their service to their community.

Ohio Legislature passes bill to ban foreign interference in state elections

The Ohio House recently passed House Bill 1, legislation that will ban foreign nationals from contributing to ballot initiatives, announced State Rep. Riordan McClain (R-Upper Sandusky).

Under current state and federal law, it is illegal for foreign nationals to donate to political candidates, but there is no precedent for contributions to ballot issues.

This loophole has left the Buckeye State vulnerable to foreign national interference. By expanding the current law to ban foreign donations to Ohio's ballot issues, the legislation will protect Ohio's election integrity and ensure foreign influence will not sway future election results.

"Ohio voters made it clear in 2022 by passing Issue 2 by nearly 77% that non-US citizens cannot vote in Ohio elections. It makes no sense that those same individuals should still be able to spend millions of dollars to influence other voters in those same elections," said McClain.

"I am pleased that my colleagues and I have passed this legislation to make it clear on this issue. Foreign nationals, whether friend or foe, have no place in our election process."

To remedy this issue, House Bill 1 will do the following:

- •Prohibit direct and indirect contributions from foreign nationals;
- •Ban the spending, including independent expenditures, of funds tied to foreign nationals; and
- •Ensure independent investigatory and enforcement power by the Ohio Attorney General.

The Senate concurred with House Bill 1 on Friday. The legislation now heads to Governor DeWine, who has previously applauded its passage in the House.

Seven KCCC students earn Building Trades Elite Status

The Knox County Career Center Building Trades program recognized seven students who earned the status of Building Trades Elite. Building Trades Elite (BT Elite) is a program generated by Colby Clippinger, KCCC Building Trades instructor, and the KCCC Building Trades Advisory Council that began in 2019–'20.

The program's criteria centers around attendance, discipline, industry credentialing and extracurricular activities. A point system is set up where students earn points for attendance, grades, industry credentialing, and extracurricular activities. Students can lose points for being tardy, absent, and for discipline issues. In order to earn BT Elite status, students must earn 250 points and must maintain 250 points or higher until graduation to keep the BT Elite status.

The program is completely company-sponsored, according to Clippinger. Students who earn BT Elite status are awarded a hoodie and an interview shirt. The companies pay for the hoodies and interview shirts. The hoodie has the Building Trades Elite crest on the back, along with the company sponsors. The student's name and BT Elite are on the front of the hoodie. The interview shirt has BT Elite and the student's name on the front.

Clippinger commented, "We appreciate the companies who have partnered with us on the BT Elite program. The program creates a well-rounded and ready-to-hire student."

"The BT Elite program has had a profound impact on the students. It continually helps keep students accountable for themselves and they are now encouraging other students to attain the same level. This will only improve the quality of tradespeople entering into the workforce," added Clippinger.
