Ontario holds end of school year meeting

The Ontario Board of Education met for the final meeting of the school year on May 13.

Condrea Mason, food service director, gave a presentation about the food service budget, free and reduced lunch participation and healthy changes for next school year.

Aaron Hinchliffe, Central Region Manager with Ohio School Boards Association, presented Heidi Zimmerman and Brett Baxter with 10 Year Service Awards.

The board approved the employment of Stacy Crawford, special education supervisor, effective with the 2025-'26 school year, \$95,641 and Susan McBride, high school intervention specialist-MD, \$77,605.

Lily Rockwell was hired as the middle school transition resource specialist, \$45,712 and Matthew Lautanen was hired as a middle school seventh grade language arts teacher, \$59,499. Emily Gerak was hired as Stingel music teacher, \$47,134.

The five-year forecast was approved as submitted by the treasurer. A one-year agreement was reached with the Ontario Federation of Teachers for the 2025-'26 school year.

A resolution authorizing the school district board to participate in the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission Classroom Facilities Assistance Program was approved.

Julie Buker, high school art teacher, will retire at the end of her 2024-'25 contract. It is the intent of the board to employ her as a high school art teacher for the 2025-'26 school year, pending the completion of all retire/rehire requirements. A public hearing will take place to discuss this matter at the June 10 board meeting.

The board approved the resignation of Stacy Crawford as Stingel Assistant Principal and Matt Keasal, middle and high school choir teacher, both effective at the end of the 2024-'25 school year.

Resignations also came from bus driver Steve Santmyer and middle school custodian Randall Thompson.

Revisions were made to the sign-in form used for public participation at board meetings based on an updated board policy.

Teachers approved for an eight-period per day schedule for the 2025-'26 school year include Julie Buker, \$8,379; and Jim Buker, \$8,739.

2025-'26 salary notices were approved as was the revision of the Special Education Model Policies Resolution that was board approved at the March 13 board meeting.

Eric Wellman was hired as the boys golf head coach, \$4,538. The school district will participate in federal grants (IDEA, IDEA-B, Title I-A, Title II-A, Title IV-A) for the 2025-'26 grant year.

A nursing service contract was approved for Matt Wentz for the upcoming school year including right hours per day, 179 days, at an hourly rate of \$38.63.

Substitute teachers approved for the 2024-'25 school year include Cole Weiss, Stingel, OMS, OHS; and Lily Rockwell, OMS.

The board approved the 2025-'26 NCOESC certificated substitute list including updates. The North Central Ohio Educational Service Center 2025-'26 Service Agreement was also approved.

Substitute classified staff personnel hired include Anna Whittaker, custodian; Barbara Ker, secretary; Stephanie Barabani, custodian; Janine Mullins, custodian; Samantha Lee, custodian; and Chandice O'Brian, custodian.

A service contract between Ontario Local Schools and EJ Therapy for audiology services was approved and an agreement with LLA Therapy was approved for extended school year therapy services.

An agreement was reached with River Education Services, Inc. for alternative school placement for a student.


Ontario High School seniors were approved for graduation, pending completion of all local and state requirements.

In *Broken Country* by Clare Leslie Hall, a past flame is back in town, a sudden death brings suspicion and the grief Beth has kept just under the surface is boiling over.

I honestly didn't love this book. I sort of know why other people are interested, but it wasn't for me.

I have great empathy for flawed characters and love redemption stories, but the redemption in this felt forced and unearned.

Boll will step down from Buckeye Imagination Museum

The Buckeye Imagination Museum has announced that it extends its heartfelt gratitude to exiting executive director Fred Boll for more than a decade of exceptional leadership and steadfast dedication to the museum and the broader Richland County community.

Boll began his journey with the museum — then known as the Little Buckeye Children's Museum — in 2013.

The museum released, "From the outset, he brought a visionary spirit that spurred a period of transformative growth. Under his guidance, the museum rebranded as the Buckeye Imagination Museum, expanded its mission, and emerged as a regional leader in

play-based education. Fred's passion for inclusivity, innovation, and community enrichment has left an enduring legacy."

Among his most notable accomplishments was a successful \$4.5 million capital campaign, with 96% of funds reinvested in the local economy; the grand opening of a new, accessible facility in downtown Mansfield in 2022; and the 2023 unveiling of an expanded second floor, welcoming teens and adults into the museum's imaginative spaces.

Boll's tireless efforts to create environments where people of all ages feel welcome earned national recognition, including awards from the Ohio Museums Association and the Ohio Travel Association for excellence in marketing and community collaboration.

Boll will be stepping down as executive director on Aug. 1. His decision reflects a personal milestone, as he prepares to welcome his first grandchild and assumes a new leadership role closer to family.

"The Buckeye Imagination Museum has been more than just a job — it's been a calling, and this community has been my extended family," Boll shared.

Buckeye Imagination Museum Board President Barrett Thomas commented, "Fred's leadership has been transformational. He has laid a foundation for continued growth and community connection that will serve us for many years to come."

"The museum is currently in a strong and stable position, well-equipped to continue serving families throughout North Central Ohio. In the coming weeks, museum leadership will share the next steps in the search for Fred's successor."

Founded as "Little Buckeye Children's Museum" in April 2011, Buckeye Imagination Museum is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit and today is located in downtown Mansfield's Imagination District.



lifestyle physically, mentally, and emotionally.”

Bryant’s journey to the Miss Ohio stage is as unique as her path in life. Growing up, she was more of an “artsy kid,” loving choir and musicals, but she’s found her professional calling in sports. Currently a graduate student in Sport Administration at Bowling Green State University, Bryant’s passion for sports took root unexpectedly.

“I started in broadcasting, but an internship in the football team’s video department changed everything,” she recalled. “I fell in love with the atmosphere of sports, even though I didn’t know much about football at first! It was such a special experience that led me to marketing and fan engagement.” Now, she hopes to work in social media and marketing for a professional hockey team one day.

She’s already taking steps, visiting local schools to read to children and show them how sports can be fun, healthy, and transformative. “It’s so special to watch kids realize that they can be leaders, and that sports are about so much more than competition,” she said.


“Too many kids are left on the sidelines because of barriers like cost, lack of equipment, or limited opportunities. I’m here to change that! It’s not about building the next pro athlete; it’s about building great humans through sports.”

For Bryant, Miss Ohio isn’t just about the title—it’s about staying true to herself. “My faith, my family and friends, and expressing myself through singing and movement are my priorities,” she said. “The most important thing is to be authentic. Lady Lex softball marches to the Final Four

It never gets old does it? Over the years Lexington seems to have sprouted some phenomenal athletes.

If you have been around Lexington sports for a decent amount of time, you would have to agree, we are very blessed to have had some really good girls high school softball in the village over the years.

The ladies of Big Lex are marching on to the state playoffs!

As of the publishing of this article, Lexington will have embarked into Summit County to compete at Firestone Stadium Wednesday, at 10 am, to tangle with a staunch undefeated Kenton Ridge Cougars.

The really cool thing I love about the post-season is that I enjoy looking at the opposing team's statistics. Since the team isn't from this area you can find out some "fun facts."

Let's lay the cards on the table about the Cougars from Springfield. They come into the contest with an unblemished record of 30-0 overall, and a conference record 11-0, first in the Central Buckeye Conference.

I will admit, in all my years, I haven't seen too many teams with an undefeated slate very often. Let's just say it's been awhile.

As I was looking up stats on Kenton Ridge, the one word that I kept saying was wow!

The Cougars have had a mind-boggling 14 shut-outs on the season. In the first game of the season, March 25, they played conference foe Sheridan and came out with a slim margin of victory of 1-0.

They have had 21 games of run-ruling the opponent after five innings and only allowed a total of 30 runs cumulative against all opponents the entire season.

They had three games of scoring more than 30 runs and scored 35-0, against Urbana. They were also 32-1 against Tecumseh and 35-0 against Meadowdale.

Let's look at the Cougar pitching for a moment shall we. Freshman Ivey Rastatter brings her undefeated 8-0 pitching record, with a 1.04 era into the mix. Rastatter has pitched 47 innings thus far, and while that in itself may not sound earth shattering as the Cougars have had 21 run-ruled games after five innings against their opponents, thus it makes sense.

She has 62 strikeouts on the books, while facing 180 batters on the year.

Offensively, another freshman, Lilly Foulk, leads the team in the batting column with a .684 average, following shortly behind is senior, Sydney Sloan with a .667 batting average.

As for Big Lex, they come to the table 25-3 overall, 10-2 and first place in the Ohio Cardinal Conference.

The only three losses on the year were from tough conference foe, New Philadelphia, 8-0 on March 25. Another close game was

against rival Madison 2-0 on April 15. The final loss in a tightly contested non-conference game was opponent Big Walnut 2-1.

As for shut-outs, can you say 10? Wow! Lex has also notched 19 times, holding their opponent to less than three runs! They have also penned 12 games in double-digit victories.

Lex comes well prepared with formidable pitching, as phenom senior Makaria Chapman wields the ball for Lady Lex. She brings an earth-shattering ERA of .97, and 260 strikeouts, with a season pitching record of 18-1 while facing 555 batters on the year.

As for hitting, Chapman tops the team swinging the lumber with an ERA of .571. Behind Chapman, is junior Kaylee Stull, ringing in the hits with an ERA of .429.
