## Veterans Day remembered with parade, ceremony on the square

The 2024 Veterans Day Parade took place in downtown Mansfield on Nov. 11 at 10:30 am. After the parade, people gathered at the gazebo in Central Park for a ceremony, presented by the Richland County Joint Veterans Council.

The program included a welcome by Bruce Phipps, Commander, Joint Veterans Council, a presentation of colors by the Color Guards, the National Anthem, sung by John Darby, the pledge of allegiance by Josh Hurrell followed by an invocation by Pastor Carol Kilgore of Clay Memorial Lutheran Church. There was a wreath presentation by the Jared Mansfield Chapter, DAR and Debra Robinson introduced the speaker. The keynote address was given by Kari Pfeifer.

Some meaningful thoughts by the Veterans Day Ceremony speaker, Kari Pfeifer, State Commander, VFW Department of Ohio:

"As a veteran, I stand before you with a profound sense of pride, humility, and gratitude. It is essential to celebrate the service of all our veterans: those who fought during times of war and those who dedicated themselves to maintaining peace. The sacrifices and accomplishments made by today's generation of patriots are numerous, and their dedication to our way of life and the values on which our country was founded serve as a powerful reminder that tyranny and evil will never prevail. The lessons imparted by veterans should never be forgotten, and it is up to each of us to preserve the legacy of their service.

We must ensure that the spirit, faith, and democracy that our veterans embody continue to inspire future generations. It should be our shared mission to educate and remind young people that the American spirit is defined by resilience, selflessness, and commitment. Kari Pfeifer is a lifelong resident of Crestline and joined the Ohio Air National Guard 179th Airlift Wing as an Aeromedical Services Technician in April 1990. After 21 years of service, she retired as a Master Sergeant in July 2011. During her time with the 179th, she deployed across the United States and to overseas locations including Saudi Arabia and Oman.

Following her military career, her commitment to service continued. She became an active member of the Harley Helfrich VFW Post 2920 in Crestline, Ohio, holding positions such as Post Jr. Vice Commander, Quartermaster and Trustee. She served as District 10 Commander.

mander of the VFW in 2016–'17 and as VFW Department of Ohio Co-Chair for Veteran and Military Support from 2013 to 2020.

In 2017, Pfeifer was appointed to the National VFW Women Veterans Advisory Committee by National Commander-in-Chief Keith Harman, representing the Big 10 Conference. She also served on the Executive Committee for the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame from 2014 to 2020, chairing the committee from 2016 to 2020, and is a member of the Ohio War Orphans and Severely Disabled Veteran Children Scholarship Board.

In June 2024, Pfeifer was elected as the VFW Department of Ohio Commander. Her mission remains clear: to support the veterans who came before her and those who continue to serve our great nation.

Following the address, there was a salute to the honored dead by the Richland County Joint Veterans Burial Squad, Taps, and a closing benediction by Pastor Carol Kilgore. (See More Photos Page 6)


### Sutton Bank donation kicks-off shelter's Richland Gives fundraiser



Together, Neal and Del encounter several modes of transportation, an unfortunate hotel room stay, a profane tirade with a rental car agent and an exploding car all to make it home for the holiday.

This movie has held up so well over the years. Martin and Candy give terrific performances. Martin is effective as the guy about to fly off the handle and Candy has that sweetness and

charm he brought to every role. Thank goodness for the late great John Hughes and his immense talents as a writer and director. He really knew how to write memorable characters and even more memorable moments.

Hughes was known for writing movies for

teens around this time (Sixteen Candles, The Breakfast Club, Weird Science) that it was interesting to see him tell an adult story and do it in such a way that had a great deal of heart.

If you have never seen *Planes, Trains and Automobiles* (or even if you have) it is definitely one to watch this Thanksgiving season. It still holds up really well watching these two comedic geniuses at work in one of the great comdies of the 80s.

## **RCCS** honors and celebrates National Adoption Month



The focus is on providing a sense of belonging and relational permanency for youth in foster care, promoting family, community, and cultural connections.

This year's theme to honor youth can help the thousands of children and teens across the country who are waiting to be adopted. More than 3,000 youths in Ohio are awaiting to be adopted.

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So far this year, RCCS has had 24 children find a forever home through adoption. There are still 18 children in our care waiting for a permanent home and 124 in the foster care system.

## Home Energy Assistance Program offers assistance to Ohioans

The Ohio Department of Development and your Area Agency on Aging want to remind older Ohioans that assistance is available to help with their home energy bills. The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a household of up to seven members and 60% of State Median Income for a household of eight or more members to pay their heating bills.

Applied directly to the customer's utility or bulk fuel bill, the benefit can help manage heating costs. Older Ohioans may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing their HEAP application. They may also visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download a copy of the application.

When applying, individuals need to have copies of the following documents:

Most recent utility bills.

•A list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers).

•Proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types).

•Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members.

• Proof of disability (if applicable).

HEAP benefits are applied to an individual's energy bill after Jan. 1, 2025. Applications for the HEAP program must be received by May 31, 2025.

It takes \$125,000 a month to operate the 24-hour shelter, crisis hotline, and sexual assault services. The Shelter is proud to have earned a Candid Platinum Seal for financial transparency and devotes less than 10% of its funds to administrative costs.

Last year, The Shelter served 160 survivors of trauma and abuse by providing 7,353 nights of safe shelter and support. On average, The Shelter estimates it costs \$200 a night to serve and house each survivor.

A CROWD GATHERED at the Mansfield Cemetery Veterans Honor section to honor the unveiling of the Richland County Veterans Honor Wall, a lasting tribute to the bravery and dedication of local heroes. This special project, made possible through the dedication of Purdy Construction, provides a place for remembrance and respect for our veterans and their families. The wall is located in Mansfield Cemetery, 389 Altamont Ave., Mansfield. The wall shows special attention to handicap accessible walkways on both sides as well as in between the walls. Benches are available on the back side and a flag pole is placed in the middle to overlook the Honor Grounds and the Honor Wall. This also gives the Richland County Burial Detail a safe place to salute veterans. During the dedication, WWII veteran Robert Muck (Mack) was the first internment. This decorated veteran has been waiting since 2001 for his final resting place. The cremains of the veteran and his wife, Sarah, will be placed permanently at the Veterans Honor Wall.





Ohio State University at Mansfield marked Veterans Day with a special appearance by Col. Kenneth Kmetz, a 1998 graduate of Ohio State Mansfield and Deputy Wing Commander of the 179th Cyberspace Wing of the Ohio Air National Guard.

A Veterans Breakfast was held on Nov. 6 at 9 am in Eisenhower Hall's Marketplace.

Col. Kmetz, who has served in the Air National Guard for over 30 years, gave the keynote address during the annual breakfast. Throughout his career, he has held key roles in civil engineering, security forces, and maintenance groups, playing an essential part in maintaining air and cyberspace operations on state and national levels.

"It was an honor to serve our country, and I looked forward to honoring others who have served, including those lost in battle," Kmetz said. "Today, we recognized the patriotism, love of country, and sacrifice of all veterans."

A veteran of Operation Enduring Freedom and the U.S. Indo-Pacific Command, Kmetz has received multiple awards, including Meritorious Service Medals and Outstanding Unit Awards, highlighting his dedication and leadership.

The breakfast welcomed veterans, their families, students, staff, faculty, and community members to honor veterans' service. Jason Opal, dean of Ohio State Mansfield, said, "We were honored to welcome Col. Kmetz. He embodies the spirit of duty, purpose, and self-lessness we celebrated on this day."

Reflecting on his military experience, Kmetz shared, "The military provided me a place where I fit in and was part of something bigger than myself. It challenged me to be better while providing opportunities for growth."

He also acknowledged the respect shown to military members in society, contrasting it with experiences in other countries. "Countless times, strangers thank me for my service. That is an honor, and I'm humbled every single time. The greatest strength of the military isn't our technology but the support of the American people," he said.

Kmetz emphasized the importance of family and community support, adding, "If my wife hadn't supported me being in the military, I would have left 32 years ago." In his speech, Kmetz shared several inspiring quotes like these:

"Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction... it must be fought for, protected, and handed on for them to do the same." — Ronald Reagan

"Courage is contagious. When a brave man takes a stand, the spines of others are often stiffened." — Billy Graham

He closed with, "We don't know them all, but we owe them all. May God bless America, may God bless you and your family, and may His grace bring you peace."

Ken Milligan was recognized for a lifetime of serving the Ashland community, including as United Way president, serving on the board of trustees, and as campaign chair resulting in the first campaign to top the \$1 million mark! 

### Brenner, Gavarone introduce Bill to protect elections

State Senator Andrew Brenner (R-Delaware) and State Senator Theresa Gavarone (R-Bowling Green) introduced Senate Bill 324, which further builds upon Ohio's work to protect elections.

"We take pride in maintaining safe and secure elections," said Brenner. "This legislation will strengthen the Buckeye State's election laws and add protections so that Ohioans continue to know there is a reliable system in place when they cast their vote.'

"Ohio is the gold standard when it comes to running elections," Gavarone said. "Senate Bill 324 addresses areas of the election law we can improve, including an extra layer of protection to enforce our state constitution's citizenship requirement."

The legislation requires voters to provide proof of citizenship to their boards of elections when registering to vote or updating their registration if they have not previously done so. If proof of citizenship is not provided, the board can allow a voter to cast a provisional ballot, but the voter must provide proof of citizenship for it to be counted.

Senate Bill 324 also requires absentee ballots to be hand-delivered to election officials or mailed back in. A voter's assistant must also sign a form attesting they are legally able to deliver another person's ballot. The bill now must be referred to a committee.
