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Danielle's Lighthouse offers hope, healing and a place to begin again

A standing-room-only crowd filled the newly renovated Danielle's Lighthouse on Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 18, as community leaders, mental-health partners, and family members gathered to celebrate the grand opening of Richland County's newest crisis step-down unit — a 10-bed facility designed to provide stability, recovery support, and renewed hope for individuals transitioning out of mental-health hospitalization.

The project marks a major milestone in Richland County's continuum of care. The Richland County Mental Health and Recovery Services Board played a leading role in planning, designing, and developing the facility, identifying the long-recognized need for supportive housing for those not yet ready to return home after a behavioral-health crisis. Coleman Health Services, selected by the Board to operate the program, will manage day-to-day services and provide person-centered care grounded in recovery, stability, and dignity.

Steve Bossart, Vice President of Business Development and Marketing at Coleman, opened the ceremony with gratitude and anticipation. "This is going to be a special place in this community," he said. "We're really glad you're all here today to help us cut the ribbon and open this great facility."

Honoring Danielle's Legacy

The facility is named in memory of Danielle "Dani" Leedy, a vibrant, deeply loved young professional from Richland County who lived with chronic depression and died in 2019 at age 33. Her parents, Jeff and Donna Heck, founded the nonprofit 33 Forever after her passing to ensure her legacy would be one of helping others — not defined by her death.

"Immediately after losing Dani, we knew her legacy could not be her suicide," Donna told the crowd. "She lived to help others. She was an amazing life-changer. So we created 33 Forever so her heart for helping people would live on."

Donna recounted the helplessness the family felt years earlier when, after Dani survived a suicide attempt at age 22, they were discharged from the hospital with no guidance other than: "Take her."

"We were literally at a loss," she said. "There was nowhere for her to go."

Now streaming on Netflix is Guillermo del Toro's epic Frankenstein. Based on the classic

Mary Shelley novel, this is a two and a half hour film showcasing Oscar Isaac as Frankenstein Victor who grows up under the harsh upbringing of his father, becomes a doctor and decides to create life in his castle.

His creation (Jacob Elordi) is more than Frankenstein bargained for as the tale unfolds.

Written and directed by Guillermo del Toro who is one of the best around and directing the Oscar winning The Shape of Water, Hellboy, Blade 2 and Pinocchio. I remember the first time I saw Pan's Labyrinth the images and the story still stay with me.

Frankenstein is made on the grandest scale and looks terrific. The costumes and makeup are awards worthy as is Elordi who deserves a supporting actor nomination as the monster. Del Toro tells this story in pieces and it works really well bringing this story together. The support-

ing cast is excellent as well featuring Christoph Waltz, Mia Goth, Charles Dance and David Bradley. Oscar Isaac is perfectly cast as Victor Frankenstein and does terrific work as well.

This is certainly a contender for top ten of the year though

what is keeping me from a perfect rating is the movie did drag a few times with its excessive length though on repeat viewings it could certainly come together more.

I highly recommend this version of Frankenstein as it is one of the most epic and grand in scale that has been made. Del Toro makes another great film with terrific performances, visuals and storytelling.

That experience became the spark behind Danielle's Lighthouse— a space where individuals can heal safely, regain stability, and begin again. In tribute to Dani's life, 33 Forever is donating a custom mural and photography installation, including images captured by Danielle's sister, Alex, creating a warm, art-filled environment designed to inspire hope.

A Needed Gap in Richland County's Mental-Health Continuum

Executive Director Sherry Branham-Fonner of the Richland County Mental Health & Recovery Services Board, who has served the community for 33 years, praised the collaborative effort that brought the vision to life.

"That gap is being filled today," she said. "This project would not be possible without tremendous collaboration."

She recognized key partners whose support transformed the once stark, concrete-block building into a home-like sanctuary including the Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services, which provided 90% of renovation funding; NAMI Ohio, which contributed \$15,000 for exterior beautification and landscaping; Amcrete, which donated a concrete pad at cost for an outdoor picnic area; 33 Forever, sponsoring artwork and photography; The 1112 Project, providing ongoing hygiene bags; Adena Corporation and architect Todd Robleski, who reimagined the interior space; local artists and photographers, including Alex Heck, whose work brings life to the hallways; and Coleman Health Services to operate the facility.

Coleman Health Services President and CEO Hattie Tracy spoke to the meaning behind the project's opening.

"What we are celebrating today is much more than a renovated building," Tracy said. "This space has been transformed into a 10-bed supportive housing and recovery site dedicated to meeting critical needs. Danielle's Lighthouse is not only a home — it is a mes-

sage that recovery, independence, and positive destiny are always possible."

Coleman, which serves 58 counties across Ohio and provides care to more than 40,000 individuals annually, will oversee the site's clinical and supportive services.

John Annarino, Chief of Staff for the Ohio Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services (OhioMHAS), offered an emotional reflection connecting Danielle's story to the larger statewide effort to expand compassionate, accessible mental-health care. "This isn't a building," he said. "It's a heart of hone."

He looked around the room and added, "There is a room full of people here, but I feel just one beating heart because you've all come together. That's how things get done."

Quoting a reflection once given to him, Annarino honored the Heck family: "Every person is a bridge spanning two legacies the one they inherit and the one they pass on. Sometimes one family has the courage to face the flame. That family brings peace to their ancestors and spares all the children that follow."

The Heart Behind the Name and the Art

Donna returned to the podium to explain the significance of the building's name and the artwork inside — including a mural of the Marblehead Lighthouse, a place Dani always wanted to visit.

"We bought a place near Marblehead in 2018," Donna recalled. "I FaceTimed her and said, 'You're going to love it here.' She never made it. Now she did. She's at the lighthouse standing behind us today."

The Starfish Story: A Reminder of Why This Work Matters

Jeff closed with a story dear to the family — the boy on the shoreline throwing stranded starfish back into the ocean one at a time.

"Maybe I can't save them all," the boy says. "But I made a difference to that one."

Jeff looked toward the guests and staff preparing to serve at Danielle's Lighthouse. "That's what this place is. That's what mental health has to be — one starfish at a time."

A Ribbon Cut, A Beacon Lit

As the ceremony concluded, the Richland Area Chamber & Economic Development team stepped forward with their ceremonial scissors. With applause, tears, and gratitude from all corners of the room, the ribbon was cut — officially opening Danielle's Lighthouse, a beacon for those seeking stability after crisis.

More than a building, it stands as a living testament to Danielle Leedy's legacy — a space rooted in compassion, built by collaboration, and filled with the message that healing is not only possible, but expected.







MCS celebrates growth at annual school banquet

The MCS Annual School Banquet was held on Friday, Nov. 7 at the Mid-Ohio Conference Center, bringing together more than 400 guests for an evening filled with worship, celebration, and stories of God's faithfulness. Guests enjoyed worship led by Image, a joyful performance from the second-grade class, and moving testimonies shared by high school seniors, parents, and teachers.

An impactful highlight of the evening was honoring Karl Milliron as this year's Distinguished Mission Impact Award recipient, recognizing his longstanding commitment to the mission and students of MCS.

Superintendent Dr. Cy Smith shared a powerful message reflecting both gratitude and vision for the season ahead. "Whether you are interested in the new high school, a new roof, teacher salaries, or student programs, Mansfield Christian will be one of the best investments you have made in your lifetime," he said. "We will train our children all day, every day, like Daniel—by filling their minds and shaping their hearts, and for this reason, every hour matters and every life changes."

This year's banquet centered around the school-wide theme, "1,000 Hours – Every Hour Matters, Every Life Changes." Dr. Smith explained that the theme was chosen to emphasize the lasting impact of intentional Christian education: "I love our theme this year. Every Hour Matters. Every Life Changes. 

Ohio House approves bill establishing advanced practice respiratory therapist designation

State Representatives Marilyn John (R-Richland County) and Tom Young (R-Washington Twp.) announced that legislation they championed that creates an advanced licensure pathway for respiratory therapists passed through the Ohio House of Representatives.

House Bill 253 works to address a gap in high-quality, prompt care for individuals with cardiopulmonary disease and other respiratory issues by expanding access to respiratory services for those who need it. By establishing the Advanced Practice Respiratory Therapist (APRT) license, the bill provides a regulatory framework for providers who practice in this area so more Ohioans can be served.

"Providing a high-quality, well-educated workforce is key to providing high-quality medical care in the State of Ohio and that is what this bill does," said Rep. John, who jointly sponsored the bill.

"By officially recognizing and licensing the Advanced Practice Respiratory Therapist (APRT) role, this legislation validates the pioneering educational excellence of programs like The Ohio State University's MRT, and will deliver more accessible, specialized, and quality patient care, securing a stronger and healthier Ohio," said Rep. Young, joint sponsor.

House Bill 253 requires an advanced practice respiratory therapist to hold a license issued by the State Medical Board and establishes criminal penalties for violators. The bill also specifies the services that an advanced practice respiratory therapist may perform under a supervising physician's delegation, including administering, ordering, and prescribing drugs and medical devices.

House Bill 253 now moves to the Ohio Senate for further consid-

Drivers asked to make safety a priority

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), Ohio State Highway Patrol (OSHP) and Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) are asking motorists to make safe driving a top priority this holiday season to ensure Ohio hits its goal of four straight years of declining traffic fa-

While there had been a rise in traffic deaths from 2018 to a peak of 1,356 in 2021, Ohio has seen a reduction over the last three consecutive years. In 2024 there were 1,157 people killed on Ohio roads, down from 1,242 in 2023 and 1,275 in 2022

However, current crash data shows traffic deaths in 2025 are tracking closely with last year's pace, prompting state agencies to launch a year-end enforcement and education blitz focused on the behaviors that most often lead to deadly crashes — distraction, impairment, lack of seat belt use, and speeding.

As of Nov. 13, there have been 976 lives lost on Ohio roads compared to 1,029 at the same point in 2024.

"We've made tremendous progress in saving lives on Ohio roadways, but we can't afford to let up now," said Governor Mike DeWine. "Every driver plays a role in keeping this positive trend going by staying alert, slowing down and always buckling up."

With record investments in roadway safety, engineering can only go so far. We need drivers to take responsibility and do their part to make safe decisions behind the wheel," said ODOT Director Pamela

The Ohio State Highway Patrol reports that speed, impairment, and failure to wear a seat belt remain factors in the majority of fatal crashes. Troopers and will increase visibility and enforcement through the end of the year to remind motorists that safe driving saves lives.

"Our message is simple: We want everyone to make it home for the holidays and enjoy time together," said Colonel Charles A. Jones, superintendent of the Ohio State Highway Patrol. "Put the phone away, buckle up, drive sober, and make the safe choice every time you get behind the wheel."

In 2024, 43% of traffic deaths were a result of a crash that involved drugs, 34% of those killed chose not to wear a seatbelt, 32% involved alcohol impairment, and 30% were from crashes involving excessive speed.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a household of up to eight members and 60% of State Median Income for a household of nine or more members to pay their heating bills.

The benefit is applied directly to the customer's utility or bulk fuel bill. Older Ohioans may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing the application or visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download a copy of the application.

Applications must be received by May 31, 2026. For information call 419-524-4144.

When applying, individuals need to have copies of most recent utility bills, a list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers, proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types), proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members and proof of disability (if applicable). HEAP benefits are applied to energy bills after Jan. 1.
