### **Richland County Foundation supports children's summer activities**


The Richland County Foundation is supporting summertime programs focused on children.

## Rep. John bill would improve 340B program

Majority Floor Leader Marilyn John (R-Richland County) recently introduced House Bill 276, legislation to make improvements to the state's 340B program, ensuring access to affordable prescription medications.

A few provisions highlighted by Rep. John are as follows:

Prohibits manufacturers of dangerous drugs, repackagers of dangerous drugs, and third-party logistics providers from limiting the acquisition of a 340B drug by or delivery of a 340B drug to a 340B grantee, with certain exceptions;

Requires a 340B grantee to submit any claims or utilization data as a condition for allowing the acquisition of a 340B drug by or delivery of a 340B drug to a 340B grantee; and

Requires health plan issuers to disclose certain data and information as outlined under the bill on drugs covered under a related health benefit plan upon request of a covered person, the covered person's health care provider, or the third-party representative.


The 340B Drug Pricing Program allows Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) to purchase prescription medications at significantly reduced prices and provide discounted outpatient 340B medications to eligible patients.

"This issue was brought to my attention by the Ohio Association of Community Health Centers and Third Street Family Health Center located in Mansfield," said John. "For just over 30 years, Third Street has provided medical care across north central Ohio, and it is my honor to champion legislation to help FQHC's like them."

The long-term care ombudsman program encourages everyone to plan ahead for the possibility of needing long-term care. One key service we offer is to help Ohioans evaluate their care options, learn what questions to ask, and how to choose long-term care to suit their needs. Because we are funded through federal and state funds, our services are unbiased, provided at no charge, and a phone call away.

Another essential service from the long-term care ombudsman is to champion the concerns of those already living in long-term care. We visit long-term care communities, speak to residents, help them know their rights, and empower residents to speak up for excellence in their care.

If residents want our help, we will advocate on their behalf to solve problems related to their care, safety, environment, preferences and more. Last year we helped resolve over 370 complaints for residents living in Region 5 which covers Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot Counties.

Every resident living in a long-term care setting deserves a safe environment, quality care, and to be treated with dignity and respect. 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

**Day Trippin' With Damon** – A brand new glass walkway has been installed near Minnehaha Falls at Nelson-Kennedy Ledges State Park in Portage County, OH. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources celebrated the opening of the new glass walkway with a ribbon-cutting ceremony May 23. The Falls Edge Glass Walkway stretches 137 feet in an elegant S-shaped design, allowing visitors to walk directly above Sylvan Creek's gorge with views 50 feet down to the water below. The walkway extends to a point just short of Minnehaha Falls, creating the sensation of floating above the waterfall. The \$1.68 million project began in December 2022. The park features rugged cliffs, waterfalls and natural landscape. It's spectacular rock formations are among the few in northern Ohio still exposed to view. Hikers can enjoy trails that take them to formations like Devil's Icebox, Goldhunters Cave and Old Maid's Kitchen. Nelson-Kennedy Ledges State Park is open daily from dawn to dusk. Parking and restrooms are located at 12440 OH-282 Garrettsville, OH.



## Art and advocacy shine at the Two Days in May Conference

The Ohio Attorney General's Office hosted the 33rd annual Two Days in May Conference on Victim Assistance in downtown Columbus. "There's always stuff dragging you down, and even though you see the good things about something or a person, the bad things don't change. The orb represents letting go and being free," she explained. The annual Two Days in May Conference provides a unique platform for advocates to access a wide range of workshops, covering topics to enhance support for survivors and prevent future abuse. ### Representatives McClain, Miller provide testimony on legislation to expand midwifery services

State Representatives Riordan McClain (R-Upper Sandusky) and Melanie Miller (R- Ashland) yesterday provided sponsor testimony before the House Health Committee on House Bill 224, legislation to create a new licensure framework for midwives in Ohio.

The bill aims to expand access to midwifery services by implementing the following:

Recognize and provide new, optional licensure framework for midwives;

Ensure that traditional (lay) midwives can continue to operate without licensure as they always have as long as they receive informed consent from their clients and carry out their limited scope of work; and

Create an advisory committee to oversee and advise on matters regarding midwifery.

"The miracle of birth is an awe-inspiring event and isn't simply a procedure to be rushed as long as mom and baby are doing well," said McClain during sponsor testimony. "Midwives provide a time-tested approach to prenatal care and childbirth that guides the mother through the natural processes to bringing a healthy baby from their womb into their arms."

"I believe this legislation will directly increase access to maternity healthcare, ensuring the health and wellbeing of moms and babies," said Miller. "Midwives provide essential care and support to women and infants throughout pregnancy, childbirth, and the postpartum period. Their role in maternity health is invaluable, ensuring women receive the personalized, compassionate care they need during some of the most significant moments in their lives."

The bill comes as a result of issues surrounding access to maternity services, especially in rural areas. Miller and McClain also championed this policy during the previous General Assembly.

The legislation awaits further consideration from the House Health Committee.
